UPDATE ON PROPERTY TAX COLLECTION AND COUNTY SERVICES

Mr. McAllister will give an overview of property tax collection, the housing market, and the County's role in providing essential services in our region.

Dan McAllister has served San Diego County residents as the County's Treasurer-Tax Collector since 2002. He was re-elected to his sixth term in June 2022. Dan oversees the collection of more than \$8 billion in property taxes each year, the management of over \$17 billion in the County's Investment Pool, and the administration of the County's over \$1.5 billion deferred contribution program. Under his direction, his office collected over 70% of property tax payments electronically while maintaining a 99% collection rate. Please welcome Treasurer-Tax Collector Dan McAllister!

She also reminded us of some of the Positive Peace Projects that our Club is championing around the world including building good relations with neighbors through Melanie's project with Tijuana Rotary providing computer access to the underserved. Also highlighted was the clean water project that Steve is leading which enables equitable water distribution in the "Stan" nations.

Linda made a plug for the Holiday Party which is taking place on December 9th at the ZLAC Rowing Club. The parade of lights starts at 5.30 pm and dinner is served at 7 pm.

Speaker:

Deacon Jim Vargas, President & CEO of Father Joe's Villages

Brett introduced speaker, Deacon Jim Vargas who provided the Club with an update on homelessness in San Diego and an overview of the impactful work that Father Joes Villages does in our community.

Key Numbers: There are 600k homeless people nationally, 170k of these are homeless people in California, and the homeless in San Diego account for 10k people.

A census is done through canvassing by volunteers every year in January. This is the number that HUD uses to distribute federal resources which is why it is important to collect on a consistent basis despite not being 100% accurate. Recently the homeless have been cleared out of downtown. Although more beds are being allocated through new and existing shelter, we need more shelter beds and housing as a community.

Father Joes Villages is the largest homeless service provider in Southern California and provides solutions through "pillars of care"

They meet critical basic needs by serving 1M meals, and providing shelter as well as 30k showers per day. Housing and support services are key to successfully transition people out of homelessness. They currently have 3 housing development projects underway. Each takes 5 years to complete so there is a real need to address permitting timeliness to enable affordable housing development in a more timely manner (must be addressed at state and local level). Other pillars include Health, Investing in Children, and Self Sufficiency.

I have never stopped appreciating the amazing people that I have met at our Rotary Club and in the other opportunities Rotary has given me. It has affirmed my belief in the tremendous decency that exists in a sometimes troubled world.
