"MEDIA LITERACY EDUCATION: BEYOND 'FAKE NEWS' AND MEDIA-BIAS CHARTS."

We might tend to think of "media literacy" as being about the evaluation of news and research sources: "How reliable is this reporting?" "What kinds of bias are present in this study?" "Is there a hidden (or not-so-hidden) political agenda here?" These are of course important questions, worthy on their own of serious consideration and scholarship. But media-literacy education involves even more pervasive questions about what it means to be "literate" in the 21st century. What does it mean to read visual texts, aural/oral texts, public spaces, cultural artifacts, and Internet (including social-media) artifacts? Where and how do we learn these lessons? By whom, and to what ends, are such lessons taught? It is past time to expand our definition of what "reading" is, and to ponder a potentially-unsettling question: is it possible to be a confident reader of written texts, and still be functionally illiterate?

Lucas Jacob is the Director of Writing, Communication, and Media Literacy at La Jolla Country Day School. For more than 25 years, he has worked as a teacher, advisor, coach, and administrator in independent schools across the country. In 2004-05, he had the honor of serving as a Fulbright Teaching Fellow in Budapest, Hungary. As a writer, he is the author of the poetry collection The Seed Vault and the chapbooks A Hole in the Light and Wishes Wished Just Hard Enough. His poetry and prose have appeared in literary magazines including Southwest Review, Hopkins Review, and RHINO, and in trade journals including Education Week, Independent Teacher Magazine, and IEEE's Computer Graphics and Applications.



REPORT





The 20 ZOOMers participating from home in their pajamas were surprised that their 1/2hr conversation from 7:00 - 7:30 was for the Marriott and all to see and hear.

Hence, his creation of the California Cogs, which have raised over \$7500 for the Rotary Foundation. They are available for community events and have a discounted rate of \$300-\$500 for individual club member events. He introduced the Cogs, all Rotarians, Ron Kohl, Dennis Bucko, Scott Wood, Danie and Rebecca.

Nancy said she had given Dave her word that announcements would be short, and produced her phone to time speakers.

Steve Brown and Matt Schillingburg, who along with **Luke Ervin** and **Sharon** Council, are working with the Rotary District on resettlement of the 2000 Afghans coming to San Diego. We have \$17,000 from the County of San Diego and \$4,500 from the Copley Foundation for the effort. They are working with relief agencies and the City of El Cajon. Let them know if you have any questions or want to get involved. Nancy reported they finished with 22 seconds to spare.

Next, Ranjan and Rick **Clark** said that they were working on a future police dept. project when Ranjan asked what they could do for the military for the Holidays. Rick made inquiry at Camp Pendleton and was told of the needs of lower ranking marines. He contacted the Copley Foundation with a request for \$2500 to purchase 100 \$25 gift cards. Much to his surprise, the Foundation came back earlier this week with \$10,000 to purchase 400 cards. They kept their remarks under two minutes. Nancy reported this as a first for Rick.

With that, at 7:41, Nancy said, "Let the music begin." So, we heard "Santa Claus is Coming to Town."

The presentation included Christmas music interspersed with some of the Cogs' rock music, such as, Cheatin' Heart, and was followed with enthusiastic clapping.

At 8:07, **Brett** stopped taking photos of the band to lead a group of Rotary women in a conga line around the room.

Huge sound of applause for "Wooly Bully".

Two brief announcements followed. First reminder was for the Dec 18 wreath laving at Miramar National Cemetery. Chris Reed is in charge.
