YOUTH DIALOGUE: A PATH TO POSITIVE PEACE

For 20 years, Hands of Peace has been bringing together youth from Israel, Palestine, and the United States to build bridges of understanding through dialogue and experiential education. In a time of increasing polarization, rising hate speech and political violence, our work is more essential than ever. Our new approach to youth empowerment considers the Institute for Economics and Peace's Positive Peace Index, particularly the "attitudes" that lead to stronger, more resilient societies.

Melanie holds a Master's in Peace and Justice from the University of San Diego and a Bachelor's in History and Holocaust studies. Since 2014 Melanie has devoted her career to youth empowerment and cross-cultural education, as a dialogue facilitator, experiential educator, and Peace Corps Volunteer in Memphis, Tennessee, Bangkok, Thailand, and Madagascar. She also studied and volunteered for six months in Be'er Sheva, Israel, where she studied Hebrew, sociology, and narrative history. She moved to San Diego in 2021 to complete her Master's degree and now works full time as the San Diego Site Director for Hands of Peace.
