



STATUS OF SAN DIEGO FIRE-RESCUE

Assistant Fire Chief John Wood started his career with SDFD in 1996 as a firefighter and progressed through the ranks. He currently oversees all aspects of SDFD business operations including the Emergency Command and Data Center, Employee Services, Logistics, and Community Risk Reduction.

Chief Wood was an FBI certified bomb technician on the SDFD Bomb Squad for 17 years. He has been a member of the Federal Emergency Management Agency's (FEMA) Urban Search & Rescue (US&R) program for 24 years; a member of the SDFD HAZMAT team for six years and a member of several incident management teams (IMT). As a member of the FEMA US&R Task Force and Incident Support Team (IST), Chief Wood responded to many nationwide disasters including New York City following 9/11, Hurricanes Katrina and Sandy, the Colorado floods, and the Oso, Washington landslide. Additionally, Chief Wood responded to many wildland fires around the nation as a member of an IMT.

Chief Wood has an Associate of Arts degree in Fire Technology, a Bachelor of Arts degree in Business Administration and has completed the Mission Critical Team Development program in Executive Leadership at the Wharton School, University of Pennsylvania. Currently Chief Wood is pursuing a Master of Arts in Organizational Leadership. He specializes in labor-management coordination and was a board member for the International Association of Fire Fighters Local 145 for 10 years.

Chief Wood's wife Shelbey has been an educator for 30 years. They are the proud parents of two sons who are currently attending college. In his time off, Chief Wood enjoys golf, physical fitness, and snow skiing.

Nancy introduced our speaker **Melanie Stanek** who works full time as the San Diego Site Director for Hands of Peace. Nancy also mentioned that Hands of Peace was our club's recipient of the Annual Peace Award several years ago.

Melanie holds a Master's in Peace and Justice from the University of San Diego, For 20 years, Hands of Peace has been bringing together youth from Israel, Palestine, and the United States to build bridges of understanding through dialogue and experiential education. It is a 3-week intensive program in the summer. The first 3-4 days there are a lot of ice breakers and getting to know each other. As they become more comfortable, they start getting into tough questions and share stories and also become active listeners.

The way to create impactful change is to cultivate young leaders who are committed to serve each other and their communities. They are finding through this program that many of these youth are discovering paths into international studies and this program changed their trajectory. It also finds that these youth are more understanding of situations other than their own and are effectively learning how to have conversations about difficult topics.
