PEACEMAKER OF THE YEAR



ABDUL QAUM ALMAS

The La Jolla Golden Triangle Rotary Club Peace Committee has selected a special young Afghan, Abdul Qaum Almas, as the 2023 LJGT Peacemaker of the Year.

After college graduation, Almas worked with the BRAC Bangladesh International organization. There, he gained a unique perspective of the country's education programs, culture and experience. It gave him a new appreciation for the importance of cultural education exchange and understanding. When he joined our Rotary team and the GCE education program in 2008 at age 23, he was hooked. He was instrumental in establishing and administrating many society changing programs in his country.

Over a 14 year span, these included education of English as a second language, computer and international internet skills and sports programs for boys and girls. He also assisted in coordinating critical medical programs and volunteer services including food distribution to needy families and many community activities.

When the US pulled out of Afghanistan in August, 2021, Almas negotiated with the Taliban authorities to continue many of these activities and programs.

Tim Quast was our speaker of the Day. He is retired Commander of Naval Ship Mercy. A floating mobile hospital. If it were on land

it would be the 8th largest hospital in the world. It displaces about 70% of the water that an aircraft carrier does. Its primary mission is to support major combat operations, then urgent disasters, and large scale humanitarian assistance. It has a skeleton crew of around 120. but can scale up to 1250 in a few days for a urgent mission.

The galley can make 7500 meals a day. Their humanitarian assistance is not just medical care, but building classrooms and helping with local projects as the travel around the globe.

Their last trip was more than 40.000 nautical miles. The people and nations that they help are very grateful and appreciative of the good will of the USA.

Their last mission strengthened partnerships and security in the South Pacific.

Nancy thanks Tim and explained that we have donated to Urban Street Angels on his behalf and gave him a parting gift of sticky notes.

Carroll Dennis Bucko was born December 19th, 1941, in West Springfield, Massachusetts and was educated in the public school system. In high school Dennis was class president and participated in soccer, track and the marching band as well as in a small Dixieland band as a trumpet player. Dennis received a Bachelor of Arts in chemistry from American International College and his M.D. degree in 1967 from the University of Vermont. Dennis also met and married Sally Clerkin while he was a medical student, and they have three children (Dan, Wendy and Sarah) and seven grandchildren.

After a year at Rhode Island Hospital/Brown University as an intern in Surgery, Dennis served as a Lieutenant Commander in the Public Health Service stationed in Alaska for two very cold but exciting and rewarding years. After a four year General Surgery residency at the University of Utah, and a two year Plastic Surgery residency at the University of Michigan he was board certified in Plastic Surgery in 1977 and stayed on at the University of Michigan for five years as Assistant Professor of Plastic Surgery while maintaining a part-time private practice with the chairman of the Section of Plastic Surgery.

In 1981 the Bucko family moved from the "rust belt" to the "sun belt" in La Jolla. Dennis started his own private plastic surgery practice, after spending three years at Scripps Clinic developing their satellite plastic surgery program. Dr. Bucko continued to teach as a Clinical Assistant Professor of Plastic Surgery at UCSD. He has also volunteered on cleft palate teams in the United States and Mexico, as the leader of Southwest Medical Teams program in Oaxaca, Mexico in 1992, and as a surgeon on the Rotary-connected, Mercy Outreach Surgical Teams trips to Mexico for the past twenty years.

His leisure time activities include playing guitar and harmonica (especially blues style) as well as kayaking, sailing, scuba diving, and tennis. Dr. Bucko joined Rotary in 1987 and has been a long-time member of the La Jolla Golden Triangle Rotary International Service Committee and was elected to the LJGT Rotary Board in 1997 and has served as International Service Committee Chairperson.

Dennis has become more and more serious as a sculptor over the years and has displayed a bronze piece in the La Jolla Contemporary Art Gallery. His most recent work is a commission of the "Virgin of Guadalupe", in one half size scale.

Dr Bucko retired in 2020 and is happily enjoying his leisure time but is surprised that there never seems to be enough time to do everything
