GUN VIOLENCE PREVENTION AND THE "GHOST GUN" ORDINANCE

Councilmember Marni von Wilpert represents District 5 on the San Diego City Council and was previously a San Diego Deputy City Attorney. She is proud to serve as Chair of the Committee on Active Transportation and Infrastructure, Vice Chair of the Committee on Environment, member of the Committee on Public Safety and Livable Neighborhoods, and member of the Committee on Rules. Councilmember von Wilpert was also appointed to the San Diego Regional Airport Authority Board, the San Dieguito River Valley Regional Open Space JPA, and the Los Peñasquitos Canyon Preserve.

Councilmember von Wilpert now lives in Scripps Ranch, just miles from her childhood home. She received a B.A. in Peace and Conflict Studies from UC Berkeley and served in the Peace Corps in Botswana, Africa where she helped improve access to healthcare and worked on treatment, prevention, and care for children and adults living with HIV/AIDS.

After returning from Botswana, she obtained her law degree from Fordham University School of Law in New York and graduated Magna Cum Laude. She was admitted to the Mississippi Bar in 2011 and was awarded the Skadden Fellowship for Public Interest law, where she worked with the Mississippi Center for Justice to create the first HIV/ AIDS civil rights law practice in the state. She provided free legal services to people facing discrimination based on race, HIV-status, and LGBTQ identity.

Councilmember von Wilpert served as a Law Clerk from 2013 to 2014 for Hon. James E. Graves, Jr., U.S. Court of Appeals, 5th Circuit, and worked as an adjunct professor at Mississippi College School of Law teaching legal writing, research and analysis. From 2014 to 2017, she was a litigator in the National Labor Relations Board's Appellate and Supreme Court Litigation Branch, where she represented the federal agency in the United States Courts of Appeals. During 2016, she served as an attorney in the U.S. House of Representatives for Congressman Robert C. Scott, drafting national legislation to promote workers' rights on the job. Councilmember von Wilpert then served as an Associate Labor Counsel for the Economic Policy Institute in Washington, D.C., drafting state legislation and regulations affecting workers' rights, wages and working conditions.

After she was admitted to the California Bar, Councilmember von Wilpert became a Deputy City Attorney in the Affirmative Civil Enforcement Unit of the San Diego City Attorney's Office. She represented the City and people of the State of California in court, enforcing laws that protect consumers, employees, and the environment. She initiated legal action to protect public health and safety, restore environmental quality, and sustain economic vitality in San Diego. Councilmember von Wilpert will continue serving on the boards of several community organizations, including San Diego Youth Services, Teen Health Mississippi, and the National Women's Political caucus.

Our Speaker of the Day was none other than Steve Brown with the history of our Afghanistan projects as well as an update on the current situation. In 2002 Fary was In Afghan refugee camp in Pakistan in 2002. When she came back, she shared the idea of building and funding a school.



At that time, the club started fund raising for this project. By November of 2002, Steve and Fary meet with leaders in Jalalabad and shortly thereafter the project kicked off. Initially it was built to go through 6 grade and subsequently expanded to 12 grades.

In 2004 they dedicated a computer lab at Nangarhar University. Thanks to many supporters, they were able to teach the students and the faculty about the internet and "google searches".



AND BETTER FRIENDSHIPS?

> Then they were able to build an English department as well as an Engineering school. Followed by a women's

dormitory, designed by Rick Clark, and built with funding from Antonio Grillo-López and his Sister (Magda Baggett) amongst other grants & donations.

Steve Weber, President of San Diego State University, was involved as his university supported training of English **Professors and Engineering** Professors at Nangarhar University through two grants from World Bank totaling \$4,000,000

With a generous grant from Phillips, Rotary was able to acquire Maternal Fetal Monitors. In addition to the monitors, Rotary was able to train female OB/ GYN professionals in Turkey on their use. These tools included a patient scope and a device to support cervical cancer prevention / early detection. The training was done by Alan Gold virtually from Israel.

On August 14th, things turned for the worst as the government surrendered to the Taliban. A lot of the university leaders went into hiding. The head of the university started dialog with the Taliban about 4 days later. On October 10th they had another major meeting to help promote the university and the work that was done there. Thus far, only 5 labs are open and operational.

The humanitarian crisis there is substantial. In January 2022 the Afghan Youth Connect Food relief program was launched and is now under way.
