Erik Mjoen introduced the speaker of the day, Professor **Rajesh Gupta**.

Professor Gupta is a Distinguished Professor and Director at UCSD. He is a computer scientist and engineer at the University of California. He reflected philosophically about how life has changed over the last 5-10 years. He also discussed how dynamic of a move it was for American universities in the 1950's to change the way they started hiring professors. He felt this gave the USA universities a leading edge over other countries.

Over the next 70 years, the development of universities allowed us to take the lead by inventing a model in which research and teaching are combined, making universities the center of talent as the professors remained on the cutting edge of scientific knowledge. If research is not first, students cannot be inspired. And research is EXPENSIVE! Enter government funding, and the need to compete

for that funding. Since that funding was insufficient to stay on the cutting edge, researchers taught to have enough income to create ecosystems of talent (teaching provided a steady low income). Along with the pay and then tenure, came prestige, respect, pride, and honor.

To become an ecosystem of talent, the institution must be large. In the past 10 years, no other American university has made the level of investment that the UC system has in order to attract the best researchers who will then attract the best students. Those students then attract the leading scientific companies to the area, which creates new knowledge bringing jobs and more innovation. We will be able to say that the transformation started here in data science. Institutions are defined by 3 things:

- 1. People (the heart of the institution)
- 2. Place (the most popular fight in a university: who gets which & how much space?
- 3. Culture -takes a long time but must be intentional, not just organic. At UCSD, every student is important. Each is assigned a professor so that over the term of the education, that person will progress from student to colleague.

Dr. Gupta is rightfully proud of the institution he helped create, contributing to a wealth of scientific talent, innovations, and community knowledge & wealth creation right here in La Jolla and San Diego.

The meeting ended ten minutes late, but not without President Nancy's traditionally fun "Name That Tune" game!
