Mindy Baker, as I mentioned before is the Education Director of the Glenner Alzheimer's Family Center, and was our speaker. She talked about Dementia and Reminiscence Therapy. There are many different causes or forms of dementia, and Alzheimers is only one of them. It can start at any age although we usually associate it with old age. San Diego has many resources to help people. that interferes with everyday functioning for at least 6 months.

To help individuals it is important to focus on what these people CAN do. Perhaps the most important thing about the Glenner Center is that they have storefronts. (They're going to franchise these ideas to other centers in the country.) Since the aim is to access long term memories indirectly, these storefronts look like pool halls, restaurants and other familiar places. By utilizing visual, auditory, and olfactory clues participants often have enjoyable moments. (The sad part is that no one can yet stop the continued deterioration.
