President Emidio DelConte called the meeting to order at 7:30AM. Our Rotarian of the Day, Jan Bernardi, led us in a moment of silence to think about our country and to pray for unity based on respect, peace and love. She then led us in the Pledge of Allegiance.

Jan has been a member of the LJGTR for about 3 years. She happily retired in April 2017, from a career working as a registered nurse and then in management. She grew up in Canada, and after getting her RN, immediately came to the states. She and her husband have been living by the pandemic restrictions here and in their condominium in Scottsdale. She has been spending her time crocheting, gardening, reading, cooking, and walking 3 miles a day. And she did get to see her 10 year old grandson on Christmas morning!

She is a Board member and has most recently been working on updating the web site with Lee Ann Cusick and Sandi Rimer and has loved doing that. She is a member of Village Rotarians and is chairperson of the Care and Share. She is also a member of the Oasis board. She is proud to be a member of the La Jolla Golden Triangle Rotary!

Emidio introduced four guests: Peter Ballantyne, who knows Emidio from Kiawanis and who works on the San Diego Festival of the Arts and with Paralyzed Veterans; Brian Eisenberg who is a former member and plastic surgeon; Sara Katz, a former member who is getting involved again; and Chris Cieszko who has recently relocated back to San Diego from New York City to work with CalPrivate Bank which he initially founded.

Emidio led us in singing Happy Birthday to Alex Monroe. And he announced we are still accepting applications for director positions.

Brett shared that members of the University City High Interact have contacted Gravity Water and adopted a school in VietNam, and are going to raise \$2500 to provide clean drinking water to the community. Brett would like to work with others in the club, to see how we might be able to help the project. UCHS has set up a website and a donation page and has already funded \$112. Mike McQuary said he would like to connect with Brett to discuss other sister schools/ cities in Vietnam. Sara Katz said there's an organization called Water for People that provides 3rd World Country investments and engagements that might have the ability to make a small contribution - Brett will send Sara a link to the UCHS Gravity Water project website.

Fary Moini then introduced Alexis Dixon, a corporate and family mediator, trained in humanistic, person-centered psychology. He worked with the Carl Rogers Institute in LaJolla for 14 years, studied psychology at San Diego State and served on the Board of the National Conflict Resolution Center.

Alexis says that people do not feel heard. My boss/ wife/husband/mother/ father/friend - doesn't listen. Black Lives Matter, the people who stormed the Capitol - don't feel they are

being heard.

There are two kinds of listening:

One is Conditional Listening or Listening to Defend. That's the one we do most of the time. We listen for the other person to agree with our world view. Weaponized listening. The point at which we disagree, we come to the point of no longer listening - building a defense. And now we're in psychological war.

3 requirements of weaponized listening are: I will listen to you:

When you agree with me If you agree with me and Because you agree with me

At the point at which we disagree, you are the "other." Listening to defend is also an addiction to being right. I won't listen to anything unless it confirms my world view. The weaponized form of conditional listening is anger and the desire to win my side versus your side. At the worst end of the spectrum, it's genocide. When I don't feel agreed with, and I listen to defend, my language becomes weaponized, or when language is not enough I use my body, my gun, my gang, my tanks, my bombs....

Children say my parents don't listen to me. I love you, if, because, when.... We also do this with ourselves. Conditional love.

The second kind of listening is Listening to Understand or Unconditional Listening or Empathic Listening.

Listening to Defend is rooted in ego - an egoic intellectual construct that does not see the humanity. Listening to Understand is heavy lifting.

Conditional Listening: I am fearful and go into relation-ship

Unconditional Listening: I see your humanity and go into a relationship.

A local man's son was murdered by a 14 year old boy a few years ago, and his father forgave the boy who murdered him. He said if I had been raised like the boy, I may also have murdered. I miss my son, so I weep for my son, but I also weep for the boy. I don't agree that he should have murdered my son, but I love him, I see the humanity within him. That is listening to understand. It requires a different kind of engagement.

Carl Rogers said: Love and do as you will When I'm sad, I love myself and then I go into my sadness

When I'm terrified by the world, I love the world and go into my terrifying feeling of the world

So,

Love and go into fear Love and go into sadness Love and go into meeting the world Love and go into your self

This moment is calling us for a different kind of listening in order for us to save our common humanity. It's a listening that the virus has invited us to do. In spite of the difference, can you still see the humanity in the other person. Love, witness the bad things, and do something about it. That's the invitation.

Emidio thanked Alexis and told him that his visit will be honored by a contribution to Angel Flight West. Emidio also had these parting words of wisdom:

Eleanor Roosevelt: With a new day comes new strength and new thoughts Nelson Mandella: It always seems impossible until it's actually done.
