29.....Toastmasters The Power of Public Speaker President Christy White Brook brought the meeting to order. She noted that today is the annual joint meeting of the La Jolla Clubs. Christy introduced Barbara Brown of the LJ Club, Sam Doyle of the LJ Sunrise Club and Fernanda Torres of the San Diego Coastal Club.

Don Fipps, District Governor then gave a brief memorial to past District President, **Chuck Pretto** who recently passed away from leukemia. He recognized him with a moment of silence. Chuck's funeral is Wednesday morning at 10 am and his celebration of life is Wednesday 1 - 4 pm at Liberty Station.

Jay Hatfield then led the clubs in the Pledge of Allegiance and the singing of God Bless America. The group then played three games. **Barbara Johnson** won the longest rotary member with 37 years. **Doug Cramer** won the newest rotary member and **Carlos** won the most rotary pins with more than 31.

Each of the clubs then reported on some of their service projects. La Jolla Sunrise reported on:

• Maintaining and providing safe access to the La Jolla Coast Walk Trail.

 Helping pediatric centers in developing countries including Dominion Republic, Egypt, Pakistan and Romania.

• Their Global Grant Scholars program

• Providing 50,000 girls with menstrual cups in countries in Africa, Ukraine, and Nepal

• And their annual Litchfield swim fundraiser that provides funds for San Pasqual Academy.

The La Jolla Club reported on the Scholars Lab which is a Tijuana program to keep at risk students ages 14 – 18 in school. They also described their program that teaches English and computer skills – noting they have taught 200 students through 20 classes.

The San Diego Coastal Club has 18 members. Their focus is on peace and youth. They installed a peace pole in a Rotary peace park, have a peace maker award and offer peace scholarships. They are always ready to partner and work on programs. They have a sister club in Tijuana and they jointly support the Tijuana fire department toy drive. In addition, they are looking for players for their invitational softball game on March 2nd and are in the planning stages of a Barrio Logan basketball tournament. La Jolla Golden Triangle talked about their Ensenada school refurbishment project. This year's project was the seventh school refurbishment project the club has completed in Mexico. Everyone is invited to participate and it would be great to make it a La Jolla club event. A total of 55 – 75 people participated including members from five separate rotary clubs and UCSD and SDSU Rotaract clubs. They plan to work on the same project in October, which will be mostly painting and electrical. The club noted it also collected about 1,000 peanut butter and jelly sandwiches that morning which were to be delivered to Interfaith Services for distribution to unhoused members of our community.

Christy then introduced the Honorable San Diego Council President Pro Tempore and District 1 Councilmember Joe LaCava. He is a civil engineer from SDSU and worked in public infrastructure and private housing earlier in his career. He has been in office for three years. Councilmember LaCava feels it is important to connect with constituents. He and his staff go to the La Jolla Farmers Market on the 1st Sunday of the month and attend the Pacific Beach farmers market each month to get input from constituents. He is Chair of the San Dieguito River Valley Board and serves on the board of San Diego Community Power which buys electricity for San Diego. San Diego Community Power is reducing electricity rates by 20% in 2024 and it has a goal of being 100% renewable by 2045. He leads the city's environment committee and they are putting pressure on SDG&E because San Diego has the highest electric rates in the country. He is running for a second term and because he doesn't have any competition, he only needs one vote. He said many of the challenges we

face as a city are due to what we haven't done in past, when we kicked the can down the road. The challenge is that everything gets increasingly expensive.

Councilmember LaCava then opened for questions.

One attendee asked about road repair. Councilmember LaCava agreed that our roads are in terrible condition. The city has been aggressive for the last three years including paving La Jolla Parkway which was the biggest project in 3 years. He felt the city has done an excellent job repairing potholes and fixed 60,000 last year. One challenge is that after we repair roads, utility companies tear them up and repair them with six inches to 3 ft trenches and the repaired road is never as good as the original road. The city

recently put new language into law requiring utility companies to repave the road curb to curb or make a Another attendee is part of a group of swimmers in LI Cove and he commended two city staff members for cleaning the public toilets. He asked how their group could recognize the two staff members. Councilmember LaCava said he could arrange for the staff members to attend a club meeting and he said it would mean a lot to them. He said that pre-pandemic, all employees worked at a desk. When the pandemic hit, the City's IT department made an extraordinary effort to allow the city to shift to remote work. The city is now looking at the need for office space and expects to save money by reducing space.

The city is looking at the use of technology in public safety including smart streetlights, police monitoring and how to operate more efficiently. Another attendee as about the city parks. Councilmember LaCava feels the Director of Park and Recreation is the hardest job in city. It has the biggest scope and is the most public facing. One major challenge is that it has a huge number of job openings because compensation is low. A fourth attendee expressed concern about getting a ridiculously high-water bill and found it exceptionally difficult to get it corrected. Councilmember LaCava said the water department has a bad reputation which is well deserved. He said 25,000 rate payers have not gotten a bill – many don't get a bill for many months and then get a giant bill. He said it continues to be a challenge. His office tries to help resolve bills and is encouraging the water department to improve customer service.

After Councilmember LaCava finished his remarks, **Christy White Brook** recognized the City of Rosarita guests and Lieutenant District Governor **David Oates**. David spoke about his friend, Chuck Pretto saying Chuck focused on service and really loved people. Chuck would bristle when someone wasn't happy and then would give them a hug or crack a joke. He was happy when you were happy. Dave had known Chuck for 17 years and missed him already. He suggested we text someone, share a joy, give a hug, and share your love with someone in Chuck's memory. Christy then adjourned the meeting.

I was born in Boulder City, Nevada on January 7th 1959 to my teenage parents Jacklynn McDevitt Spilsbury and my father Jerald Mac Spilsbury. Both families immigrated to the Navoo, Illinois in the early 1800's (Father-England, Mother Ireland). The families both came to meet Joseph Smith where they joined the LDS Church before taking the 1st wagon train to Salt Lake before settling in Southern Utah. My grandparents moved to Las Vegas in the 1940's. I moved to La Jolla in 1995 where I was married to my wife in 1998. We have 2 children, Matthew Spilsbury age 23 born in La Jolla and my Daughter Megan Spilsbury age 20 was born in Newport Beach.
