The Club Foundation has over a halfmillion dollars placed in the San Diego Foundation and takes about \$20K per year in distributions used for Club Service projects. Our Foundation is a 501c3 which is an advantage in approaching grant-giving foundations and government entities such as US Dept of State and USAID for large International Service Committee projects. Distinction was made between our Club dues which cover club operating expenses (nondeductible) and our gifts to the Foundation which fund projects (deductible). To be a Foundation member, vou must be a Paul Harris Fellow and contribute a minimum of \$500 to the Club Foundation. Members expressed appreciation for the clear explanation of the Foundation and of the Club finances.

Bev introduced Chris Richards from the SD Port District, a member of the women's golf group, who volunteers as a CASA for foster youth, and lives in University City. # ROTARRIAN COLORS



grew up in Pasadena, the home of the Huntington Library, home of so many classic portraits. As I was growing up, my parents always made portrait photography part of our lives, as it had been when they were growing up. As my own children grew, I developed a deeper appreciation of how important those photographs had become in my life. Because my parents passed away when I was in my 20's, these memories of my family have become my own link to the past, and a way my family now can connect with their history.

As my interest in photography grew, enhanced by a degree in the Classics,

he also developed an interest in portrait painting, especially studying the work of Sargent, Renoir, Cassat and Rockwell. Trips to galleries in the Louvre and Orsay, the Getty, the British Museum and Chicago Art Museum gave me the opportunity to absorb how other portraitists created their looks.

My early photographic career, too, instilled the values of composition as well as simple but effective lighting in the creation of portraits. Work with masters like Phillip Stewart Charis, Monte Zucker and Dean Collins honed the look. Instructing other photographers around the country, writing for the PROFES-

SIONAL PHOTOGRAPHER and earning the title of Craftsman Photographer taught the value of studying my craft.

I started photographing weddings from my dorm room at the Claremont colleges back when Nixon was president and film was the only way to record images. A great deal has changed since 1968, but my fascination with photography, and ultimately the stories of the people I have photographed, has made every day of my 48 years as a portrait photographer as interesting as the first.

I consider myself very fortunate to be involved in what I love doing every day.
