Speaker

Our speaker this week was past District Governor, **Steven Weitzen** donning a Rotary Hawaiian shirt and necktie in a nod to our dearly beloved past president Emidio. Steven is on the district's Anti Human Trafficking committee chaired by our very own Kim Schafer.

On October 1st in Liberty Station they will be conducting a full-day meeting on the topic. Reach out to Steven/ Kim to learn more.

Learning more about how prevalent and devasting human trafficking is here in our community and everywhere, as well as meeting some survivors led Steven to pursue the role as District Governor, so he could use his position to bring more awareness to the topic.

Steven shared with us many disturbing facts about the problem.

- *16-years old is the average age of a trafficked individual... meaning there are many much younger
- *the pandemic exacerbated the problem as more teens were stuck at home and on social media
- *Victims come from all socioeconomic backgrounds
- *Traffickers tend to get their victims addicted to drugs, thereby strengthening the victims reliance on them
- *This is profitable for the traffickers, with the exploiter receiving around \$150k per year for each victim...and they usually have 5-6 victims at any given time
- *This is a \$32 billion industry (\$10 billion in the US alone), second most illicit industry behind drugs
- *Estimates are that 22 million individuals are trafficked each year in the world, 18 million of which are in the US

- *San Diego is in the top 15 cities in the country for the industry and is a \$800 million industry in the area
- *As a border town, one might imagine that most of those being trafficked are cross-border, but the overwhelming majority is local kids being trafficked
- *Gangs are getting involved in the trade, as it is less-risky as selling drugs, guns, etc.

Some things to look for if you are concerned about someone being trafficked:

- *Truancy from school
- *A change in the child's friends
- *Drug abuse
- *Having a cell phone (or extra cell phone) you weren't aware of
- *Grades getting worse

What can we as Rotarians do?:

- *Speak to others about this problem and encourage them to spread the word
- *Awareness is key be vigiliant and look for signs in your community
- *Educate yourself, family, friends, and others on the issue
- *Get involved! Support the 3 local safehouses here in town...they need funding and volunteers!

Antonio J. Grillo-López, MD, DSc (hc) Rancho Santa Fé, California

Dr. Grillo-López trained in hematology/oncology at the University of Puerto Rico. He was Program Director, Hematology/Oncology and held faculty appointments there and at the University of Michigan (Associate Professor of Medicine).

He has authored over 400 publications and coauthored the first international response criteria for lymphoma. Dr. Grillo-López has been instrumental in the development of over 25 anticancer agents.

He was Chief Medical Officer (IDEC Pharmaceuticals) responsible for the development of Rituxan and Zevalin (1st MAb and 1st radiolabeled MAb for cancer).

He has received numerous awards: DuPont-Merck's Total Quality Medical Research, Union of American Women's Medicine, Leukemia Society of America's Triumph, Cure for Lymphoma Foundation's Trailblazer, U. of California's Peter McCuen Cancer Research Excellence, Lymphoma Research Foundation's Evelyn Hoffman Memorial, Biotech CEOs' Best in Science, Discovery Health Channel's Medical Honors, Leukemia Lymphoma Soc.'s Health Hero Award, and others. He received the Hope Funds for Cancer Research Award for Excellence in Clinical Development for the development of the monoclonal antibody Rituxan; in 2008 the Tiedemann Award for Courage; and in 2015 the Order of Hope.

The U. of Puerto Rico School of Medicine granted Dr. Grillo-López the degree of Doctor in Scientific Investigations (honoris causa) in 2013. His current board service includes: UC San Diego Foundation, Moores UCSD Cancer Center, UCSD Preuss School, and Hope Funds for Cancer Research.

He was the Industry Representative to the Oncologic Drugs Advisory Committee (ODAC) of the FDA from 2003 to 2007.
