Our speaker for the day was Eric Lovett of Urban Street Alliance. Eric gave us the outlook on our worsening homeless situation in San Diego. (It's quite bad! Largely because San Diego has not built adequate housing for just its organic growth, our own children, for thirty vears.)

There are thousands of homeless youth in San Diego County who will sleep on the street this very night. Half of them land in jail. It costs \$50-60K per year to house a person in the San Diego County Jail.

Eric used to be a professional gospel singer in Tennessee. (I tell ya, this dude is interesting.) And while he still has all of his thoughts and prayers, he decided those by themselves were not enough. That's why he opened his own home to homeless youth when he came to San Diego because there were almost no shelter spaces in San Diego at the time. He still talks like a pastor, though.

From there, Urban Street Alliance came in to being and has three shelters in San Diego. This includes the only dedicated 24-hour homeless shelter for transitional age youth (ages 18-25), as well as a hotel voucher program to get kids off the street until a shelter bed opens up. Urban Street Alliance focuses on a chain of services to get kids from the streets into a stable life. This starts with Emergency Shelter. Then transitions to Supportive Housing. And to give that person stability in the long term they provide Job & Life Skills Training. Services continue with Personal Development.

The goal is to end youth homelessness in our lifetimes.

President Jacquie closed the meeting with the etymology of some famous idioms.
