THE RISING IMPACT OF CYBERCRIME ON SOCIETY

Global cybercrime is on pace to reach \$8T in 2023 making it the third largest economy in the world after the U.S. and China. Cybercrime impacts governments, businesses, and citizens in political, economic, and financial ways. We will review techniques used by bad actors and the most likely industries they will attack. We will wrap up discussing options society has to reduce risk of an attack and recovering as quickly as possible.

Scott Cooper is the founder of Tower 23 IT, a twenty-year-old company whose "why" is to partner with businesses that realize they are at a disadvantage to cyberattacks, lost revenue and productivity due to bad actors and unpredictable IT. This year our club was also able to sponsor 10 students from Preuss School UCSD for Rotary Youth Leadership Awards (RYLA) and Fary, Stephen and Rich Papike volunteered as Facilitators. RYLA is a three day leadership training and ethics program involving a couple hundred High School Juniors throughout D5340.

Nova & Fernanda from Preuss School UCSD cspoke about their experience at RYLA and Dr. Marry Rosenberg introduced two Rotary Model United Nations (MUN) Alumni who talked about their experience. They also thanked Erik for his assistance and credited MUN the negotiating skills they learned. One of the speakers at this year's conference was from the Ukraine

Dr. Marty reminded everyone about UCSD Rotaract referencing all the projects they have done including Water Pasteurization Instruments (WAPI) for clean water. He spoke about how UCSD Rotaract is like a family for these students, many of whom are living on campus far away from home. He also spoke about how Preuss School Interact has remained thriving through COVID through ZOOM calls with students in Afghanistan. They created a Peace garden and now have a seed from a tree that survived Hiroshima. David's wife Sarah was acknowledged as she was instrumental in helping us with Early Act at her school.

Stephen Tako spoke about how Motivated to Act is helping our Pathways to Peace goals through children's books. He also thanked our club for supporting this important anti bullying program.

Dianne returned to speak about the Salk Institute Mobile Science unit which our club has supported for many years. This program gives students hands-on educational science experiences to inspire them. Other programs mentioned by Dianne include: USD Upward Bound thanks to Past President Dr. Cynthia Villis, Hands of Peace and Sister Cities.
