ENDING YOUTH HOMELESSNESS IN SAN DIEGO What Urban Street Angels is doing in San Diego TO TACKLE THE ISSUE OF YOUTH HOMELESSNESS

Eric Lovett has more than 25 years of leadership experience with non-profit organizations and charitable causes across the United States of America. As the founder, President, and CEO of Urban Street Angels, Lovett has spearheaded the organization's growth over the past ten years with a keen eye toward expanding the scale, scope, and impact of its efforts to end youth homelessness in San Diego,

After relocating to Southern California in 2011, it quickly became apparent to Lovett that realistic housing options and job opportunities were in short supply for homeless youth. Reflecting on the despair he had endured early in his own life (and relating these personal experiences - rejection, discrimination, intolerance - to the crisis he was witnessing on the streets of his adopted community), Lovett set out to make a real, meaningful difference.

In 2013, he opened his own home to homeless youth - at one point, providing safe housing for up to eight homeless youth. Over the past ten years, the organization has experienced sustained growth as the homelessness crisis has expanded in Southern California. Today, Urban Street Angels serves over 250 youth each year with emergency shelter, transitional housing, job training programs, employment opportunities, linkages to education, and an innovative holistic program focused on reducing the stigma associated with severe mental illness. Urban Street Angels continues to lead the way in meeting the needs of thousands of homeless youth who have experienced trauma and suffering in their lives, helping them find a way to leave the streets behind for good!

Through strategic partnerships with the County of San Diego – Behavioral Health Services, the Regional Task Force on Homelessness, the YMCA of San Diego County, and the City of San Diego – Housing Commission, Lovett has Urban Street Angels poised for even greater impact in 2022 and beyond.
