Raised in La Jolla, California, he attended La Jolla Elementary, Muirlands, and La Jolla High, did his undergraduate degree at UC Berkeley, and came home to do his Ph.D. in Anthropology at UCSD.

Cody is the father of two children—Sequoia, 6, and Bardot, 8—both of whom attend Torrey Pines Elementary, where he serves on the School Site Council and Site Governance Team. He also serves on the La Jolla Town Council, as well as numerous local boards, including the San Diego River Conservancy, San Diego International Sister Cities Association, and Volcan Mountain Foundation. He is a former member of the Executive Committee of Sierra Club San Diego and the Board of the Resource Conservation District of Greater San Diego.

Cody has spent the last 5 years helping to organize and moderate workshops and trainings for school board trustees, educators, and community members across the County, on issues like learning loss recovery, community schools, science-based closure and re-opening, social and emotional learning, Board-Superintendent dynamics, Special Education, and district budgeting.

Dr. Petterson is Senior Advisor for Land Use, Education, and Environment and manages Intergovernmental Affairs for San Diego County Supervisor Terra Lawson-Remer. He's also a Lecturer in the UCSD Anthropology Department, where he's wrestled with lesson planning, remote learning, grading, and maintaining student motivation and engagement in the context of the pandemic. When he isn't working, teaching, or doing common core math with his kids, Cody is an ocean swimmer, avid hiker, and California native plant enthusiast.



I grew up in Stockton, California and, later, attended San Jose State University where I got my Bachelor's Degree in Economics. My passion was intercultural study and after always being involved in every intercultural program on campus and knowing all the foreign students I was finally hired by the Foreign Student Advisor to do what I loved to do and get paid for it. There I met Krishna Arora, a grad student from India, studying Electrical Engineering. We decided to get married, had a Catholic wedding ceremony in Stockton and then flew to India for a Hindu ceremony. Then we moved to Chicago where Krishna had his first job. I completed my Master's Degree at Northeastern Illinois University and soon after that Krishna received a job offer from General Dynamics in San Diego.

After a number of years of flexible jobs so I could focus on family activities I began working at General Dynamics in Quality Assurance and then joined Qualcomm's International Marketing Department. I later transferred to Configuration Management before retiring from Qualcomm in 1999.

We have 2 sons, a daughter who passed away earlier this year, and 6 grandchildren. Our older son is an allergist and lives in Lexington, Kentucky, with his wife and 3 sons. Our younger son currently lives in London with his wife and 7 month old daughter. Our daughter's 2 daughters live with their dad here in San Diego and spend lots of time with us.

I've lost count of the number of trips to India we've taken since we were married 50 years ago. For many years the trips were not very frequent and were mostly to visit family. Then, as we neared retirement, we decided to do Hindu and Catholic pilgrimages to learn more about our roots. The Hindu pilgrimage led us to do our 1st ancestry project and a book tracing Krishna's family back multiple generations. In that process we found relatives we didn't know we had. Two newly-found cousins had NGOs in India... Adharshila, with learning and vocational centers in Delhi slums, and Sankalp, with learning centers in 3 villages several hours away.

We became attached to those NGOs and at the same time started to visit Rotary Clubs wherever we were. At that point our trips to India began to have a bigger purpose to just visiting family. We eventually bought a condo outside of New Delhi so we could spend more time there and we found a dynamic Rotary Club, Delhi South Metropolitan Rotary Club, which has become our home club whenever we are in India. We recently returned from an extremely intense and amazing trip. Non-stop, we visited family, had a week of sightseeing (something we don't usually have time for) and engaged in 6 current projects, 4 for Rotary and 2 with our family NGOs. Looking forward to sharing more of this story...
