International Service Committee



By the time this Rotary year concludes, our club's International Service Committee will have been involved in projects this year in the following countries: Mexico (5) Afghanistan (4) India, India/Tibet, Indonesia, Niger, and Uganda.

This year our Committee has also assisted Rotary Peace Scholars studying at USD's Kroc School for Peace Studies from Kyrgyzstan, Kenya, and Republic of Georgia and scholars studying in the Joint Program for Water Cooperation and Diplomacy from Afghanistan, Kazakhstan, Kyrgyzstan (2) and Uzbekistan (2) sited at the University for Peace in Costa Rica, IHE-Delft in the Netherlands, and Oregon State University. Additionally, this year the ISC has supported several international programs based in the US.

The budget from funds collected through contributions to our club's foundation totaled \$19,000. Through the use of The Rotary Foundation's grants, the ISC has access to additional funds supporting some of the above projects and scholars totaling many thousands of additional dollars thanks to contributions by our club members to The Rotary Foundation.

Since the Chartering of the La Jolla Golden Triangle Rotary Club in 1986, the ISC has identified 293 projects, programs and scholarships in which it has been involved in 43 countries (and still counting).

President Nancy Gatschet opened the meeting and introduced our Rotarian of the Day, Chris Muhart. After resolving few technical difficulties, Chris read a poem similar to one that hung on her grandma's wall when she was growing up...something like...'remember to walk a mile in another's moccasins before you judge that person'. Chris is the Director of Global Business Operations at Mitek Systems. Their products include digital check deposit technology and mobile ID verification which ties face and fingerprints to prove identification. She's been married for 30 years to husband, Keith. Their first trip to California was on their honeymoon. They have one daughter, Carly, who attends Our Lady of Peace (OLP) High School. Carly recently turned 16 and now has the keys to Chris' car. Her family does dog fostering and, in addition, Chris is involved in a long list of projects in Rotary and beyond, including the Rotary MUN planning committee, Interact at OLP High school, mentor for low-income students at a middle school, tutor at San Diego Refugee Tutoring, board member at Malashock Dance and member of the San Diego Diplomacy Council. We're so lucky to have her in our club! For sure, Chris embodies the spirit of Rotary.

Luke Ervin introduced the guests, including, Ron Spilsbury, who has just been approved for membership this week, and UCSD Rotaracts, Carlos, Christian, Kurt, Sam and Brandon.

There were just a few announcements today. Nancy announced that there would be a CSC meeting following today's meeting and that the annual Club Foundation Meeting would be held at next week's meeting.

Alex Monroe reminded everyone of the Saturday morning walk in Encinitas/Solana Beach. It will be a 2 1/2 mile walk ending at the Self-Realization gardens in Encinitas. Afterwards there will be a potluck lunch and fellowship at Alex's house nearby.

Nancy announced that some will be at the San Diego Humane Society's Walk for Animals, also on Saturday morning.

Today's program was a presentation by our Community Service Committee, led by Tim Fronczek. Tim, a new member of our club, did not hesitate to volunteer to take on the role of committee chairman for CSC when the position needed to be filled. When he first joined our club Tim immediately began volunteering for hands-on projects, like the canyon cleanup with Clean San Diego, a beach clean-up with Surfers Unite and, most recently, boxing food at Feeding San Diego. He encouraged others to participate in CSC projects, saying that there's nothing that warms your heart more than looking at all the things that can be done to help the community and all you have to do is put in a couple hours on the weekend. CSC meets the first Friday of each month immediately after our regular club meeting. Tim plans to be working toward more hands-on projects in the coming

vear.

Somehow many of the CSC committee members were unable to make today's meeting but, Tim wowed us with a slide presentation of the CSC members and projects that they have been doing.

Jim Davies talked to us about YMCA TIDES project. CSC has been involved with the YMCA Oz program for years. It started with house repairs then expanded to buying holiday gifts and decorating the house. During Covid we couldn't continue so we got involved with the YMCA TIDES program which supports underprivileged families. We provided food, gifts, books, games at a dinner for the families. The OZ program may start up again as renovations are being made to the home.

Jim Davies also spoke about the most recent Police project. This project has been one of the most challenging but most rewarding projects we've had. The project was to renovate the 34 year old North Eastern Division San Diego Police Department. The David C. Copley Foundation has been instrumental in providing funding and the ability for this project to happen. There were lots of people and groups involved and the work had to be phased, logistics had to be planned and expenditures had to be tracked. The project included replacing kitchen cabinets, new microwaves, electrical work, flooring, carpets, painting, lounge furnishings, locker room flooring and benches, computers, monitors, retractable awning, power washing outside, and more. The estimated donated value of this project is \$331,500, including merchandise, labor and hard funds. Jim gave kudos to Jim Frost, Tony Grillo, Rick Clark, Kevin Carlson, for the many hours they spent and to the many others that made this happen. Jim, you're a huge asset to this club.

Sharia's Closet, introduced to CSC by Fary Moini, has been helping lower income families with emergency clothing and household essentials. Our club has been donating clothes, diapers, and toiletries to this organization.

San Diego Oasis, has been serving seniors with classes, community engagement and wellness programs. David Chong had recently invited Tim for lunch at the SD Oasis Center in Grossmont which included beer tasting and a tour. The best part was that Tim later took his dad for a visit and his dad is interested in participating. The new SD Oasis expansion in Rancho Bernardo is set for a grand opening on June 24 at 10 AM.

Ellen Bryson spoke about the Easter Basket project which began for us in 2011 with 30 baskets made for women and children staying at the Door of Hope. The Door of Hope opened about 50 years ago as a home for unwed mothers and has evolved to house women with domestic violence and now homeless, and, for the first year, fathers are included. Each year the number of baskets made has

increased. This year we made 185 baskets.

Our involvement with Ronald McDonaldhouse, a place where parents of hospitalized children can stay, began with Frank McGrath. We provide the cost for food for a meal which we prepare, serve to the families and cleanup. Jim Davies spoke about his experience this year. Steve Balch added about his experience there peeling carrots, chopping broccoli and washing dishes.

Linda Andrews talked about the San Diego Literacy project which started 10 years ago when Jose Cruz from the San Diego Council of Literacy talked to our club about the impact and statistics of illiteracy. She started a project of collecting gently used books from club members. The next year CSC provided money to buy books. She buys the books from the libraries in North County with stores of donated books. so the funds also help the library outreach programs. This year we're on target to donate about 1400 books which are stored in her garage. Each book is stamped inside with our Club name. This year we've also given books to the TIDES program, to Ronald McDonaldhouse families during our dinner project there, to a 2nd grade teacher of special needs children, to the Boys and Girls Club, and we added books to Christmas baskets.

Other CSC projects mentioned were The Uptown Community Center mail room, Holiday Baskets, VA Hospital visitation, therapeutic horsemanship, bagging cat food for the Humane Society, a Rotaract project for Feeding America, filling backpacks for Boys and Girls Club, Wreaths Across America, Ronald McDonaldhouse Red Shoe Day.

President Nancy ended the meeting with a tune to guess...Simon & Garfunkel's, Mrs. Robinson, and a quote, appropriate for today's meeting theme, "You get a lot more out of life when you give service than when you get service".
