We're also allowed to have a membership tent at the Festival. President Emidio explained that this event was started by the Kiwanians when he was a member. He left that club and joined our so the Kiwanis are now defunct but the Festivals goes on.

Did you notice: **Brett** is still calling people Buddy?

PDG and today's Speaker, **Wade Nomura**, acknowledged **Brett** for joining him and others on the annual Rose Parade Float committee and **Steve Brown** for his accomplishments with global grants and helping to make the world a better place.

Wade's book started as an autobiography but he changed the mission of the book to living a life of service: Wade is Japanese American and his grandparents immigrated in the 1890s. He spoke solely in Japanese as a child. He is the first-born son of the first-born son so was destined to lead the family/clan. He spent a lot of time with his grandfather who taught him many life lessons.

In **Wade's** Kindergarten there were 25 students and only one minority— him. He said he was treated differently sometimes because of ancestry/ cultural—the food he ate was. He spoke Japanese fluently but had limited English so didn't communicate well. He was provided Speech therapy in school so he could speak more English. But he was always the last person picked in sports: short, slow, fat kid-not good athlete. He was never invited to friends' houses because their parents wouldn't allow a Japanese kid in the house. Things changed in Junior HS: he grew 6 inches in 3 months and became a supper star. His confidence grew because he was now the first picked. His 7th grade teacher assigned him to detention for a week because she thought he was lying: he shared that his family was interned in a concentration camp in AZ. She insisted those camps never happened. He asked his father why this wasn't taught to his teacher and others: because it happened to only a small group of people—around 120,000.

His grandfather managed the gardens of the Montecitio home of the president of Olympics. Grandfather said: turn around and what do you see? An immaculate and impeccable garden. Then he told **Wade** to always leave the place better than when you found it. A good lesson for us all.

Many more stores to tell: went into Japanese design after college, including at low housing projects; helped young boys who kept getting kicked out of school, helped them get started in BMX racing then he became a Grand National Champion. When he raced he broke parts of his body and learned that the older he got the more difficult it was to heal. He was inducted into the Japanese Athelete Hall of Fame and attributes his success to his wife, kids, and family who sacrificed so he could follow his dream.

He has been re-elected as the mayor of Carpenteria, CA, each time with a greater percentage of votes. He feels this is because he has high ethical standard, is a hard-working volunteer and a Rotarian.

He continues to do volunteer work because he feels you have to enjoy and invest in your own paradise and people. He is committed to working through Rotary to help other people.

His story prompted many questions and comments about prejudice or discrimination and America's current attitude of divisiveness.

Wade believes that a partial solution to the problem is to include people that have NOT been discriminated against so that all will learn. Change must be systematic and deliberate. The division story has gone too far.

EMIDIO TOOK CONTROL: thanked our speaker. Next week the speaker will be Steve Pultz of USD. Linda Andrews will be ROTD. And he left us with something to think about. Confucius says: it doesn't matter how slowly you go, as long as you don't stop.
