THE MARVELOUS WORLD OF UNINTENDED CONSEQUENCES WOMEN, WORK AND COVID

Pre-COVID, asking your boss if you could work from home a few days per month was nearly anathema, particularly if you were a woman. And if you tried to improve your work-life balance with your children, you risked getting demoted from the fast track or perceived as not being all in for the team.

Now the same bosses are delighted to have you work from home, hoping that you don't just decide to tell them to take their job and keep it. Freedom and optionality, thy name is COVID - along with a vaccine, a mask and Zoom and potential burn-out. And she may still tell you to take your job, because she found a better or a different one or she decides to start her own business — and so the story goes.

The shoe is on the other foot, and employers will have to adapt to a new workplace if they want to succeed.

Barbara Bry is a tech entrepreneur who served four years on the San Diego City Council representing District 1, which is home to Golden Triangle Rotary. Barbara was the vice president of marketing in the early days of Proflowers.com. She is the founder of Athena San Diego for women in the tech and biotech industries and the Workplace Equity & Civility Initiative which she started to address sexual harassment and pay equity issues. Currently, she is chief operating officer for Blackbird Ventures that invests in early stage companies, and she and her husband Neil Senturia write a weekly column on entrepreneurship for the San Diego Union-Tribune. Their blended family includes four adult children all married to people they adore, and seven grandchildren.

The Bardin Family in California dates to the mid-1850s when my great grandfather traveled by wagon train across the Oregon and California Emigrant Trails eventually settling in Salinas. My mother is also part of a family that dates back to the 1880s in the San Francisco area. I grew up in Berkeley. My wife Arlene (retired registered nurse) and I met in San Francisco in 1965 and we will celebrate our 55th anniversary later this month. We moved to San Diego in 1969 and raised our family here. Today, each of our two daughters and their husbands (one pair - Stanford graduates, the other pair - UCLA graduates) live in the Silicon Valley (Los Altos and San Carlos), one granddaughter graduated last year from the University of Colorado at Boulder, a second granddaughter is a senior and their brother is a sophomore at U. of Colorado.
