President Christy White Brook kicked off the meeting promptly at 7:30 am, introducing Rotarian of the Day Erik Mjoen who shared this reflection from Marie Curie:

You must rejoice in life every day; don't wait until the moment has passed you by before acknowledging what a good time it really was! Don't pin your hopes on the happiness of days to come. The older one gets, the more one realizes that the ability to savor the moment is a state of grace, a glorious gift.

It's been a year-and-a-half since we've had Erik at the podium and his life has been a true whirlwind:

- The data science department at UCSD where Erik has worked for four years the Halicioğlu Data Science Institute celebrated its fifth anniversary by moving into a new building on the UCSD campus. The HDSI now boasts 1000+ undergrad students, 300+ graduate students and 30 faculty members lured away from other prestigious institutions such as MIT, Columbia, Stanford and Cal (thanks **Rich Papike!**)
- Erik and his family are just back from Norway and Ireland, where they celebrated his father-in-law's 80th birthday
- He now has two girls at Mission Bay High – one with a driver's license! They have been involved in many Rotary projects including beach clean-ups, Model UN, etc. (FUTURE ROTARIANS!)
- The family travels regularly all over the country for the girls' sports:
- ➤ His oldest daughter, Linnea, is hoping to go D1 for field hockey.
- ➤ His youngest, Elise, is a competitive rock climber (she climbs 20 hours per week!)
- Erik bought the house next door to his and completely remodeled it for his mom and step-dad. Wow, that's a lot!

last week, thank God!"

- Ron Kohl announced the Larry & Jill Lundsberg, Rotary International Trustee, was on his most recent cruise and that he has secured Rotary International president Barry Rassin & wife Esther for the next cruise in Oct 2024
- Stephen Tako announced that the Motivated to Act multicultural pre-dance party was a success and thanked Brett for helping with AV ... High 10
- I apologize, I missed the final High 5!

President Christy "mugged" Linda Andrews for finding club flags for Stephen Tako and Michael McQuary who are traveling soon to Ireland, and also Eric Freeberg for his work on the by-laws (and the other zillion things he does for the club)

Sandi Rimer presented some interesting Rotary facts and highlighted 3 key milestones for life and/or Rotary: (1) pay day, (2) growing together and (3) results. Sandi also acknowledged some of the long-timers in our club, including Marty Rosenstein, who has been a Rotarian for 48 years! Sandi left us with the thought: Rotary has worked on being kind to other people – let's work on that!

Stephen Tako, who serves on Youth Services and the Peace Committee, announced that Peace Committee volunteers will take the podium once a month to provide one pillar of peace. His one pillar of peace was a well-functioning government, which many countries – including our own – are struggling with. He concluded: "thank you for what you're doing to provide peace in the world."

Ron Kohl announced hotel room pricing for the Oct. 7-8 Ensenada work project. \$220/1 person, \$280/2 people, etc.

Eric Freeberg introduced our speaker Greg Anglea, CEO of Interfaith Community Services and host of the Homeless in San Diego podcast. And a member of Escondido Rotary. Greg thanked the club for the PB&J sandwiches that we contributed last week (approx. 200). His goal was to talk about fear mongering around the homeless issue and arm us with information as we address the issue. He encouraged us to think about the individuals that are being helped.

Thanks to public/private partnerships, his organization has purchased a 77-room, formerly blighted hotel in Escondido and rebuilt it as a posthospitalization recuperative care center. He noted that when people end up homeless, they typically become very medically fragile. He said that San Diego is the only city in California that grew last year more people are coming to San Diego which is creating a tremendous housing issue. Today's average rent is \$2500, as compared to \$1000/month average rent in 2000. Homelessness is a housing problem due to the (1) high cost of housing, and (2) low availability for rental housing. Contrary to what a lot of people believe, he said that 80% of homeless people in San Diego became homeless here – they aren't coming from outside our community. "These are our neighbors who have become homeless."

Addressing the camping ban, Greg said he doesn't support it because we're not providing safe, healing place for people to go as an alternative. He said that seniors are the fastest growing age demographic becoming homeless, while the number of homeless veterans has decreased (from 30% to 10-14% range).

President Christy closed the meeting with this quote: "There is no exercise better for the heart than reaching out and lifting people up."

Stephen Tako is a Senior Advisor on Childhood Bullying with the Child Safety Network®. Being a member of the Society of Children's Book Writers & Illustrators, he has authored several anti-bullying-themed books for adults and children. As a member of the Screen Actors Guild (SAG-AFTRA), he has produced, directed, cast, and performed in films and public service announcements focusing on youth issues such as bullying, discrimination, neglect and suicide.

One of Stephen's most ambitious projects is the development of Motivated To Act, a 501(c)3 organization dedicated to providing preventative measures to combat bullying and discrimination against children. Through the Confident Life™ program, his organization provides services to schools and other youth organizations through the use of lesson plans, music, and storytelling.

Stephen created an award-winning series of multicultural books and films based on the character Junga the Dancing Yeti®. This fictional character experiences bullying and discrimination mostly because of his appearance. Children ages 4-8 learn important life-lessons so critical for their age group regarding empathy, inclusion, overcoming age-appropriate adversity and other related issues. His third book in this series also includes fair play (sportsmanship) as part of the lessons children learn and the film adaptation features five former NFL players.

He lives in San Diego with his fiance', Marzena, and they have three adult children. He has worked with Bank of America for 12 years, mostly as a lending officer and has been a Rotarian for 2.5 years.
