Jose L. Cruz the Chief
Executive Officer at the San
Diego Council of Literacy
was the speaker of the
day. He is part of the Lions
Club and a recipient of

the 2003 Union Tribune Educator of the Year Award. He also does a podcast called Gapminders where he discusses the ever-widening gaps in San Diego. He has over 38 years of working with literacy. Since COVID, he and the council have given away 350 thousand books to children. He believes that reading is a national assessment of progress. He then displayed some footage about the literacy crisis in San Diego and America, called The Truth About Reading. He also mentioned that 43 million Americans are functionally illiterate.

Much of the curriculum in schools is designed to help kids pretend they can read without actually being able to, but we can change this by giving them books they can read at a beginner level. San Diego is home to over 90 unique languages yet many are not reading at a proficient level.

Stephen Tako donated several books to Jose for the cause.

Jose then was properly "mugged" by Christy and a donation to Just in Time was made.

Sandi Rimer's life has been on a circuitous route for a verrrrry long time to this final

Attended Cal Poly in Pomona in 1962 and was one of 3 freshman women students in the engineering school. There were a total of 6 women students out of 1000 in engineering. There were 1000 students in agriculture related fields, and an additional 1000 in all other disciplines. Out of 3000 students only 300 were women, 50% of student body were married and average age was 35.

Spent a short stent living in Kansas and attending KU, majoring in architecture and engineering. Otherwise always a California girl. San Diego has been home since 1978.

Went parasailing above Acapulco bay in 1968, bottom of Grand Canyon on the back of a mule in August 1970, 9 weeks in Europe when her son was an infant, top of the

bridge over Sidney Australia with son Jon when he

reached adulthood.



Her son is 6' 1", acts like her, talks like her, same sense of humor, a leader in his sphere, refuses to join Rotary. Sandi adopted Jon when he was an infant and he was raised as an only child. Learned in the last year that his biological parents created and somewhat raised 17. Be careful of 23 and Me. Sometimes you learn too much.

Started Rotary December 10, 1988 in the Escondido club, president in 1995-96, many club and international assignments, governor in 2004-2005, transferred to LJGTRC December 10 2005.
