THE POWER OF ARIGATO

Meet Mitsuhiro (Hiro) Iwamoto, a man who has turned adversity into inspiration. In 1966, he was born on Kyushu island, Japan. Hiro faced a challenging path when he lost his sight at the age of 13, becoming totally blind by 16.

Struggling to cope, he once contemplated ending his life, but a message from his uncle in heaven changed everything he realized his blindness could inspire others. Embracing life with newfound vigor, Hiro took on various exciting pursuits, from sailing to climbing Mt Fuji.

Moving to San Diego in 2006, Hiro set his sights on sailing across the vast Pacific Ocean. In 2013, his first attempt ended in a whale collision, sinking his boat. Despite this setback, he refused to give up. Battling depression and criticism, he soon found strength in making his dreams even bigger.

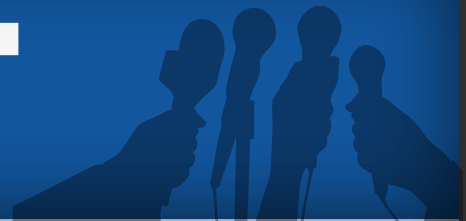
He found a sailing partner in Douglas Smith, and together, they embarked on his second Pacific crossing. On April 20th, 2019, after 55 days of adventure, Hiro achieved an incredible milestone, becoming the first totally blind sailor to cross the Pacific.

His remarkable journey earned him prestigious awards, including the Japanese Prime Minister's Award. Today, Hiro is a motivational speaker, inspiring audiences at companies, organizations, and schools.

well as trip to Ensenada work project. **Linda Andrews** is collecting children's books, 2 per member please. **Brett** needs volunteers for multiple surfer projects.

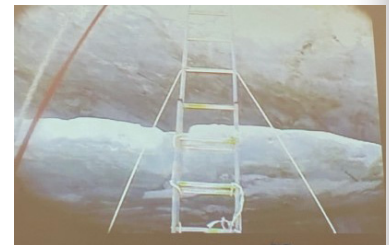

FATHER WAYNE SANDERS

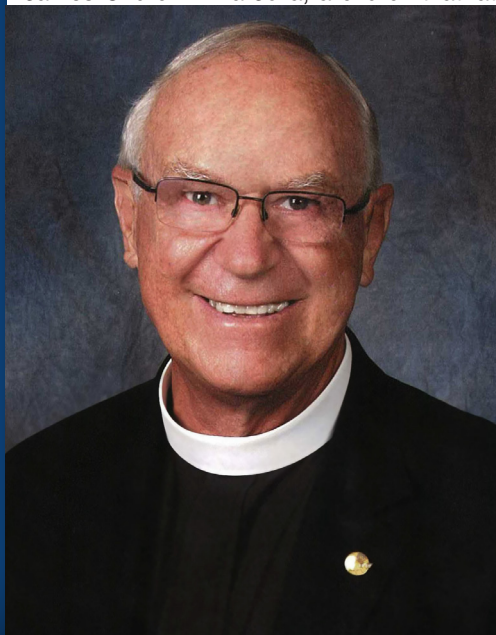
Wayne Francis Sanders, born in 1940 in Chicago, had a deeply religious upbringing in a devout Catholic family. Raised near Wrigley Field, Wayne's early life was marked by his service as an altar boy and his enthusiasm for volunteering in various church capacities. His education at Quigley Preparatory Seminary in Chicago introduced him to the study of Latin and Greek, essential for his future in the priesthood.

After his ordination as a priest, Wayne served at St. Gabriel's Parish on the South Side of Chicago. It was during this period that he crossed paths with a young teenager named Kathleen Bracken, who would later become a significant part of his life.

Wayne's journey took an unexpected turn when he joined the Navy as a chaplain. This experience exposed him to a broader spectrum of beliefs and led him to explore the Episcopal Church. In 1974, he made the decision to transition to the Episcopal faith, and he and Kathleen were married in the chapel of All Saints Episcopal Church in San Diego.

Before his appointment as clergy at All Saints, Wayne had a brief stint as a San Diego taxi driver. In addition to his role as assistant clergy, he became the headmaster of All Saints school. He and Kathleen welcomed two children, Joy Ann and Sean Wayne, into their family during this time.

As the Diocese of San Diego expanded, Wayne was called to lead the mission of Saint James Church in La Jolla, a church that later became known as Good Samaritan. Under his leadership, the church experienced significant growth and development.



Throughout his life, Wayne actively participated in various organizations and outreach efforts, including the Ecumenical Council of San Diego, Episcopal Community Services, and many more. After retiring from Good Samaritan, Wayne continued his ministry as the Canon of Ecumenical and Inter-religious Affairs.

Today, Wayne remains active in ministry, performing baptisms, weddings, and funeral ceremonies. He enjoys spending quality time with his grandchildren and continues to share his love of music and faith. His life journey exemplifies a profound commitment to faith, service, and the pursuit of his spiritual calling.
