District Governor's Monthly Message



In Rotary, September is observed as Basic Education and Literacy month. Literacy is critical to the economic development of a country, and is also essential for human dignity, and individual growth and well-being. In our district we enjoy high rates of literacy by any standards. In many, if not all, of our countries there is universal comprehensive education, and access to education at the primary and secondary levels is seen as a basic human right. The proportion of our population that is exposed to tertiary-level education also continues to grow.

Notwithstanding, there exists pockets of illiteracy, primarily in some rural communities, and even in urban areas there is some adult functional illiteracy. We cannot forget this segment of our citizenry, or allow them to fall through the cracks.

Further, there are many who possess the basic ability to read and write, but suffer from forms of learning disabilities, eg dyslexia. While, we have become better in recent years in diagnosing these conditions, we are a long way from making the necessary adjustments to create an enabling environment within our school systems to ensure such person could reach their full academic potential alongside their peers.

This month presents an ideal opportunity for us, as Rotarians, to bring some focus on these groups and to advocate for, and assist in developing, programs aimed at ameliorating their situation.

During this month, we must also continue to support our brothers and sisters in The Bahamas, in the aftermath of Hurricane Dorian. The scale of the disaster in the Bahamian islands that bore the brunt of the storm is nothing short of cataclysmic, and the required relief, recovery and rebuilding efforts are staggering. I am heartened by the outpouring of support expressed by Rotarians in our District, and some clubs have already contributed, or have committed to contribute, sorely needed funds.

I implore those clubs that have not yet responded, to do so at the earliest opportunity. I also encourage clubs not to merely look inward at its own or its members' resources, but to seek to facilitate the wider participation of the general public through specific cause-related fundraisers, such as telethons. Our fellowmen in The Bahamas are in critical need of our assistance and support at this time.

Rotarian rides again

This was not the first time Velarde, a board member of the Rotarian Action Group for Diabetes, had cycled to a convention. "I thought I could create awareness by riding to conventions," says Velarde, who was diagnosed with type 1 diabetes when he was 29. He biked from Busan to Seoul, Korea, in 2016, from Chicago to Atlanta in 2017, and from Rotary headquarters in Evanston, Illinois, to Toronto in 2018. This year, the journey had added meaning; Velarde dedicated this ride to his son Davis Edwin Velarde, who died at 22 of lymphoma in April.

Diabetes is a chronic illness that occurs either when the pancreas does not produce insulin (type 1) or when the body cannot effectively use insulin (type 2). When diabetes is not controlled, it can result in severe damage to the eyes, kidneys, and nerves and can double a person's risk of heart attack and stroke. The World Health Organization estimates that the number of people with diabetes rose from 108 million in 1980 to 422 million in 2014.

Several years ago, when Velarde was feeling fatigued and depressed about his illness, a friend gave him a bike. He took it out for a spin. "That ride woke me up to the fact that I was not fit," he recalls. "I realized I wanted to become a cyclist, and not just someone who rides a bike."

Velarde's goal is to rally support among Rotarians to find a cure for diabetes, and to spread the word that a healthy lifestyle can help people who have type 2 diabetes better control the illness.

Over US\$80,000 Pledged To Hurricane Dorian Relief Efforts – Report 1

Hurricane Dorian is said to be the strongest hurricane ever to hit the Bahamas and the joint strongest to ever hit land in the Atlantic. According to the International Red Cross, 45% of homes on Grand Bahama and the Abaco – roughly 13,000 properties, have been severely damaged and destroyed, and the United Nations has predicted that 60,000 people will need food and clean water. Rotarians around the district and across the region immediately began discussing ways to help those affected.

DG Trevor proposed a US\$10,000 cash response from the District Disaster Funds. He also encouraged clubs individually or in their clusters to support the response with their own cash contributions to the Bahamian Rotary Disaster Relief bank account. District Disaster Chair PDG Stephen Ramroop also stressed to his team that “cash is now required for cleaning up the debris and battered homes and washing off the dirt and leaves from homes”. Former president of Rotary International, Barry Rassin, also shared the same view “Cash is king. For us to rebuild these communities, we need funds,” he tells NPR’s Jason Beaubien.

At 16 September 2019, six clubs in the district have already wired funds totaling US\$11,730 to the relief fund. An additional twenty-seven clubs have also pledged US\$71,189 to the fund, which should be sent shortly. To date, three weeks after Hurricane Dorian hit the Bahamas, clubs in the District have donated or pledged US\$82,919, and the efforts still continue. Forty clubs are still to report their contributions.

Clubs have contributed/pledged funds from their disaster relief accounts and collected donations from their members. Some have held, or plan to hold, radiothons, telethons, and are partnering with local businesses to raise funds towards the cause. Clubs and members are encouraged to send their contributions directly to the Relief Funds, and reported to the District. The account details are listed below.

Let us support our brothers and sisters in our neighbouring district in their hour of need.

Rotary Disaster Response Grants

Did you know that The Rotary Foundation supports disaster relief and recovery efforts through grants from the Rotary Disaster Response Fund? Here’s some useful information from RI to note:

What Rotary disaster response grants support

- Districts that have been affected by natural disasters can use Rotary disaster response grants to launch their own projects or work with established relief organizations to help their communities recover.
- Grant funds can be used to provide basic items such as water, food, medicine, and clothing. Districts should work closely with local officials and groups to ensure that the funding will meet a specific community need.
- The Rotary Foundation also offers funding to support long-term disaster recovery efforts through global grants.

Who can apply for a disaster response grant?

- Once qualified for Rotary grants, districts in an affected area or country may apply for a maximum grant of \$25,000, based on the availability of funds.
- A district may apply for subsequent grants after it successfully reports outcomes from previous grants.

How to apply?

- The district governor and district Rotary Foundation chair complete the Rotary Disaster Response Grant Application and send it to grants@rotary.org.

DG Visits in August – Saint Lucia

St Lucia had the honor to be the first overseas country visited by the District Governor as part of his official tour of District 7030. Although the visit was early and the notice was short, the clubs in St Lucia rolled out the red carpet and welcomed the DG with great enthusiasm.

On Sunday, the DG met with Rotarians from all clubs for the distribution of a few wheelchairs in the North of the island. This was a small part of a major joint wheelchair project which was undertaken by all of the Rotary clubs. The Distribution was well attended and exposed us all to some amazing recipients. Following the event, a few Rotarians had lunch with the DG at a local restaurant in Gros Islet, in the North of the Island.

The first meeting on Monday 05 August was with the Minister for Social Justice and Equity Mr. Lenard Montoute, who was extremely interested in Rotary's plans for the year. The DG 'pinned' the Minister in appreciation for his commitment to assist in Rotary's efforts for the year.

AG Charlie and the Presidents from the Rotary Club of St Lucia and the Rotary club of Gros Islet were all active participants at this meeting. Immediately following this meeting the DG met with a few members of the Board of RCSL for a few minutes to get some insight into their plans as well as to give some ideas on areas of focus.

On Tuesday, 06 August, the DG met with the entire Board of RCGI, who presented a comprehensive plan for the year along with a generous budget. The DG offered a few pointers and reminded them all of the goals on which to focus for this year. A joint lunch with all Rotary, Satellite and Rotaract clubs at the Sandals Golf and Country Club followed the Gros Islet Board meeting, where the hosts, Gros Islet club, presented a speaker to explain one of their major projects. Both Rotary club Presidents thanked the DG for his visit and committed their members to the Rotary ideals.

These presentations were followed by the DG, who addressed the well-attended lunch, inspiring the members to dig deeper to achieve the Rotary goals and make connections. A short fellowship followed immediately. Later that afternoon, the DG met with Rotaractors, and that evening a few Rotarians, including DGE Lisle, hosted the DG at a local entertainment venue. The DG left very early the next morning.

- ✓ Fundashon Prevencion (Curacao) recipient of a 3D mammograph for which a Global Grant was received from TRF.

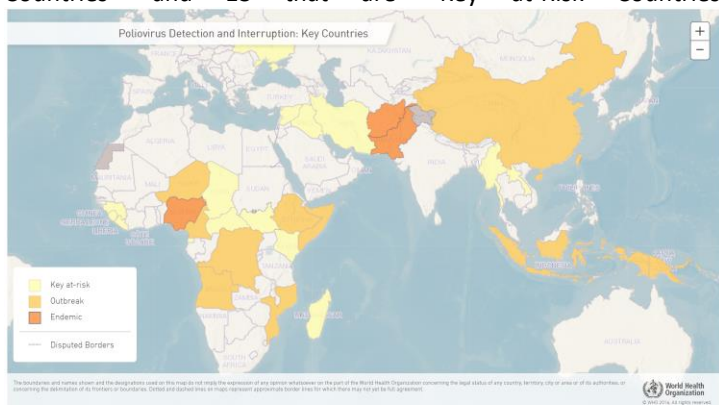


Project Update: Polio Plus



3 ENDEMIC COUNTRIES
14 OUTBREAK COUNTRIES
13 KEY AT-RISK COUNTRIES

Polio remains endemic in three countries Afghanistan, Nigeria and Pakistan. Until poliovirus transmission is interrupted in these countries, all countries remain at risk of importation of polio, especially vulnerable countries with weak public health and immunization services and travel or trade links to endemic countries. Did you know there are 14 countries that are “Outbreak Countries” and 13 that are “Key at-Risk Countries”



The boundaries and names shown and the designations used on this map to indicate the expression of any opinion whatsoever on the part of the World Health Organization concerning the legal status of any country, territory, city or area or of its authorities, or concerning the delimitation of its frontiers or boundaries. Dotted and dashed lines on maps represent approximate border lines for which there may not yet be full agreement.

World Health Organization
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Key at-risk: no longer poliovirus-infected, but at high risk of outbreaks.
Outbreak: has stopped indigenous WPV circulation but affected by outbreak of imported WPV or circulating vaccine-derived poliovirus
Endemic: has never stopped indigenous wild poliovirus (WPV) circulation

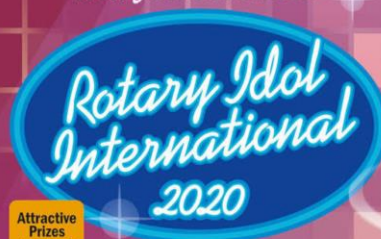
