



The Melbourne Pollinator Corridor by Peter Berg

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What is it? The MPC will be a wildlife corridor stretching about 8km from Westgate Park to the Royal Botanic Gardens. It will connect people to people, people to nature and nature to nature. This corridor will be made up of at least 80 gardens and will create biodiversity through gardens built with local energy and positivity- a win for humans and nature in an extremely urbanised area.

For wildlife, this corridor will provide desperately needed habitat for native pollinators not only between these larger green patches but many other smaller green spaces in between. It will help create stronger genetic diversity in our fauna and flora, increased habitat and nesting sites and the ability for nature to move more freely.

This is a project that benefits all humans big and small rich and poor as these indigenous gardens are accessible at all times right along the footpaths. For all locals, it will be a vital opportunity to create community cohesion, an increased sense of place and connection to earth, an awareness of local biodiversity and pride in joyful, positively locally created gardens. This corridor will help fight climate change and create a more robust earth- helping with major urban challenges such as the heat island effect and water retention issues.

The MPC will run about 8 kms through 5 suburbs- Melbourne, Southbank, South Melbourne, Albert Park, Port Melbourne and surrounding areas. The exact map is being worked out at the moment. But the light rail- Turner Reserve- will be used and at this point, Bank St looks like a great street to work down. Holly Kirk- urban spatial ecologist - has been consulted and is advising along the way

There are 2 Councils involved- City of Melbourne and City of Port Philip. The maintenance of the areas being used are the responsibility of the residents/business owners (local Nature Strip Guidelines to be followed) and using undernourished and undermaintained nature strips outside resident's homes and businesses.

All the gardens will be created within local Nature Strip Guidelines.

Active environmentalist, Emma Cutting, who is the inspiration behind the project has already developed a prototype of what is being proposed. This follows the creation of the local community Heart Gardening Project in the streets of South Melbourne which is Australia's first public nature strip street garden designed and dedicated to encouraging a flourishing honey bee and native bee habitat so crucial to biodiversity, food security and sustainability.

As part of promoting The Melbourne Pollinator Corridor project there will be a field visit to the South Melbourne neighbourhood gardens at 11am on Sunday 30th May to see what has been achieved.

This will be the subject of an ABC Gardening Australia segment on 11 June 2021.

Emma Cutting will give an address and a personalised walking tour of her urban street garden project. The cost is \$21.00 for catering by STREAT providing catering training for disadvantaged youth.

After several years of lobbying and representations to the United Nations, the beautiful small European country of Slovenia in 2017 succeeded in having May 20th proclaimed as World Bee Day. This year is the fourth year where this celebration is occurring throughout the world and it has gone from strength to strength with many events being held on the day and in the week of WBD.



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The purpose of this recognition and these celebrations is to raise awareness of bees and their importance (along with other pollinators) to our bio-diversity and food chain. Shipping goods has become more challenging. Shipping is slowing down and ports are being bi-passed. Our standard booking time was 1-2 weeks to get space on a ship, it's now 1-2 months. This has also affected the availability of containers. There is a world shortage of available containers and the purchase cost has risen considerably.

We have seven containers ready to be shipped when we can get a booking, plus five planned which can only be actioned when we clear some space. We also shipped ten pallets of Covid19 medical supplies to Brisbane DIK for PNG.

There has be a significant change in destinations in the last few years. Local African supporter groups have discovered our Store and the opportunities we provide to help their countries. They fund the shipping cost and often have a partnership with Rotary Clubs. Many Rotary Clubs are becoming focused on local projects. Most notably there has been a major reduction in support for countries in our Zone.

Fundraising opportunities for our Clubs have been significantly affected by Covid19 and we will be feeling the effects of this for some time yet.

There are two other significant changes. **The seventh Area of Focus "Supporting the Environment**" will become active next year with grants available for activities in this area. DIK is a recycling operation and we will be increasing the promotion of this aspect of our operation. It will not affect how we operate, only how we tell our story and we need your help to get the message out.

The Environmental Sustainability Rotary Action Group is becoming active in our Zone <u>www.esraganzpi.org</u> It's a new group with a lot of enthusiasm and lots of raw edges. We need to see this as a promotional opportunity, not a group trying to steal our glory. Any increase in awareness and support for the Store has to be a positive.

All Rotary Clubs will have the challenge raising funds and it is very important that our Club Members understand how effective their support for our Store is. It may be time for a DIK Guest Speaker at your Club.

Promotion we have a new video which you will see has not been scripted, but it provides a good understanding of the size of our Store. A version will be shown at the D9800 Conference. We will also have a stand at the Conference. The following day ESRAG will be featured and this also features our Store.

Our standard handouts have been updated and we continue to promote on our Facebook page.

We are also sending the DIK Inc Clubs items that could be included in you Club Bulletins or on your Facebook pages.

Help for East Timor:

Donations in Kind were offered 125 pallets, yes 125 pallets of hand sanitiser by a wholesaler here in Melbourne. In the roundabout way that these things happen, we learn that the Department of Health in Timor are desperate for these supplies due to the situation with Covid there and the fears that it will get particularly bad in the refugee camps where there are some 8000 people displaced after over 5800 houses were washed away.

We at DiK can put the necessary logistics in place to ship a 40ft container of this sanitiser to Timor but we need the funds to do it. We simply don't have the \$11,000 it will cost to get it there. I am not sure what the financials of your Club are right now but are there some funds available as you approach the end of the Rotary Year that could be applied to the shipping cost of the container. 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Project W – Water for Education

Imagine attending school in the tropics with no drinking water available. For many rural schools in Cambodia, this is the reality and the students have to bring their own water.

For four high schools in Siem Reap Province, this is the situation and the 2250 students leave 40,000 plastic bottles annually, creating a major waste issue.

The solution is to install SkyHydrant water filtration systems purchased from Disaster Aid Australia and installed by local contractors. Each school has reliable electricity and access to a water supply.

Some of the infrastructure is in place and the project will utilise existing water tanks, water tank towers and hand-washing troughs. RC Keilor East is very grateful for Rotary Foundation Grant to help with the funding.



The end result of the project will see each school with a plentiful supply of clean water for the students and local villages. It will also eliminate the need to dispose of water in plastic bottles at the schools forever.
