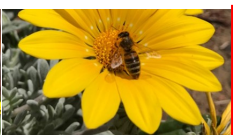
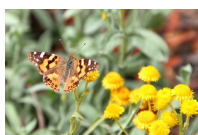


Powerful Pollinators - A Planting Guide for Melbourne

As a Centenary project District 9800 worked with the WHEEN Bee Foundation to develop a Planting Guide for urban Melbourne to help Rotarians *Colour Your World* with flowering plants and support our pollinators.

This guide is available free to download and use to help you select plants suitable for your area, and ones that can support pollinators throughout the year. **So get going.** Select an area, [download the guide](#) and take action.

Across Victoria the recent catastrophic fires had a significant impact on the habitat of all forms of wildlife, including birds, bees and other pollinators. These fires and the loss of habitat will increase the rate of decline of pollinators that are so important for our world.

Did you know?
An estimated *one third* of our food is pollination dependent.



But is it any better in our cities where living density is increasing, houses are larger and sub-division blocks are smaller. These are all contributing to the loss of gardens. During COVID-19 lockdowns we all noticed how important gardens, parks and open space were for us as well as for pollinators – but don't forget they need appropriate flowering habitat. Many of our gardens, nature strips, parks, and open spaces have reverted to grass and there has been a reduction of flowering plants that are essential to support pollinators.

With a little help we can redress this situation.

To support the *Colour your World* program the Wheen Bee Foundation (WBF) were engaged to develop plant selection guides to suit urban Melbourne. Local plants have been selected that offer pollen and nectar to attract birds, insects, bees and other pollinators.

There is a guide for each urban bioregion in Melbourne:

- Suburbs on the western basalt plains,
- Eastern suburbs with sedimentary soils, and
- Those elevated areas to the north and east.

The Guides discuss the role and importance of pollinators, how to encourage them to your garden, and notes on different flower forms. In each Guide there is detailed information about each plant, its height, flower colour, flowering period, appropriate aspect and likely visitation by one of our pollinators.

It is up to you to take action to put flowering plants back into our city.

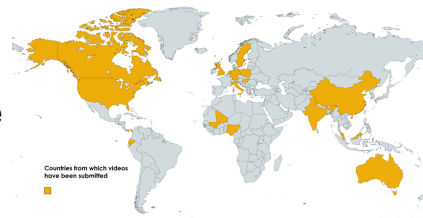

3. **Next generation owner's manual to Global Warming** by the Rotary Club of Sidney by the Sea.
4. **Solar Panels Provide Renewable Energy to Hydroponic Freight Farm** from Twin Cities Rotary Eco Club
5. **Recurring Global Cleanups** with the Rotary Club for Global Action
6. **End Plastic Soup** call to action from the Rotary Clubs of Amsterdam
7. **Trees, Trails, a Nature Centre, Observatory and Planetarium** by the Rotary Club of Guelph.
