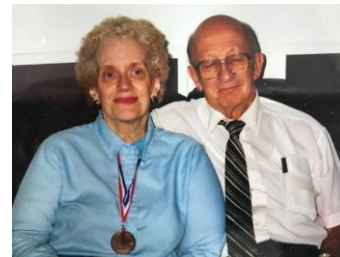

Teacher kept faith at tiny school

Retirement
ending career
in Burr Oak

Burr Oak — Technically, the Burr Oak Lutheran Church School is not a "one-room" school house — it has two tiny rooms at the rear.

But the one big classroom in front takes up about three-fourths of the floor space in the wooden structure, circa 1903, where Daniel Hensel, 67, has spent the last 32 years teaching.

Most likely Hensel is not the last of Wisconsin's one-room schoolhouse teachers. There are probably a few more left. Most probably teach in tiny, rural parochial schools.

After Hensel closes the two big wooden doors to the school, he can't just outside this little northwestern La Crosse County crossroads, another teacher will take over when late August evening's glow cools and trees here and there in the surrounding, cluttered fields show hints of fall color.

An interview with Mr. Hensel, as the students call him, doesn't come easy.

In keeping with the humility of a young Christian faith, Hensel finds it very hard to talk about himself, even when he knows he is talking about those who have

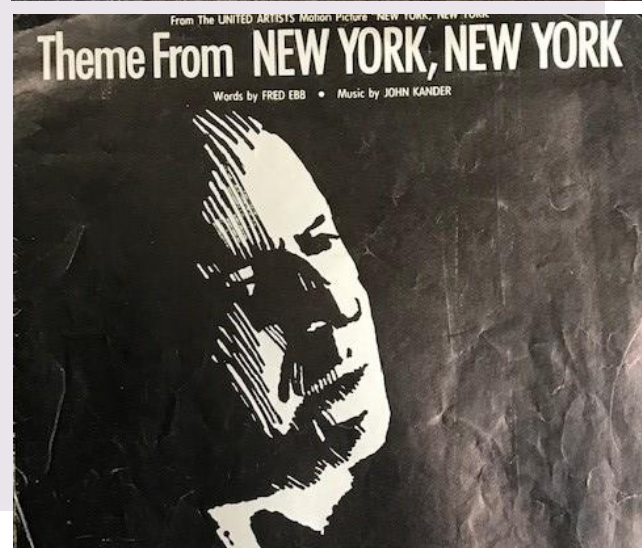
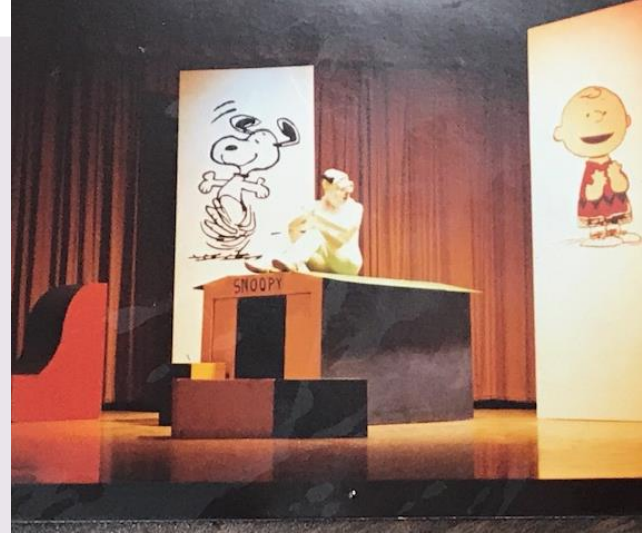

including the current pastor Floyd Brand, who also helps with teaching, and one of Hensel's daughters, Heather Myster, 31, of West Salem, said that the kids learned their basics.

And maybe they learned a little about believing.

"I remember my dad as being very patient," Myster said. "And he was stricter with us than the other kids."

Hensel To Be Guest Soloist With La Crosse Symphony



Mary Beth Hensel, a 1982 graduate of Monroe-Mendota High School, will be guest soloist with the La Crosse Symphony on Saturday, February 15, at 8:00 p.m., the concert being held at the Veterans Fine Arts Center.

She will perform the Mozart C major Oboe Concerto.

A native of Juneau, Minn., she attended the Burn Oak Lutheran Parochial School. At age ten, she began lessons on the oboe with Kathy Huber of Monroe. She later studied privately with Kathy Gomez, principal oboe with the La Crosse Symphony. For five summers, she attended Symphony School of America, where she studied with professionals.

During her high school years, she traveled to Minneapolis, where she was a student of Marilyn Durr. As a college student in New York City, she attended Manhattan School of Music and graduated from the Juilliard School, receiving a Music Performance Degree in 1988. While in New York, she studied with Thomas Stang, who played English Horn, with the New York Philharmonic.

In 1984, she received a full scholarship to the Aspen, Colorado Music Festival. Presently, Mary Beth resides in West Haven with her two daughters, and teaches oboe privately in the La Crosse area.

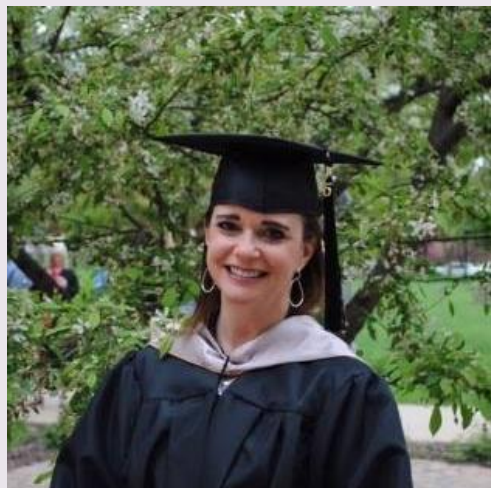
She performs with various musical ensembles, including the La Crosse Choral Union, Hartford Classical Trio, Waterloo College Productions, Winona State University Choral Concerts, and principal oboe position with the La Crosse Symphony.

She is the daughter of Doris and Mary Hensel of Juneau, Minn.

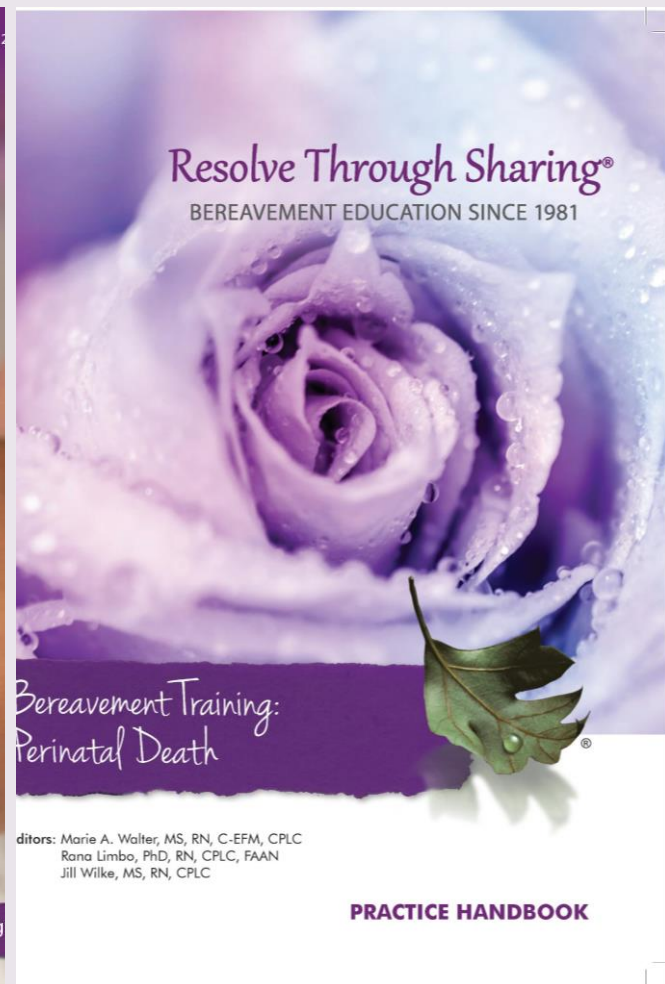

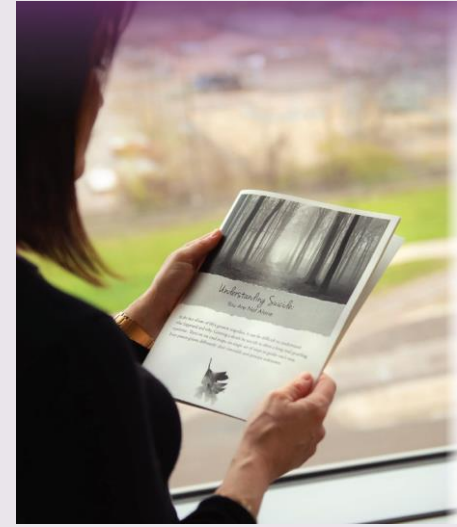

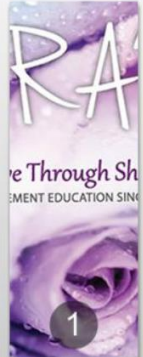
