The Main Event

Julia Wild, Director of Creamos, "From Houses to Homes" spoke via zoom at last Fridays meeting. Creamos is located in Guatemala and one of their main goals is to help families build homes in the very poor neighborhoods of Guatemala.

Some statistics:

More than half of the population is below the national poverty line.

According to the National Policy for Housing and human Settlements, the housing deficit in Guatemala exceeds 1.96 million homes.

Corruption, unemployment, and violence are commonplace, impacting families living in poverty for generations.

Between 56 – 64% of the population lives below the national poverty level or \$2/day.

From Houses to Homes aims to create pathways out of poverty by providing safe housing, education, and health care. Their programs in housing, education and health care have helped thousands of children and adults. Since 2004, From Houses to Homes has continued to work in communities surrounding Antigua, Guatemala.

Many indigenous families live in makeshift homes made of cornstalks, corrugated metal, or cardboard with nothing but dirt floors.

With donations and help from volunteers FHTH builds 13 x 19-foot block homes. They are simple. Yet they change the lives of community members.

The houses are built in five days. A group of volunteers work with a team of loyal construction workers alongside the recipient family. All participate in this hands-on experience.

The houses are made of cement and concrete blocks. All are painted in bright colors selected by the homeowner. Each home has a metal locking door, a skylight and a working window.

On the last day of the home build, an intimate key presentation ceremony takes place in the finished house where the volunteers present the keys to the family.

Like the four-way test that we as Rotarians have, Creamos has their own four "Pillars".

Emotional Support, Accelerated Education, Workforce Training, Social Business.

Julia also talked about the Children/People of the dump in Zone 3 of Guatemala. It is the largest dump in Central America and has 40,000 residents living in the vicinity of the dump. Many of these people make their living by picking through the trash to find recyclable materials that they can sell as scrap and earn approximately \$4 per day.

It is high risk work and a very toxic environment. Safe Passage – Camino Seguro was started by Haney Denning. Safe Passage is a school that the children of the dump attend. Living in this area, you are forgotten by the government and basically don't exist. Hanley pulled thousands of children out of the desperate Guatemala City garbage dump and gave them a Safe Passage. Hanley, a Maine native saw poverty and desperation in its ugliest form, and to turn a blind eye.

In addition to the schools that have been built for the children of the dump, an adult educational program has been started. Its Mission is supporting women and their families in the Guatemala City garbage dump to achieve economic self-determination and create safer and healthier lives. Its vision is A world in which no woman is required to engage in risky work to support her family. We have had numerous speakers from Safe Passage speak to the club in the past. Executive Director Trey Holland has spoken to the club and Illusion who started the adult education program at Safe Passage.

PERSONS WITH DISABILITIES IN THE MASSACHUSETTS LABOR FORCE

As of 2021, there are over 233K individuals in the Massachusetts labor force with a disability.

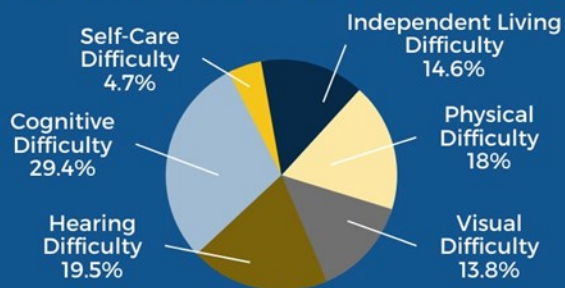


LABOR FORCE PARTICIPATION

The number of people with disabilities in the Massachusetts labor force has increased by **10.2%** from **212,208** in 2019 to **233,785** in 2021.

In 2021, Cognitive Difficulty was the most prevalent disability type among labor force participants at **29.4%**.

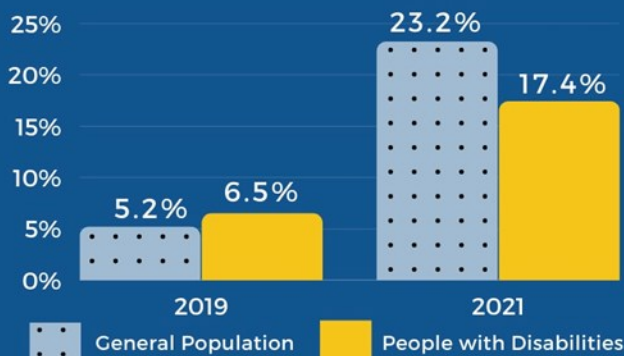
EMPLOYMENT TO POPULATION RATIO



In 2021, the employment to population ratio for the general population was **73.6%**, whereas the employment to population ratio for people with disabilities was **40.9%**.

WORKING FROM HOME

The pandemic period significantly increased work from home opportunities for people with disabilities. Despite this increase, people with disabilities were still **less likely to work from home** than the general population in 2021.

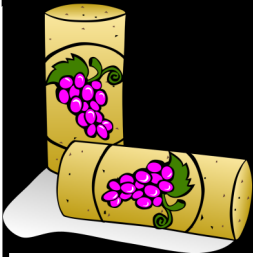

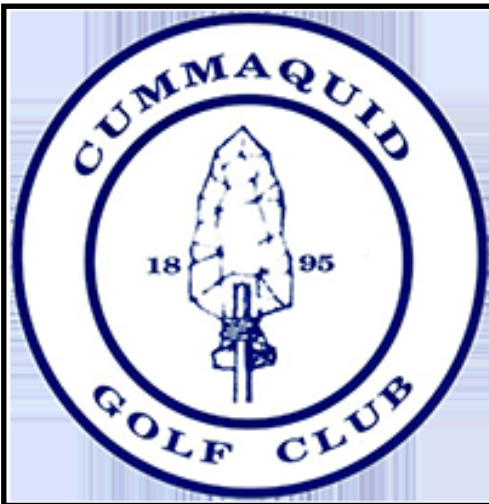

CAPE COD BRITE LIGHTS

Cape Cod Brite Lights a501c(3) corporation that was started by our Rotary Club is now in it's third year. Its mission is "to help those in need on Cape Cod. "Our main focus to date has been to provide weekend backpacks of nutritional food for needy elementary students in the DY School System. A backpack of food consists of shelf stable milk (white & chocolate), juice carton, cereal, instant oatmeal, two proteins which could be a can of tuna, chicken, pasta, soup or beef stew, a cup of apple sauce, macaroni and cheese, Nutra grain fruit granola bar, cheese its, fruit snacks, pudding cup and 2 pieces of fruit. In addition, to give each student some activities to do during the holiday break we put a coloring book and crayons in each bag. We started with a total of 25 students but have grown to 45, an increase of over 80%. In addition, with the assistance of Interact we have started to provide the school nurse with feminine products for high school girls. In addition we will be providing students in need with bags of hygiene products during the upcoming school year. The Interact Club has applied for a District Grant to support this project.

How you can help:

First: Currently we have a board of directors of 11 members. Our bylaws allow us to have a maximum number of 13. If you would like to be a part of our leadership, please contact Steve Albright.

Second: We fill the backpacks and bags of food every Wednesday night at 5:30PM at the Yarmouth Food Pantry. If you would like to help one or two nights a month, again please contact Steve Albright. Currently we have enlisted the local Girl Scout Troop to help on the first Wednesday of each month and the DY Interact Club to help on the third Wednesday of each month. We are trying to make it a community organization where anybody can be a part of it.

Third: It costs \$200—\$250 yearly to support one child's backpack and although we don't have a total figure on the hygiene project, we know that the items provided are costly. You can make a donation to support these two projects by sending your check to:
