The Main Event

Rotary Foundation Grant – Jackie Carnevali spoke to the club about the foundation grant we applied for. The grant is called healthy & hygienic habits. Since 2004, the Carnevali Foundation are now supporting 5 schools in India 3 or which the Rotary Club of Yarmouth supports. There are 4 schools in Nepal supported as well. Jackie asked us to imagine, “Before the needs list, imaging you are camping for the first time on a rocky hill. There are no toilets, no sinks, faucets, privacy, feminine hygiene products, sewers, toilet paper. Either there is limited water – and you try to run a school! The community needs the project addresses are many. The list includes:

1. Instruction is needed to teach healthy bathroom, mealtime and menstruation best habits for teachers and students.
2. Need “Train the Trainer” Program to instruct teachers on
 1. Imparting knowledge to students
 2. Collecting and reporting progress via routine data collection.*
3. Gender based latrines and urinals are very insufficient at ShivaNagar. No staff toilets and no urinals.
4. RO needed at MA Nagar and UV system needed at Shiva Nagar to have clean water systems to produce potable water.
5. Plumbing and storage for Potable and Non-Potable water at both schools.
6. Water access during dry season is minimal or non-existent.*
7. Water Harvesting Pits are needed to conserve precious water resources.*
8. No safe or clean facility for food prep and storage at ShivaNagar. Food prep is in a dilapidated building.
9. There is no Reading/Healthy Habits Literacy Program for parents/mothers (menstruation routines).
10. There are no Learning Materials on hygienic habits.
11. Students are minimally aware of how to keep properly clean as related to toilet use.
12. A clean, safe, schoolyard is needed at Shiva Nagar to keep out animals, neighborhood garbage and homeless.
13. There is no knowledge or equipment for women and older girls to access or make sanitary napkins.*

These projects represent a partnership between the Rotary Club of Hyderabad India, Rotary Club of Yarmouth, and the Carnevali Foundation.

Reverse Osmosis Systems

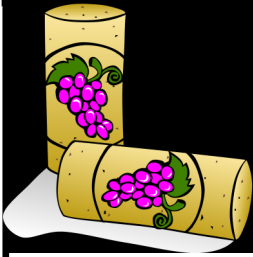


PDG Steve Albright described the Reverse Osmosis system process which purifies the water for the schools. These are less expensive than other systems and does require minimal maintenance. 3.4 million people die every year due to poor water quality. This is the first time these children are receiving good quality water thanks to everyone's contributions. The non-potable water is used for flushing toilets, watering plants, etc. The water quality is monitored through analysis on a regular basis to ensure its purity.

CAPE COD BRITE LIGHTS

You have heard me mention or talk about the new 501c(3) corporation that was recently started by our Rotary Club. It is named Cape Cod Brite Lights and its mission is to help those in need on Cape Cod. Our main focus to date has been to provide weekend backpacks of nutritional food for needy elementary students in the DY School System. A backpack of food consists of shelf stable milk (white & chocolate), juice carton, cereal, instant oatmeal, two proteins which could be a can of tuna, chicken, pasta, soup or beef stew, a cup of apple sauce, macaroni and cheese, Nutra grain fruit granola bar, cheese its, fruit snacks, pudding cup and 2 pieces of fruit. In addition, to give each student some activities to do during the holiday break we put a coloring book and crayons in each bag. We started with a total of 25 students but have grown to 45, an increase of over 80%.

In addition, to the backpacks we have focused on providing a weekly food bag to clients at Community Connections. These clients are ones that are living on their own but are also struggling to keep their heads above water. About 15 – 18 food items are provided each week to each client to help supplement their food insecurities.

How you can help:

First: Currently we have a board of directors of 11 members. Our bylaws allow us to have a maximum number of 13. If you would like to be a part of our leadership, please contact Steve Albright.

Second: We fill the backpacks and bags of food every Wednesday night at 6:00 PM at the Yarmouth Food Pantry. If you would like to help one or two nights a month, again please contact Steve Albright. Currently we have enlisted the local Girl Scout Troop to help on the first Wednesday of each month and the DY Interact Club to help on the second Wednesday of each month. We are trying to make it a community organization where anybody can be a part of it.

Third: It costs \$150 yearly to support one child's backpack and \$250 yearly to support a weekly food bag. If you would like to financially support a child or a Community Connection client, checks can be mailed to:

The first time we collected over 700 mobility devices and the second time we collected over 400 mobility devices. We are now hoping to set this up as an ongoing project. Mike Riley along with members of the International Committee are heading this project up but we would like all Yarmouth Rotarians to help out. Round up all of the devices and drop them off at the transfer station where we have a storage trailer to store them. All of the items collected will be shipped to Africa to help disabled individuals gain mobility that they never have had.
