Wreaths across America. There are currently 3700 cemeteries that celebrate this event. There are options to sponsor a wreath or assist in placing wreaths on grave sites. The Helping Hands tee voted to have a wreath placed at Chandler Gray Cemetery and honor the over 1200 veterans that are buried in town. We will gather on Sat. Dec 16th at 10am.



Golf Tournament Profits are used to support scholarships, Good Works and more recently The Vacation Book Club.

At the last Board meeting the board approved \$15,000 from the Golf Tournament Profit for scholarships. In addition, it is requesting from the Foundation Board \$8,000 from the unclaimed 2020 scholarships be rolled forward into this year's scholarships giving us a total of \$23,000 for 2024 scholarships. An increase of \$2,000 over last year.

Beginning is 2024, all scholarship awards will be paid out at the award ceremony which means beginning in 2024 there will be no more unclaimed scholarships and no more money to roll forward.

Good Works – Back 10 -12 years ago, the club had numerous checking accounts. The operating account, scholarship account, good works account, and Foundation Account. When Charlie Labou was Treasurer, we did away with the Scholarship Checking Account and the Good Works Checking Account.

What is set up in Quick Books are Asset Accounts which keep track of how much is in each of those two areas.

As of today, there is a balance of \$724.48 in the Good Works Asset Account. To date this fiscal year, \$6,454.65 has been expended out of the Good Works Asset Account. All the expenditures so far, this fiscal year and the current balance of \$724 have been from left over funds from previous years in this account. There is a \$7,200 line item in the current year's budget which needs to be funded so I can move it over to the Asset Account. Funds for this come from the Golf Tournament Profit and the Holiday Auction Profit. The board is waiting to see how much we raise at the Holiday Auction before funding Good Works for the current year. So, bring your checkbooks and credit cards and bid high next Friday.

The Vacation Book Club. We budgeted \$10,000 for this project this year. The \$10,000 would have gone to fund 5 books for about 900 students each time.

When we started this project three years ago the books cost \$1.00 each. Today they are costing \$2.00 each so our cost has doubled.

So, the board is looking at cutting down to 4 books this year, bringing our total costs down to \$8,000. So far this year we have funded \$5,500 of the \$8,000. We received \$1,500 from a District Grant that I had applied for, and we received \$4000 from the Yarmouth Rotary Foundation. We still need to fund \$2,500 and those funds also need to come from donations, the Golf Tournament, or the Holiday Auction.

Holiday Christmas Party. We have a \$10,000 line item in this year's budget for the Holiday Christmas Party. We will be hosting 30 families with a total of 76 children. We estimated 70 children but unfortunately you don't know how many children are in each family until you get the list of names. This year we had more. So, the higher number is adding an additional \$600 in our costs. We also didn't get additional funds or donations from Target as we had in previous years so that hurt.

I share all of this information with you, so you know how important the Golf Tournament and Holiday Auction are to our ability to do good in our community.

John Cooke - Community Service

Meals on Wheels is in strong need of more volunteers. It is every Tuesday at 930am - 11:00am.

Ken Knell has done a great job with working on the helping Hands and our adopt a garden programs going well.

Wreaths across America, we will hosting our own event on Saturday December 16th at the Chandler Gray Cemetery to honor our veterans. Wreath laying will take place at 10:00am

Good Works we have donated over \$6000 to various organizations as well as some natural disasters that have occurred over the past year.

Scholarships Committee-Bill Lemoine

Thanks to the efforts of Rotary fundraisers, specifically the golf tournament, we continue to distribute scholarships to worthy DY seniors, The 12member committee reviews the applications and submits their votes based on a point system. Students are required to submit their applications by April 1st, Applications include a thorough resume, essay prompts, school activities, rank in class and a recommendation from the school counseling department, Based on the applicants point value checklist and a consensus of the members, the qualified students are awarded between_\$500.00_____ and ___1,000.00____ dollars which they will receive at awards night at the end of the school year. The club has generously

awarded between \$20,000.00 and \$22,000.00 in the past.

We hope to receive applications from CCT this year as well---their deadline will be March 1st. Last year 19 scholarships were awarded for over \$20,000.00.

Childrens Holiday Party-Mary Lenihan and Bill Lemoine

Over the next days, he peeled over large amounts of his body, and I was shocked to see underneath he was just as pink as I was. (You can tell how much info on race was in our curriculum-zero is a good guess.). I felt really bad for him, but eventually, he was back to normal. After that, it was impossible to think that people were anything other than people.



CAPE COD BRITE LIGHTS

Cape Cod Brite Lights a501c(3) corporation that was started by our Rotary Club is now in it's third year. Its mission is "to help those in need on Cape Cod. "Our main focus to date has been to provide weekend backpacks of nutritional food for needy elementary students in the DY School System. A backpack of food consists of shelf stable milk (white & chocolate), juice carton, cereal, instant oatmeal, two proteins which could be a can of tuna, chicken, pasta, soup or beef stew, a cup of apple sauce, macaroni and cheese, Nutra grain fruit granola bar, cheese its, fruit snacks, pudding cup and 2 pieces of fruit. In addition, to give each student some activities to do during the holiday break we put a coloring book and crayons in each bag. We started with a total of 25 students but have grown to 45, an increase of over 80%. In addition, with the assistance of Interact we have started to provide the school nurse with feminine products for high school girls. In addition we will be providing students in need with bags of hygiene products during the upcoming school year. The Interact Club has applied for a District Grant to support this project.

How you can help:

First: Currently we have a board of directors of 11 members. Our bylaws allow us to have a maximum number of 13. If you would like to be a part of our leadership, please contact Steve Albright.

Second: We fill the backpacks and bags of food every Wednesday night at 5:30PM at the Yarmouth Food Pantry. If you would like to help one or two nights a month, again please contact Steve Albright. Currently we have enlisted the local Girl Scout Troop to help on the first Wednesday of each month and the DY Interact Club to help on the third Wednesday of each month. We are trying to make it a community organization where anybody can be a part of it.

Third: It costs \$250—\$300 yearly to support one child's backpack and although we don't have a total figure on the hygiene project, we know that the items provided are costly. You can make a donation to support these two projects by sending your check to:
