Finances

Club: Balance of \$78,120.67 in checking account. This includes restricted items such as Ukraine Exchange Student; Good Works; Million Dollar Meals; DY Interact; District Grant; Queen of Hearts; Golf Tournament. Final numbers on the Golf Tournament are Income \$45,989.09 ; Expenses \$17, 035.71 ; Profit \$28,953.38 Other note – To date we have expended \$9,600 on the Holiday Party with no income to date. Income will come in with the Auction next week.

Foundation – Checking Account \$40,829.32 Money Market \$63,228.76 Received a check for \$13,133.15 from the estate of Shirley Lund who was the wife of deceased member Larry Putnam. This was the check that originally was from 2018 and never cashed or deposited by us. Working with the Estate Lawyer and the Bank, I was able to get the check reissued again. In the foundation we currently have a liability of \$40,500 for scholarships.

Meals on Wheels – Every Tuesday 9:30 – 11:00 am. We deliver approximately 20 meals each week. Currently there are 23 club members signed up for this weekly project. 2 members are assigned each week. We are always looking for additional members to sign up. If interested please let me know as I will be making out the new schedule. Please consider joining the committee next year if you can't do it right now.

Yarmouth Rotary BYLAW CHANGE: Effective 12/2/22

The following is the bylaw change that was voted on at the annual meeting on December 2, 2022 and passed unanimously.

The old bylaw read as follows:

Article 11 Section 4 currently states: **A thorough review of all financial transactions by a Massachusetts Certified CPA shall be made once each year.**

The new bylaw as passed reads:

Article 11 Section 4 to read: **An examination of all financial transactions by a Qualified Accounting Professional shall be made at least once each year.**

What is a Hate Crime?

A hate crime (also known as a bias-motivated crime or bias crime) is a **prejudice-motivated crime which occurs when a perpetrator targets a victim because of their membership (or perceived membership) of a certain social group or racial demographic.**

Terminology

Hate Crime: At the federal level, a crime motivated by bias against race, color, religion, national origin, sexual orientation, gender, gender identity, or disability.

Bias or Hate Incident: Acts of prejudice that are not crimes and do not involve violence, threats, or property damage.

Scenario - Color

Six black men assaulted and seriously injured a white man and his Asian male friend as they were walking through a residential neighborhood. Witnesses stated the victims were attacked because they were trespassing in a “black” neighborhood.

Scenario - Disability

A group home for persons with psychiatric disabilities who were in transition back into the community was the site of a reported arson. Investigation revealed that neighbors had expressed many concerns about the group home in town meetings and were angry that the house was located in their community. Shortly before the fire was reported, a witness heard a man state, “I’ll get rid of those ‘crazies,’ I’ll burn them out.” Twelve persons, including patients and staff, suffered second and third-degree burns.

Scenario - Ethnicity

Two Palestinian university students speaking in Arabic were attending a department reception when another student, a white male, deliberately bumped into one of them. When one Palestinian student said, “Hey, watch where you’re going,” the white student responded by saying, “I’ll go wherever I want. This is my country, you Arab!” The aggressor proceeded to punch the Palestinian student in the face.

Scenario - Gender

A man entered a community college and shot and killed a female in a corridor. He then entered a classroom with 10 women and 48 men, fired a shot into the ceiling and said, “I want the women! I hate feminists!” He sent all of the men from the room, lined the women up against the wall and opened fire, killing 6 of the women and wounding the others.

Scenario - Gender Identity

A transgender woman was walking down the street near her home when three men walking toward her said, “Hey, what’s your problem? Huh?” She kept walking, trying to ignore them. However, as they got close, one yelled “We don’t want no queers in this neighborhood!” and a second one knocked her to the ground.

Scenario - Race

In a parking lot next to a bar, a 29-year-old Japanese American male was attacked by a 51-year-old white male wielding a tire iron. The victim suffered severe lacerations and a broken arm. Investigation revealed that the offender and victim had previously exchanged racial insults in the bar. The offender initiated the exchange by calling the victim by a well-known and recognized epithet used against the Japanese and complained that the Japanese were taking away jobs from Americans.

Scenario - Religion

Overnight, unknown persons broke into a synagogue and destroyed several priceless religious objects. The perpetrators drew a large swastika on the door and wrote “Death to Jews” on a wall. Although other valuable items were present, none were stolen.

Scenario - Sexual Orientation

Five gay, male friends, some of whom were wearing makeup and jewelry, were exiting a well-known gay bar when they were approached by a group of men who were unknown to them. The men began to ridicule the gay men's feminine appearance and shouted "Sissy!" "Girlie-men!" and other slurs at them then escalated to physically attacking the victims, rendering them unconscious.

The key to overcoming hate is education: at home, in schools, and in the community."

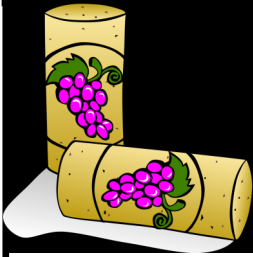

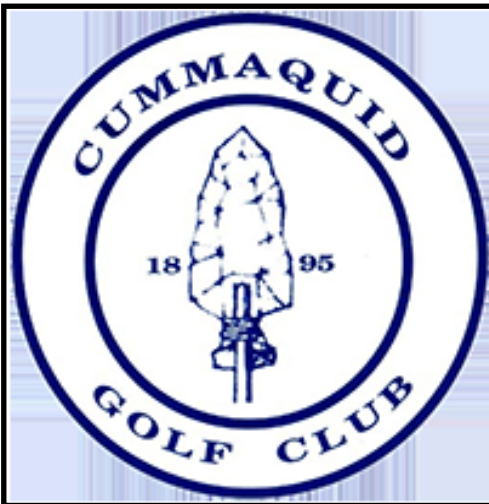

CAPE COD BRITE LIGHTS

Cape Cod Brite Lights a501c(3) corporation that was started by our Rotary Club is now in it's third year. Its mission is "to help those in need on Cape Cod. "Our main focus to date has been to provide weekend backpacks of nutritional food for needy elementary students in the DY School System. A backpack of food consists of shelf stable milk (white & chocolate), juice carton, cereal, instant oatmeal, two proteins which could be a can of tuna, chicken, pasta, soup or beef stew, a cup of apple sauce, macaroni and cheese, Nutra grain fruit granola bar, cheese its, fruit snacks, pudding cup and 2 pieces of fruit. In addition, to give each student some activities to do during the holiday break we put a coloring book and crayons in each bag. We started with a total of 25 students but have grown to 45, an increase of over 80%. In addition, with the assistance of Interact we have started to provide the school nurse with feminine products for high school girls. In addition we will be providing students in need with bags of hygiene products during the upcoming school year. The Interact Club has applied for a District Grant to support this project.

How you can help:

First: Currently we have a board of directors of 11 members. Our bylaws allow us to have a maximum number of 13. If you would like to be a part of our leadership, please contact Steve Albright.

Second: We fill the backpacks and bags of food every Wednesday night at 5:30PM at the Yarmouth Food Pantry. If you would like to help one or two nights a month, again please contact Steve Albright. Currently we have enlisted the local Girl Scout Troop to help on the first Wednesday of each month and the DY Interact Club to help on the third Wednesday of each month. We are trying to make it a community organization where anybody can be a part of it.

Third: It costs \$200—\$250 yearly to support one child's backpack and although we don't have a total figure on the hygiene project, we know that the items provided are costly. You can make a donation to support these two projects by sending your check to:

The first time we collected over 700 mobility devices and the second time we collected over 400 mobility devices. We are now hoping to set this up as an ongoing project. Mike Riley along with members of the International Committee are heading this project up but we would like all Yarmouth Rotarians to help out. Search for any of the desired items in your home, your extended families homes and your neighbors homes. Round up all of the devices and drop them off at the transfer station where we have a storage trailer to store them. All of the items collected will be shipped to Africa to help disabled individuals gain mobility that they never have had.
