The Main Event



Guest Speaker Lisa Guyon, Executive Director from WECAN – Lisa spoke regarding the history of WE CAN and what the organization does. Since 2001, WE CAN has supported and empowered women going through life transitions and challenges. They serve women of all ages providing unique, free services, referrals and resources to help foster independence and create lasting positive change.

WE CAN had its beginnings in the Cape Cod Community College program called Women in Transition (WIT), which was designed to help women of all ages and demographics improve their lives through education. When the program ended in 2000, several individuals realized the need was still there. They met and formulated what became WE CAN – Women's Empowerment through Cape Area Networking.

In their first year, 2001, WE CAN helped 15 women, providing guidance and options, including: How to get back to school; Connections to volunteers for mentoring and support; Helping to complete forms for emergency assistance, Financial aid for education, Job applications; and Information and Referrals to other organizations on the Cape. Legal consultations provided by volunteer attorneys begin.

By 2011, their 10th anniversary year, they were serving approximately 1,200 women a year with a broad range of programs and services. Thanks to a committed base of donors and supporters, WE CAN had

achieved financial stability and began to expand services to include a financial empowerment program and additional work and career support services.

Two years later, in 2013, following a highly successful capital campaign, they moved into a permanent home on Route 28 in Harwich Port with a sign prominently displayed for all to see. This increased visibility and the growing awareness of WE CAN's effective work across the Cape community drove tremendous growth in the number of women served year over year. During this period, they began offering personal development workshops, and the PathMaker's mentoring program expanded.

By 2015, WE CAN was serving more than 2,000 women a year and handling more than 11,000 calls and walk-in visits from women on Cape Cod. They began to bring our programs to the Upper Cape through a partnership with the Falmouth Service Center as well as expanding services to Hyannis. Organizational growth necessitated an expansion of our building and upgrades to technology.

They celebrated their 20th anniversary in 2021 and has continued to meet increasing demand for our services from women across Cape Cod. With a strong staff and board of directors leading the way, they've built deep and strategic partnerships in different regions of the Cape, grown their network of generous and committed volunteers and supporters, and expanded their programs to meet the changing needs of women in our community. WE CAN now serves more than 2,400 women each year across Cape Cod, providing free and confidential legal services, employment and business support, financial empowerment, mentoring, and personal development programs.

More than 70% of our participants access more than one service at WE CAN.

DEIB Information Corner

The Failure of DEI Industrial Complex: Actions Our Rotary Club is Taking to Address This Concern

As we begin to celebrate Social Justice and Conflict Resolution month in Rotary, the DEIB committee would like to share the attached article from The Harvard Business Review which speaks to the need for continual deep cultural competency training to have an effective DEI understanding in all organization. A one -time Diversity Training is like does not have the long endurance impact needed for all of us to appreciate the difference among those who are not within our own orbit. DEI awareness and training must be engrained in all that we do so the effect is long lasting well after a brief presentation of class. It have been almost a year since the DEIB committee began hosting DEI moments, speaker engagements and now a DEIB weekly article to help enlighten all of us. We invite you to read the article as we began a series of diverse speakers this month that leads to a conversation on how we can advance our engagement beyond just our own one-hour weekly meetings. We would love to hear from you.

Harvard Business Review Summary

Despite the increase in organizations adopting DEI initiatives and the proliferation of DEI firms and practitioners, the big, poorly kept secret is that the majority of these initiatives are less effective than many make them out to be. On the one hand, there is a lack of standards, consistency, and accountability among DEI practitioners. And on the other, organizations keep asking for, and funding, interventions that don't work. This phenomenon that purports to end inequity but instead sustains it at great cost to marginalized populations is called the DEI-Industrial Complex. To end it, the author, a DEI practitioner, provides four actions for organizations and DEI practitioners to take: 1) Identify DEI challenges before prescribing DEI solutions, 2) find the right specialist(s), 3) measure not only inputs, but outcomes, and 4) have those doing the work inform the budget for it.


MALE vs. FEMALE: Part of Diversity, Equity and Inclusion

I share these numbers and information with you to tell you that we as a club are not in a great position as far as our membership goes. This is not my problem, this is not our membership committee's problem, this is not our leaderships problem. This problem belongs to all of us. CAPE COD BRITE LIGHTS

Cape Cod Brite Lights a501c(3) corporation that was started by our Rotary Club is now in it's third year. Its mission is "to help those in need on Cape Cod. "Our main focus to date has been to provide weekend backpacks of nutritional food for needy elementary students in the DY School System. A backpack of food consists of shelf stable milk (white & chocolate), juice carton, cereal, instant oatmeal, two proteins which could be a can of tuna, chicken, pasta, soup or beef stew, a cup of apple sauce, macaroni and cheese, Nutra grain fruit granola bar, cheese its, fruit snacks, pudding cup and 2 pieces of fruit. In addition, to give each student some activities to do during the holiday break we put a coloring book and crayons in each bag. We started with a total of 25 students but have grown to 45, an increase of over 80%. In addition, with the assistance of Interact we have started to provide the school nurse with feminine products for high school girls. In addition we will be providing students in need with bags of hygiene products during the upcoming school year. The Interact Club has applied for a District Grant to support this project.

How you can help:

First: Currently we have a board of directors of 11 members. Our bylaws allow us to have a maximum number of 13. If you would like to be a part of our leadership, please contact Steve Albright.

Second: We fill the backpacks and bags of food every Wednesday night at 5:30PM at the Yarmouth Food Pantry. If you would like to help one or two nights a month, again please contact Steve Albright. Currently we have enlisted the local Girl Scout Troop to help on the first Wednesday of each month and the DY Interact Club to help on the third Wednesday of each month. We are trying to make it a community organization where anybody can be a part of it.

Third: It costs \$200—\$250 yearly to support one child's backpack and although we don't have a total figure on the hygiene project, we know that the items provided are costly. You can make a donation to support these two projects by sending your check to:
