Maloney, a member of the Rotary Club of Decatur, Alabama, USA, unveiled the 2019-20 presidential theme, Rotary Connects the World, to incoming district governors at Rotary’s annual training event, the International Assembly, in San Diego, California, USA, on Monday. “The first emphasis is to grow Rotary — to grow our service, to grow the impact of our projects, but most importantly, to grow our membership so that we can achieve more,” Maloney said. Maloney believes that connection is at the heart of the Rotary experience. (Rotary) allows us to connect with each other, in deep and meaningful ways, across our differences,” Maloney said. “It connects us to people we would never otherwise have met, who are more like us than we ever could have known. It connects us to our communities, to professional opportunities, and to the people who need our help.” Maloney also called on every Rotary and Rotaract club to identify segments of their community not represented in their club by creating a membership committee with diverse members. “Through Rotary, we connect to the incredible diversity of humanity on a truly unique footing, forging deep and lasting ties in pursuit of a common goal,” he added. “In this ever more divided world, Rotary connects us all. Maloney urged leaders to offer alternative meeting experiences and service opportunities to make it easier for busy professionals and people with many family obligations to serve in leadership roles. “We need to foster a culture where Rotary does not compete with the family, but rather complements it,” Maloney said. “That means taking real, practical steps to change the existing culture: being realistic in our expectations, considerate in our scheduling, and welcoming of children at Rotary events on every level. <div>PROGRAM SPEAKER: BOB LAWTON, “RETIRED” YARMOUTH TOWN ADMINISTRATOR</div> <div>Tom Martin did the honors of introduced Guest Speaker, Bob Lawton, the well-known, retired Yarmouth Town Administrator – who seems to have forgotten the definition of “retired.”</div> <div>After Bob’s tour of active duty in the US Air Force, he arrived on Cape Cod in 1973 for the new position of Assistant Town Administrator for the Town of Dennis. By 1978, he was tapped as Yarmouth’s first Town Administrator – a post he held for over 32 years – until his announcement of retirement in 2010. That experience was not to be wasted. He has been called upon by the Towns of Harwich, Truro, Barnstable and (back again to) Yarmouth to serve at various times as interim administrator to bridge the municipal supervision gaps between the leaving and the arrival of changes to town manager leadership.</div> <div>Bob provided his insight and observations about the Town of Yarmouth concerning a multitude of events and issues such as water quality, open land acquisition, affordable housing, community redevelopment & revitalization, septage treatment, regional school funding, and municipal infrastructure. The roll call of place names within the town provide substantial testimony of his influence, longevity, and steady hand: ● the drive-in-site, ● Chez Lenore, ● fire station #3, ● Packet Landing, ● the 1759 House, ● Anniversary Park, ● Captain’s Village, ● Parker’s River, ● Bridgewater State University branch, ● Simpkins Senior Living Units, and ● Yarmouth Gardens.</div> <div>In sum, Bob Lawton has left an impressive legacy, and he is still not done – he and his wife still live in Yarmouth and he remains an active contributor as a member of the Affordable Housing Trust.</div>		<div>Relationship with the United Nations</div> <div>During 2019-20, Rotary will host a series of presidential conferences around the world, focusing on Rotary’s relationship with the United Nations and the UN’s sustainable development goals that many Rotary service projects support. More information will be available in July.</div> <div>In 2020, the United Nations will celebrate the 75th anniversary of its charter and its mission of promoting peace. Rotary was one of 42 organizations the United States invited to serve as consultants to its delegation at the 1945 San Francisco conference, which led to the UN’s charter. For decades, Rotary has worked alongside the United Nations to address humanitarian issues around the world.
