Guest Speaker Adam Burnett, Director of Champ Homes – Adam has been the Executive Director for the past 5 years. The mission of Champ Homes is our ongoing mission to provide transitional housing to adults on Cape Cod who are homeless or near homeless in a safe, compassionate, respectful environment, where we instill confidence and hope through providing life skills, mentoring, vocational opportunities, and self-advocacy, while building faith in one's God, one's self, in others and beyond. Champ Homes seeks to provide shelter, build community and change lives. We provide and maintain a safe, therapeutic and nurturing environment where homeless individuals are empowered to participate in our supportive, family-type housing model. It is our sincere hope that individuals will find an oasis where love, respect and support, help each to move away from the difficulties that led to their homelessness and begin to reach their full potential.



School Street in Hyannis is where the campus is located. There are 4 buildings including the kitchens, which can serve 40 people overall. To maintain residency at Champ Homes, there are requirements. There are 6 employees total.

Anyone 18 and over can come to the Champ Homes. There is an increasing number of people on the Cape facing housing instability. The housing market has impacted the rental market and working professionals are now being forced to reach out to Champ Homes as well.

For those 18-24 years of age, there has been an increasing problem with youth not being supported by their family. One is a victim of sex trafficking.

For intake, they are careful to accept people. Everyone is CORI checked to make sure there are no criminals coming to the facility. Co-living requires that each person is checked to make sure they are a good fit. We don't do the work for people. Champ Homes is a facilitator. It is a sober environment and each person is held accountable. No drugs or alcohol are allowed on campus.

Success is measured by how many people move on to independent living. The impact has been huge, with over 80% achieving independent living last year.

Adam thanked all Rotarians for the continued support over the years. They love the Thanksgiving and Christmas dinners, monthly BBQs, and more.

What is Lunar New Year?



The Lunar New Year is the beginning of the calendar year, with months based on the phases of the moon. The Lunar New Year often falls on the same day in different countries, but the way it's celebrated is unique to each place and culture.

The festival that is frequently referred to as 'Chinese New Year' is not only celebrated in China. The term 'Lunar New Year' is increasingly used to refer to festivals in other countries that take place at the same time and with many of the same traditions as in China. Chinese New Year, or Lunar New Year, is a 15-day festival that is celebrated annually depending on the sighting of the new moon.

The Lunar New Year is a public holiday that is observed across multiple days in China, North and South Korea, Malaysia, the Philippines, Indonesia, Singapore, Brunei, and Vietnam. Filial ties typically take center stage during this time as people return to their hometowns to observe the holiday with their families.

Why do we say Lunar New Year and not Chinese New Year?

The festival that is frequently referred to as 'Chinese New Year' is not only celebrated in China. The term 'Lunar New Year' is increasingly used to refer to festivals in other countries that take place at the same time and with many of the same traditions as in China.

Chinese New Year falls on Sunday 22nd January 2023 and marks the start of the Year of the Rabbit. The Chinese zodiac calendar is different from the Gregorian calendar in that it is a cycle of twelve years, each year is named after an animal.

Who invented Lunar New Year?

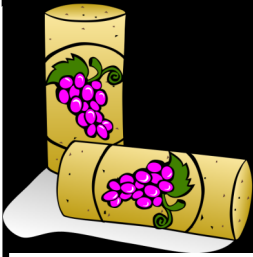
In 104 BCE Emperor Wu of the Han dynasty (206 BCE to 220 CE) approved a calendar reform that fixed the beginning of the year on the day of the first new moon after the sun enters the 11th sign of the solar zodiac, or the second new moon after the winter solstice.

MEMBERSHIP – As with any organization the membership is the lifeline and strength of it. Without an involved membership, we cannot continue to do the many projects and activities that we currently do.

When you look at our membership information and most of this is shown on the numbers below, you will see our number of members has dropped from 86 On July 1, 2019 to 75 on July 1, 2022. As of Jan 1, 2023 our current number of members stands at 72. This is a drop of 14 members over the last 4 ½ years. A trend cannot continue.

If you break the last two groups down a little farther, you will see that between the age of 60 -64 there are 5 members and between the ages of 65 -69 there are 11 members.

If you look at 70 -79 you will see 20 members, 80 – 89 you see 14 members and 90 plus you will see 2 members. We are an older club and getting older. We only have a total of 10 members under the age of 50 in our club.

Currently 32% of members in our club are female. This is actually right in line with Rotary Internationals membership totals. The only reason this percentage has increased since 2019 is because we lost 12 male members, not because we brought in more females. Unfortunately, we or Rotary International don't track any other types of membership categories, so we don't have any numbers that tell us how we are doing in our club in the other areas of diversity. You can look around the room on Friday morning and see for yourself how we are doing. Not too good.

I share these numbers and information with you to tell you that we as a club are not in a great position as far as our membership goes. This is not my problem, this is not our membership committee's problem, this is not our leaderships problem. This problem belongs to all of us. If we want to stay as the large and influential club that we are, making a difference in our community and in the world, we need to do something about membership growth. Young membership growth.

CAPE COD BRITE LIGHTS

Cape Cod Brite Lights a501c(3) corporation that was started by our Rotary Club is now in it's third year. Its mission is "to help those in need on Cape Cod. "Our main focus to date has been to provide weekend backpacks of nutritional food for needy elementary students in the DY School System. A backpack of food consists of shelf stable milk (white & chocolate), juice carton, cereal, instant oatmeal, two proteins which could be a can of tuna, chicken, pasta, soup or beef stew, a cup of apple sauce, macaroni and cheese, Nutra grain fruit granola bar, cheese its, fruit snacks, pudding cup and 2 pieces of fruit. In addition, to give each student some activities to do during the holiday break we put a coloring book and crayons in each bag. We started with a total of 25 students but have grown to 45, an increase of over 80%. In addition, with the assistance of Interact we have started to provide the school nurse with feminine products for high school girls. In addition we will be providing students in need with bags of hygiene products during the upcoming school year. The Interact Club has applied for a District Grant to support this project.

How you can help:

First: Currently we have a board of directors of 11 members. Our bylaws allow us to have a maximum number of 13. If you would like to be a part of our leadership, please contact Steve Albright.

Second: We fill the backpacks and bags of food every Wednesday night at 5:30PM at the Yarmouth Food Pantry. If you would like to help one or two nights a month, again please contact Steve Albright. Currently we have enlisted the local Girl Scout Troop to help on the first Wednesday of each month and the DY Interact Club to help on the third Wednesday of each month. We are trying to make it a community organization where anybody can be a part of it.

Third: It costs \$200—\$250 yearly to support one child's backpack and although we don't have a total figure on the hygiene project, we know that the items provided are costly. You can make a donation to support these two projects by sending your check to:
