YOUTH EXCHANGE

- We said goodbye to Dajé last July after she spent a year with us.
- We continued to host Matthew and said good bye to him in January.
- We have Emily leaving us in another month for her exchange in Germany.
- And we will be saying hello to Jasmiine from Finland in August as we welcome her into our club and lives for the next year.
- In addition we have 2 District leaders in the Youth Exchange Program. Dorcas McGurrian as the District Chair and Stephen Albright as the District Inbound Coordinator.

GROUP STUDY EXCHANGE

We hosted the GSE team from Germany for a week this past spring, developing lasting friendships and sharing cultural experiences with each other. For those of us who were involved in this program, it was a wonderful experience.

FOOD PANTRY

- We collected over \$1,200 in paper products and toiletries.
- We volunteered at the fill a cruiser food drives.

We raised over \$9,000 this year.

- Packets landing: We cleaned and weeded all of the planting beds plus donated a new bench to the park.

- Champ House: We've served over 250 meals to the residents there so far this year. We will continue with this great project again this year.


SCHOLARSHIPS

We awarded a total of 15 scholarships at DY and CC Tech for a total of \$15,000.


ROTARY FOUNDATION
