Guest Speaker Karl von Horne – Karl has been the Director of the Division of Natural Resources for many years in Yarmouth, and has spent over 32 years in the field and absolutely loves it. The Division of Natural Resources consists of 5 separate sections: Environmental Law Enforcement, Shellfish, Animal Control, Harbormaster, and Waterways. Yarmouth is comprised of 24 square miles, including 7.75 square miles of open space. There are nearly 4 miles of fresh water, 35 miles of coastal waters and 150 linear miles of coastline in Yarmouth. The Division of Natural Resources handles marine mammals, pollution, wetland violations, shellfish management, and the list goes on. In terms of law enforcement, Federal, state, local and maritime laws are all enforced by the division. "Generally, we are involved in the bizarre cases when it's not clear as to who should take the lead," said Karl. The department is comprised of Karl and 3 officers who are primarily in charge and they can act as reserve police officers when needed to fill in. He spoke regarding the homeless camps near the Cape Cod Hospital and a combined effort to help the people and move them on. Associated with these camps, litter is often part of the issue that needs to be addressed. A meth lab was dismantled this past year which was very dangerous. Illegal dumping is also a problem in some of the wooded areas. Additionally, sick and njured wildlife continue to be a focus area, especially prevention, testing, and responding to calls from citizens. Distemper was a major problem this spring, especially with the skunk population. "We have prime habitat for wildlife and phenomenal population of wildlife in town and lots of edge for them to find food and shelter,' said Karl. Rabies came onto Cape Cod in 2004. Bat rabies and Atlantic Raccoon are dangerous, and thus every animal caught is sent to the public health lab for testing. "Untreated, rabies is a fatal disease. Rabies baiting programs have been tremendously successful and the baits have the inoculation within them. The wildlife eat the bait and become immediately vaccinated." This constant program has pushed rabies back to the canal. "We have not had a positive rabies case on Cape Cod in 5 years, which is amazing because 55,000 people die annually due to rabies." He noted that all mammals are susceptible to rabies including whales. There are two phases of rabid animals: dumb and ferocious. There have been only 3 cases in Yarmouth of the ferocious type. Capping chimneys and cordoning off under sheds and decks help to keep wildlife in the wild.
