ROTARY FACT: PolioPlus is Rotary's massive effort to eradicate poliomyelitis from the world by the year 2005. Due to some global political complications, the target date had to be extended to 2020 requiring an additional 1.5 Billion USD. It is part of a global effort to protect the children from five other deadly diseas es as well as the "plus" in PolioPlus. The program was launched in 1985 with fund raising as a primary focus. The original goal was to raise \$120 million. By 1988, Rotarians of the world had raised more than \$219 million in cash and pledges. By 1994, the cash total exceeded \$246 million! These gifts have enabled the Rotary Foundation to make grants to provide a five year supply of vaccine for any developing country requesting it to protect its children. Grants have been made to nearly 100 countries, a commitment, thus far, of \$181 million to purchase vaccine and to improve vaccine quality.

Achieving eradication will be difficult, (only one other disease, smallpox, has ever been eradicated) and expensive (estimated cost to the international community is nearly \$2 billion). It will require continuing immunization of children worldwide, and it must include systematic reporting of all suspected cases, community-wide vaccination to contain outbreaks of the disease, and establishment of laboratory networks. Rotary will not be alone in all of these efforts but in partnership with national governments, the World and Pan American Health Organiza-

UNICEF and others, Rotary's "people power" gives us a special "hands on" role. Rotarians in developing countries have given thousands of hours and countless in-kind gifts to help eradication happen in their countries.

No other non-governmental organization ever has made a commitment of the scale of PolioPlus. Truly it may be considered the greatest humanitarian service the world has ever seen. **Every Rotarian can share the pride of that achievement!**

At the International Conference in Atlanta, Rotary made a commitment of \$50 million dollars for the next three years, (a total of \$150 million) to do their part in this final push to eradicate Polio from the face of the earth. Program: Judy Scarafile & Kathey Fulham Parcels, Major Cri-SIS RELIEF FUND

To explain the mission and scope of The Cape Cod and Islands Major Crisis Relief Fund (MCRF), Steve Albright presented Guest Speakers, Judy Walden Scarafile, Managing Director of the MCRF, and Kathey Fulham Parcels, CPA, a member of the MCRF Advisory Committee. If those names sound familiar, it should be no surprise.

Previously, for over 45 years, Judy served the Cape Cod Baseball League (CCBL) in various capacities, including Director of Corporate Development and President of the league for 24 years. During her time with the CCBL, the league was named the volunteer organization with the greatest economic impact on Cape Cod, with Judy raising more than \$6 million in sponsorships and corporate and foundation support. Since retiring from CCBL in 2015, Judy continued her lifetime commitment to bettering the local communities, including serving on the Board of the Cape Cod Times Needy Fund and planning for the Cape and Islands Major Crisis Relief Fund.

Kathey recently sold her CPA practice that was in the village of Osterville for 26 years. She was a member of the Osterville Rotary Club and was Chair of the Making Strides Against Cancer. In addition to her membership on MCRF's Advisory Committee, she serves in the same capacity for the Cape Symphony and Conservatory.

The Cape Cod and Islands Major Crisis Relief Fund (MCRF) is a nonprofit disaster response organization that provides humanitarian aid to local individuals and families. The MCRF was launched on June 23, 2016 by the Cape Cod Times Needy Fund, itself a registered 501(c)(3) charitable organization. While the Needy Fund provides urgent financial assistance throughout the year to individuals and families residing on the Cape and Islands who are experiencing temporary financial hardship, the Needy Fund could not meet a dramatic increase in unmet needs following a disaster such as Hurricane

It was discovered that with traditional forms of private and public disaster aid, there were existing service gaps in preparing for and responding to natural disasters, such as the hurricanes and blizzards, and man-made crises such as health epidemics and terrorism particularly in terms of critical, long-term recovery assistance. Consequently, the parameters and criteria for a Major Crisis Relief Fund were designed by a subcommittee of the Needy Fund Board and other local volunteers. Organizational and public engagement activities have been set up in support for humanitarian aid on the Cape and Islands in the aftermath of such disasters.

Filling existing service gaps in private and public funding means financial aid for food, housing, transportation, and medical/mental healthcare. The goal of the MCRF is to establish resources and partnerships prior to a disaster that will then be directly available to address the needs of individuals and families which are unmet by the traditional forms of

The Cape Cod and Islands Major Crisis Relief Fund needs the help from the local communities! "Because when it comes to the next major crisis, it is a matter of when, not if."
