Guest Speaker Dr. Bruce Gordon – Our own fellow Rotarian, Dr. Bruce Gordon, spoke to the club about pure water, which is a huge issue. He noted that the Rotary Club of Yarmouth has supported many projects related to pure water. “We take tap-water in this country for granted, especially because of the municipal water supply. Millions of children die from bad water every year and it is becoming more of an issue now more than ever due to 2 major changes: 1) the world’s population is increasing which puts a strain on water resources. 2) Global warming is happening and causing a distribution issue. Some areas are in drought and others are receiving too much water.” With the oceans rising, it is possible the Cape’s water lenses will be infiltrated with salt water which will ruin our now excellent water source. As people become wealthier, they use much more water. He noted that in many areas of the world wealth has grown and so, too, does more protein based diets. These diets require raising animals to eat which, takes hundreds of gallons of water per head of cattle. Dr. Bruce noted that in Vermont, they are trying to eliminate outhouses to protect water quality. In other parts of the world, open sewers flood into water supply. “Most of us are alive right now because we can control our water supply and separate potable water from waste water. This advancement has caused the average lifespan to go from 25-30 years to 80 years with this one advancement.” He stated that runoff is a major issue globally as well in our area, especially with distribution at wrong times of the year for farming. The projection for Massachusetts is that the annual rainfall (40in annually) will be coming predominantly in the winter versus throughout the year. This will be causing droughts during the summer and large storms during the winter.

Jim Saben, who traveled with Rotary to Central America for a pure water project with Tammy, stated, “It is now 7:30 in the morning and we have already used more water than more than 2.5 billion people on the earth will use all day.” In conclusion, Dr. Bruce shared that each person can contribute by reducing, recycling, etc. How do we use water every day? 70L per day on average is usage.
