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The Main Event



Guest Speaker Bob Whritenour, Town of Yarmouth Administrator - We just had a major town meeting that was historic in many respects. There were several projects approved with forward momentum. One of the projects was a massive renovation of the water pumping stations which is necessary to maintain core, primary resources that people cannot live without. The other good news is the passage of the wastewater treatment facility approval. The detailed scientific studies have shown that excessive nitrogen that are causing algae blooms, chocking needed oxygen. Studies that have come about in the last 25-30 years warning all of us of the dangers. "When I was at that town meeting, I felt, really for the first time, it was a groundswell of support with citizens asking, 'when can we begin to bring back the environment and the culture, we love here on Cape Cod." The project is proposed for Phase I along route 28 and all the business uses. The collection system placed underground by MA DOT, who will be handling all the streetscape. The sewer funding is tracked separately and independently of the property tax dollars. It is not a system that impacts property tax without a vote at Town Meeting. The tax on short term vacation rentals is

going into the funding for the sewer projects. The goal is by 2026, we will have \$10 million set aside which will help with bonding and have less of an impact on property owners. Construction is supposed to begin in 2025 with treatment beginning in 2026. In 2023, the state will begin reconstruction of Route 28 and at that point, the pipes will begin to be laid. There are state funds available, with an application date of August 2022 for 0% interest.

Cape Cod Tech Rising Star Taylor Labradee - Lauren Kalbach from Cape Tech introduced this week's Rising Star. "In the classroom she has demonstrated her passion for the food industry. Her technique is maturing, and she is caring and professional person. She is mature and continues to support and is friendly with her peers. I am very proud of her accomplishments." Taylor stated, "I am honored to be chosen for this award." She would love to run a mobile cupcake restaurant and looks to further her culinary career.

Thanksgiving Dinner - As of right now, we have 22 people signed up to provide funding to prepare full dinners for 27 families.

CAPE COD BRITE LIGHTS

You have heard me mention or talk about the new 501c(3) corporation that was recently started by our Rotary Club. It is named Cape Cod Brite Lights and its mission is to help those in need on Cape Cod. Our main focus to date has been to provide weekend backpacks of nutritional food for needy elementary students in the DY School System. A backpack of food consists of shelf stable milk (white & chocolate), juice carton, cereal, instant oatmeal, two proteins which could be a can of tuna, chicken, pasta, soup or beef stew, a cup of apple sauce, macaroni and cheese, Nutra grain fruit granola bar, cheese its, fruit snacks, pudding cup and 2 pieces of fruit. In addition, to give each student some activities to do during the holiday break we put a coloring book and crayons in each bag. We started with a total of 25 students but have grown to 45, an increase of over 80%.

In addition, to the backpacks we have focused on providing a weekly food bag to clients at Community Connections. These clients are ones that are living on their own but are also struggling to keep their heads above water. About 15 – 18 food items are provided each week to each client to help supplement their food insecurities.

How you can help:

First: Currently we have a board of directors of 11 members. Our bylaws allow us to have a maximum number of 13. If you would like to be a part of our leadership, please contact Steve Albright.


Second: We fill the backpacks and bags of food every Wednesday night at 6:00 PM at the Yarmouth Food Pantry. If you would like to help one or two nights a month, again please contact Steve Albright. Currently we have enlisted the local Girl Scout Troop to help on the first Wednesday of each month and the DY Interact Club to help on the second Wednesday of each month. We are trying to make it a community organization where anybody can be a part of it.

Third: It costs \$150 yearly to support one child's backpack and \$250 yearly to support a weekly food bag. If you would like to financially support a child or a Community Connection client, checks can be mailed to:

Rufus Jones, The District 7950 DEI Challenge - Our own Rufus Jones presented the District 7950 Diversity, Equity and Inclusion challenge to the club. Five Avenues of Service

The International Committee of our Club has many projects supporting these goals and invites and encourages member participation in this important work. Our club is currently involved in three schools in India, helping to provide an education for children from low-income neighborhoods. In addition, our projects provide nutritional food, clean water, proper sanitation, and hygiene education for the children. In addition, we help to provide adult education to people who have never had an opportunity to learn. We have participated in peace and conflict resolution discussions and forums and have collected used mobility devices for the Crutches for Africa program.

New Generations Service – The Fifth Avenue of Service

New Generations Service, the newest Avenue of Service, created by the 2010 Council on Legislation of Rotary International recognizes the positive change implemented by youth and young adults involved in leadership development activities, community and international service projects and exchange programs that enrich and foster world peace and cultural understanding. The first time we collected over 700 mobility devices and the second time we collected over 400 mobility devices. We are now hoping to set this up as an ongoing project. Round up all of the devices and drop them off at the transfer station where we have a storage trailer to store them. All of the items collected will be shipped to Africa to help disabled individuals gain mobility that they never have had.
