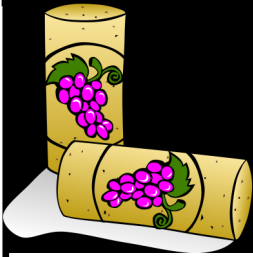

## **Things Every Rotarian Should Know About Rotary #1 of 50**

**Definition of Rotary:** how do you describe the organization called “Rotary” There are so many characteristics of a Rotary club as well as the activities of 1.2 million Rotarians. There are features of service, internationality, fellowship, classifications of each vocation, development of goodwill and world understanding, the emphasis of high ethical standards, concern for other people and many more descriptive qualities.

In 1976 the Rotary International Board of Directors was interested in creating a concise definition of the fundamental aspects of Rotary. They turned to the three men who were serving on Rotary’s Public Relations Committee and requested that a one sentence definition of Rotary be prepared. After numerous drafts, the committee presented this definition, which has been used ever since in various Rotary publications:

**“Rotary is an organization of business and professional people united worldwide who provide humanitarian service, encourage high ethical standards in all vocations and help build goodwill and peace in the world”**

Those 31 words are well worth remembering when someone asks, **“What is Rotary”**

## **CAPE COD BRITE LIGHTS**

You have heard me mention or talk about the new 501c(3) corporation that was recently started by our Rotary Club. It is named Cape Cod Brite Lights and its mission is to help those in need on Cape Cod. Our main focus to date has been to provide weekend backpacks of nutritional food for needy elementary students in the DY School System. A backpack of food consists of shelf stable milk (white & chocolate), juice carton, cereal, instant oatmeal, two proteins which could be a can of tuna, chicken, pasta, soup or beef stew, a cup of apple sauce, macaroni and cheese, Nutra grain fruit granola bar, cheese its, fruit snacks, pudding cup and 2 pieces of fruit. In addition, to give each student some activities to do during the holiday break we put a coloring book and crayons in each bag. We started with a total of 25 students but have grown to 45, an increase of over 80%.

In addition, to the backpacks we have focused on providing a weekly food bag to clients at Community Connections. These clients are ones that are living on their own but are also struggling to keep their heads above water. About 15 – 18 food items are provided each week to each client to help supplement their food insecurities.

### **How you can help:**

First: Currently we have a board of directors of 11 members. Our bylaws allow us to have a maximum number of 13. If you would like to be a part of our leadership, please contact Steve Albright.

Second: We fill the backpacks and bags of food every Wednesday night at 6:00 PM at the Yarmouth Food Pantry. If you would like to help one or two nights a month, again please contact Steve Albright. Currently we have enlisted the local Girl Scout Troop to help on the first Wednesday of each month and the DY Interact Club to help on the second Wednesday of each month. We are trying to make it a community organization where anybody can be a part of it.

Third: It costs \$150 yearly to support one child’s backpack and \$250 yearly to support a weekly food bag. If you would like to financially support a child or a Community Connection client, checks can be mailed to:

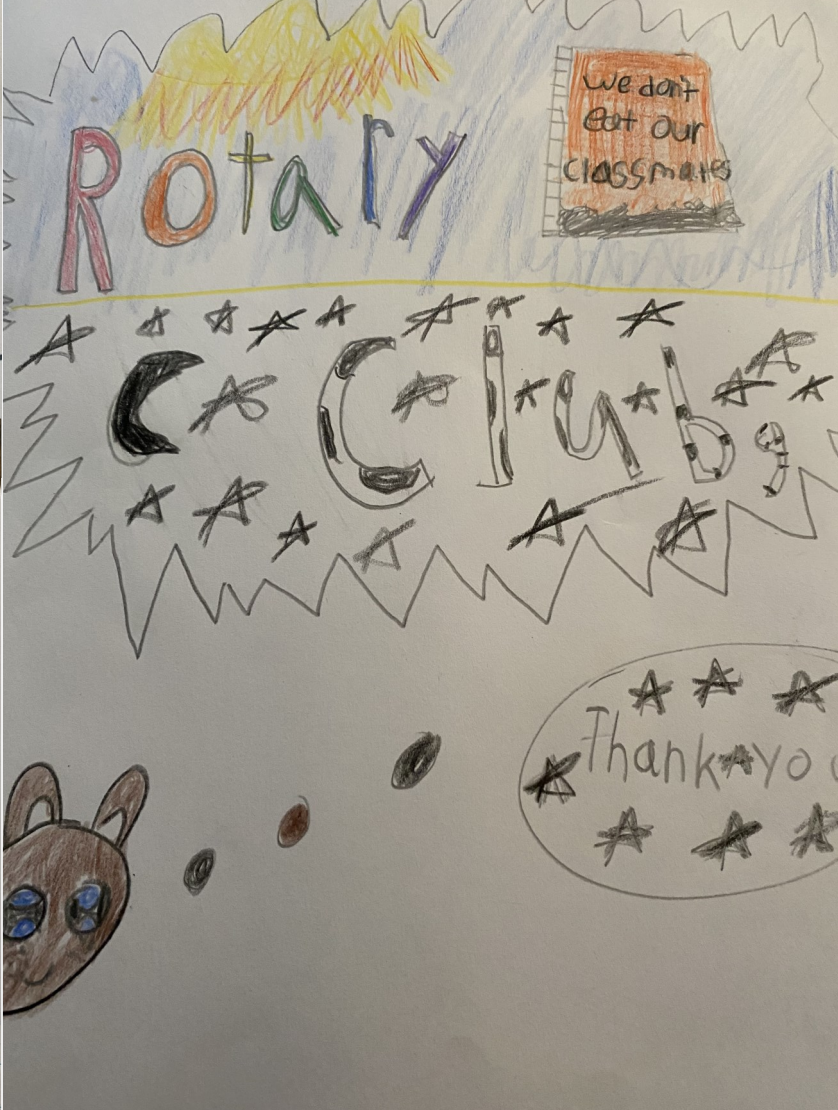

## Five Avenues of Service

### International Service – The Fourth Avenue of Service

International Service is for the advancement of international understanding, goodwill and peace through a world fellowship of business and professional persons united in the ideal of service, to expand Rotary's humanitarian reach around the globe and to promote world understanding and peace. The International Committee of our Club has many projects supporting these goals and invites and encourages member participation in this important work. Our club is currently involved in three schools in India, helping to provide an education for children from low-income neighborhoods. In addition, our projects provide nutritional food, clean water, proper sanitation, and hygiene education for the children. In addition, we help to provide adult education to people who have never had an opportunity to learn. We have participated in peace and conflict resolution discussions and forums and have collected used mobility devices for the Crutches for Africa program.

### New Generations Service – The Fifth Avenue of Service

New Generations Service, the newest Avenue of Service, created by the 2010 Council on Legislation of Rotary International recognizes the positive change implemented by youth and young adults involved in leadership development activities, community and international service projects and exchange programs that enrich and foster world peace and cultural understanding. Our Club is committed to involving youth and young adults in all of its activities including vocational, community and international service projects. Round up all of the devices and drop them off at the transfer station where we have a storage trailer to store them. All of the items collected will be shipped to Africa to help disabled individuals gain mobility that they never have had.
