## The Main Event

**Guest Speakers Harry Henry & Jeni Wheeler, Family Table Collaborative** - The goal is to provide food security on Cape Cod.

With the current restrictions imposed by the coronavirus outbreak, many Cape Cod residents in the hospitality industry find themselves laid off and without income.

The Cape Cod Culinary Incubator along with Chef Jeni Wheeler (owner of Jeni's Joy and Chef at Faith Family Kitchen (FFK), a ministry of the Cape Cod Council of Churches) and The American Culinary Federation of Cape Cod and the Islands (ACF) have banded together to help address some of these needs by creating The Cape Cod Family Table Collaborative. Since beginning during the pandemic, they have served over 90,000 meals.

The goal of this venture is to provide delicious and nutritious prepared meals for hospitality industry families in need during this virus shut down; with an emphasis on providing those meals on Fridays to carry people through the weekends when safety net meal services on the Cape are unavailable.

Jeni Wheeler will be coordinating food sourcing via Greater Boston Food Bank as well as food donations from local restaurants.

ACF chefs are volunteering their time and expertise in meal planning and preparation, and ACF Cape Cod and Islands Chapter President Michael Pillarella is assisting in coordinating donation logistics and volunteer chef recruitment. With an expected increase in need for this type of meal service, donations of unused produce from area restaurants and trained, skilled labor is a core need to ensure the project's success.

The Hearth & Kettle at the Cape Codder resort is donating their kitchen and staff of volunteers to support the effort. Meal distribution is being coordinated by the Cape Cod Kids Meals program, another frequent ACF Cape Cod partner.

When restaurants were allowed to open again, they moved to camp Wingate Kirkland and used their kitchens until they allowed

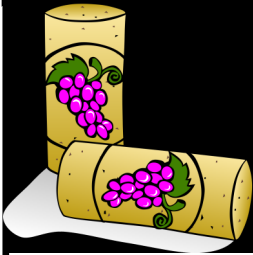
There are ways to solve the access and distribution issues versus a food availability issue. Needed to build a self-sustaining non-profit versus fundraising every year. The goal was to raise enough revenue to help people and pay for the building.

Opening to the public for a sneak preview on November 14, 11am-4pm!

With the amazing generosity of the Cisco family and will loan back \$500k for operating capital. Within the building is the collaborative, so anyone looking for a little extra love should find them! Last Thanksgiving they served 1,750 meals! First share kitchen space on Cape Cod. Anyone interested in making local products can use their facilities and sell on site. Farmers market vendors have year-round place to sell and small cafe. Swag will be available for purchase. The tavern will re-open. The space can be rented for community gatherings, guest chef dinners, private parties and more. The goal is to be a destination for local people on Cape Cod.

The goal is to become the hub of food security on Cape Cod. Their capital goal is \$2.5 million, with \$500,000 in immediate needs.

### **CAPE COD BRITE LIGHTS**

You have heard me mention or talk about the new 501c(3) corporation that was recently started by our Rotary Club. It is named Cape Cod Brite Lights and its mission is to help those in need on Cape Cod. Our main focus to date has been to provide weekend backpacks of nutritional food for needy elementary students in the DY School System. A backpack of food consists of shelf stable milk (white & chocolate), juice carton, cereal, instant oatmeal, two proteins which could be a can of tuna, chicken, pasta, soup or beef stew, a cup of apple sauce, macaroni and cheese, Nutra grain fruit granola bar, cheese its, fruit snacks, pudding cup and 2 pieces of fruit. In addition, to give each student some activities to do during the holiday break we put a coloring book and crayons in each bag. We started with a total of 25 students but have grown to 45, an increase of over 80%.

In addition, to the backpacks we have focused on providing a weekly food bag to clients at Community Connections. These clients are ones that are living on their own but are also struggling to keep their heads above water. About 15 – 18 food items are provided each week to each client to help supplement their food insecurities.

#### **How you can help:**

First: Currently we have a board of directors of 11 members. Our bylaws allow us to have a maximum number of 13. If you would like to be a part of our leadership, please contact Steve Albright.

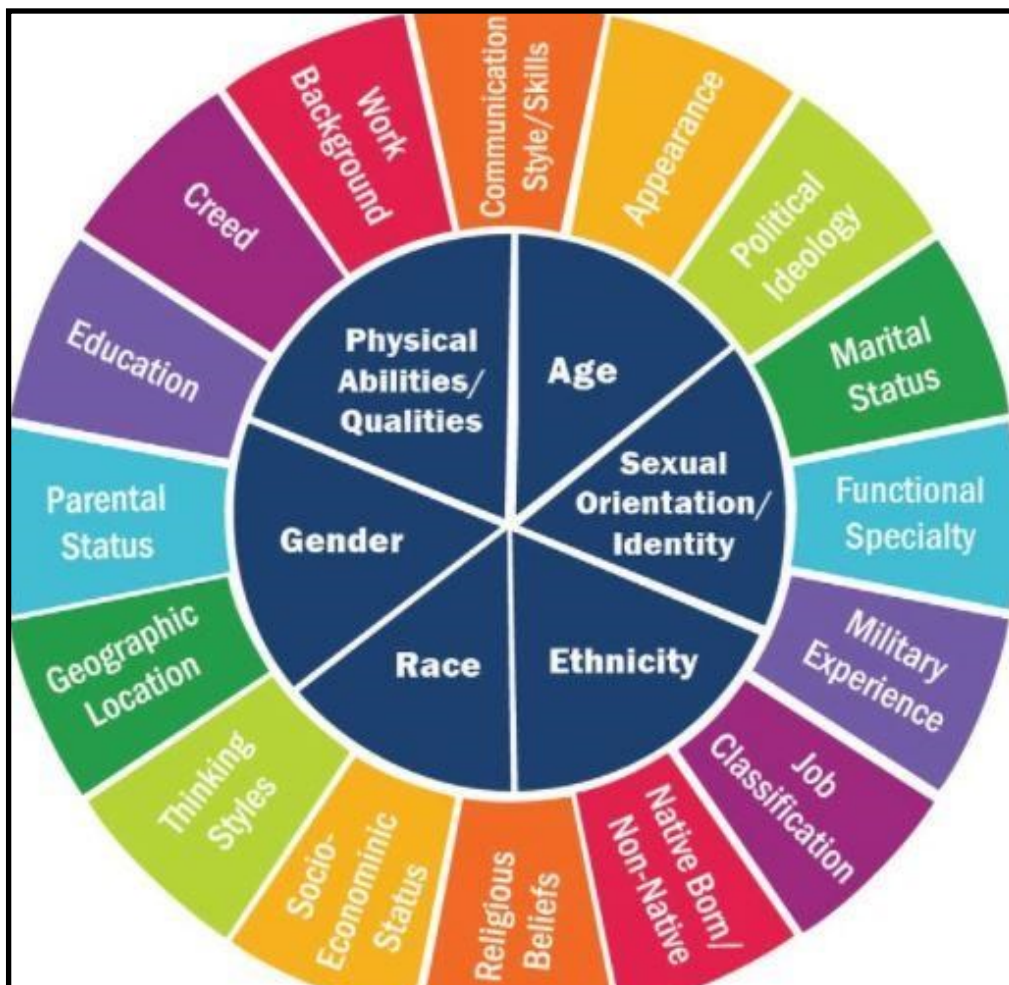
Second: We fill the backpacks and bags of food every Wednesday night at 6:00 PM at the Yarmouth Food Pantry. If you would like to help one or two nights a month, again please contact Steve Albright. Currently we have enlisted the local Girl Scout Troop to help on the first Wednesday of each month and the DY Interact Club to help on the second Wednesday of each month. We are trying to make it a community organization where anybody can be a part of it.

Third: It costs \$150 yearly to support one child's backpack and \$250 yearly to support a weekly food bag. If you would like to financially support a child or a Community Connection client, checks can be mailed to:

The International Committee of our Club has many projects supporting these goals and invites and encourages member participation in this important work. Our club is currently involved in three schools in India, helping to provide an education for children from low-income neighborhoods. In addition, our projects provide nutritional food, clean water, proper sanitation, and hygiene education for the children. In addition, we help to provide adult education to people who have never had an opportunity to learn. We have participated in peace and conflict resolution discussions and forums and have collected used mobility devices for the Crutches for Africa program.

### New Generations Service – The Fifth Avenue of Service

New Generations Service, the newest Avenue of Service, created by the 2010 Council on Legislation of Rotary International recognizes the positive change implemented by youth and young adults involved in leadership development activities, community and international service projects and exchange programs that enrich and foster world peace and cultural understanding. The first time we collected over 700 mobility devices and the second time we collected over 400 mobility devices. We are now hoping to set this up as an ongoing project. Mike Riley along with members of the International Committee are heading this project up but we would like all Yarmouth Rotarians to help out. Search for any of the desired items in your home, your extended families homes and your neighbors homes. Round up all of the devices and drop them off at the transfer station where we have a storage trailer to store them. They can be dropped off at the gate house just before you drop off your trash and recyclables. If you need help please give Mike Riley a call or send him a text to arrange pickup of your items. All of the items collected will be shipped to Africa to help disabled individuals gain mobility that they never have had.



Items that we are looking to collect include: Leg Braces; Crutches; Forearm Crutches; Walkers; Wheelchairs; Prosthetic Limbs; Baby Joggers and Strollers and Bike Trailers. No Commodes or any other type of Personal Hygiene Equipment.
