The Main Event

Steve Albright, PDG, District 7950 Foundation Chair

Steve started by saying that one of the things they tell the inbound and outbound exchange students is that as long as it is not illegal or will not cause you harm, ‘say yes’. This is how he wound up as District Foundation Chair, a position that involves so much more than he imagined.

He introduced the Foundation by saying, “The Foundation transforms your gifts into service projects that change lives both close to home and around the world.”

Since it was founded more than 100 years ago, the Foundation has spent more than 4 billion dollars on life-changing, sustainable projects. With your help, we can make lives better, in your community and around the world.

The mission of the Foundation is, The Foundation helps Rotary members advance world understanding, goodwill and peace by improving health, providing quality education, improving the environment and alleviating poverty.

In 2023 -24 the Foundation awarded 473 District Block Grants for a total of \$26 million, 324 Disaster Response Grants for a total of \$15 million, 1,092 Global Grants for a total of \$55 million and 1 Program of Scale Grant for a total of \$2 million.

District Grants, align with the Rotary Foundation’s mission, they are small-scale, short-term projects to be completed by May of each year and they can be local or international activities.

In our District 7950, we will match up to \$1,500 for each District Grant.

In addition, Interact Clubs and Rotaract Clubs can also apply for District Grants.

Each project that is funded by a District Grant must have a “hands on” meaningful component.

Global Grants, are large, long-term projects with a minimum budget of \$30,000. They are international projects involving two countries. They respond to a need identified by the recipient community, they align with the Rotary Area’s of Focus and they have long term sustainable impact and measurable outcomes.

One of the things that Rotary International really looks at with Global Grants is the Sustainability for the projects. They want the project to continue on when Rotary is no longer there.

Other types of Global Grants besides the seven areas of focus are the Global Grant Scholarship, the Vocational Training Teams (VTT) and the Disaster Response Grants. As a club we have participated in all three of these types of grants. We sponsored a Global Grant Scholarship for an individual in Yarmouth (Dr Paula Santos), We hosted in Yarmouth, numerous VTT and GSE teams that came to District 7950 and we received part of a Disaster Response Grant during COVID. Our District applied for this type of grant and we became part of it.

Global Grant Funding: Projects must be a minimum of \$30,000. The Club must contribute \$12,000. The District, contributes \$10,000 and the Rotary Foundation contributes \$8,000. The Foundation matches 80% of the District’s contribution.

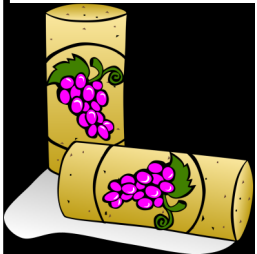

CAPE COD BRITE LIGHTS

Cape Cod Brite Lights a501c(3) corporation that was started by our Rotary Club is now in it's third year. Its mission is "to help those in need on Cape Cod. "Our main focus to date has been to provide weekend backpacks of nutritional food for needy elementary students in the DY School System. A backpack of food consists of shelf stable milk (white & chocolate), juice carton, cereal, instant oatmeal, two proteins which could be a can of tuna, chicken, pasta, soup or beef stew, a cup of apple sauce, macaroni and cheese, Nutra grain fruit granola bar, cheese its, fruit snacks, pudding cup and 2 pieces of fruit. In addition, to give each student some activities to do during the holiday break we put a coloring book and crayons in each bag. We started with a total of 25 students but have grown to 45, an increase of over 80%. In addition, with the assistance of Interact we have started to provide the school nurse with feminine products for high school girls. In addition we will be providing students in need with bags of hygiene products during the upcoming school year. The Interact Club has applied for a District Grant to support this project.

How you can help:

First: Currently we have a board of directors of 11 members. Our bylaws allow us to have a maximum number of 13. If you would like to be a part of our leadership, please contact Steve Albright.

Second: We fill the backpacks and bags of food every Wednesday night at 5:30PM at the Yarmouth Food Pantry. If you would like to help one or two nights a month, again please contact Steve Albright. Currently we have enlisted the local Girl Scout Troop to help on the first Wednesday of each month and the DY Interact Club to help on the third Wednesday of each month. We are trying to make it a community organization where anybody can be a part of it.

Third: It costs \$300—\$350 yearly to support one child's backpack and although we don't have a total figure on the hygiene project, we know that the items provided are costly. You can make a donation to support these two projects by sending your check to:

The first time we collected over 700 mobility devices and the second time we collected over 400 mobility devices. We are now hoping to set this up as an ongoing project. Lou Preziosi along with members of the International Committee are heading this project up, but we would like all Yarmouth Rotarians to help out. Search for any of the desired items in your home, your extended families homes and your neighbors homes. Round up all of the devices and drop them off at the transfer station where we have a storage trailer to store them. They can be dropped off at the gate house just before you drop off your trash and recyclables. If you need help please give Lou Presiosi a call or send him a text to arrange pickup of your items. All of the items collected will be shipped to Africa to help disabled individuals gain mobility that they never have had.



Items that we are looking to collect include: Leg Braces; Crutches; Forearm Crutches; Walkers; Wheelchairs; Prosthetic Limbs; Baby Joggers and Strollers and Bike Trailers. No Commodes or any other type of Personal Hygiene Equipment.
