<div>• Speaker Steve Certa and Illusion Faria – Steve Albright introduced the theme of The Rotary Foundation for the month of November, starting with PDG Steve Certa on Children of the Dump and Safe passage. Steve has had many trips to Guatemala, over 20 in total, and has made a major impact on the women and children of the Guatemala City Dump. Many people rely on the dump for daily sustenance and to gather scraps of food and sellable items in order to live. He then introduced the Safe Passage program which was started by a young woman from Maine with the goal to help education children to escape the cycle of poverty. Steve then introduced Illusion Faria, who began the group Creamos - “We Create Our Own Futures.” Illusion’s goal was to give education to the parents of the children served by Safe Passage. She met a small group of women who wanted to study and further their education. These women were embarrassed because they couldn’t help their children with their homework. What Illusion found was that education alone didn’t help and did not help them to find jobs. These women, having worked in the dump for years and having to sew and repair their clothes and dwellings, were really good with their hands. A volunteer showed them how to make paper beards. These women would roll and cut the beads differently to get many different styles the from endless supply of paper at the dump. These women started selling jewelry, and it was safe to work from home, study and take care of their kids. They needed to figure out how to make it bigger, and started the Entrepreneurship program. Creamos is a sister organization within Safe Passage with different focus - Safe Passage focuses on kids and Creamos focuses on women. “To provide income, emotional, and educational opportunities for the women who live in the community surrounding the Guatemala City dump, income generating programs such as Jewelry, Production, and Sewing, have created many,” stated Illusion. “Many needs of the community are being met by the work being done.” Emotional Support Program – With a focus on health and exercise, domestic violence support groups, financial literacy, individual support, educational workshops, mindfulness and movement, Creamos has been able to improve the lives for these women which has improved the lives of the children as well. Financial literacy is the backbone of the entire program, and Illusion was able to challenge the women to save money for 14 weeks. By doing so, Illusion promised she would match the amount saved. This was the first entrance of these women into the banking system. Further, Creamos helped to register all of them as small business owners who pay taxes. “Ten years ago, these women were not even registered citizens in their own country. These 145 women make 75% more than when they were working at dump, and achieved a 10th grade education level on average versus a 2nd grade level for peers,” stated Illusion. Several of the women are headed to college and 5 women in technical careers. Illusion cited the large difference between “I’m not worthy, I’m just a dump worker” to being able to dream and have a vision for the future.</div>		<div>• Nominating Committee – The Nominating Committee has been reaching out to members to fill vacant spots on the BOD and the Vice President position.
