Rotary Computers for the World Project



The **Rotary Club of Antigua** in partnership with the **Belleview Breakfast Rotary Club** of Washington State is in its tenth (10) year of conducting the Computer for the World Project which started in 2008.

In this project a team of **Rotarians** headed by Mr. John Martinka of the Belleview Breakfast Rotary Club along with and a team of **Cisco Systems IT Students and Teachers** headed by **Mr. Jeff Mason** from the Newport High School in Belleview, Washington State have been coming to Antigua & Barbuda and have been installing computers in Government and Private Schools as a donation to the Ministry of Education for the Students of Antigua & Barbuda.

To date over the years, some two thousand, four hundred (2,400) computers have been installed and over 50 fully networked computer labs have been set up in the schools in Antigua and in Barbuda.

There is also the Rotary Sewing Project which

which is also a joint project with **Rotary Club of Kirkland Downtown Washington State**.

This project is headed by **Mrs. Jan Martinka** of the Rotary Club of Kirkland Downtown, Washington State. The initiative of this Sewing Project is to teach women how to sew, thus giving them the opportunity to become proficient in sewing and to be independent and selfsustaining. The local coordinator is **Mr. Cordel Josiah of Rotary Club of Antigua.**

There are six **Rotary Sewing Projects** set up on the island. The first is in the **Grays Green community** next to the Green Bay School. There is one in **Freetown Village** at the Methodist Church, one in **New Winthorpes** Village at the Wesleyan Holiness Church, another in **Pigotts Village** at the Bethany Moravian Community Center, another in **Liberta Village** at the Grace Hill Moravian Church, and the most recent which was launched on Monday 20th February in **Bolans Village at the Bolans Penticostal Church.**

On behalf of President Evangeline Allen, President of the Rotary Club of Antigua, the members of both clubs and President Jessica Challenger President of the Rotaract Club of Antigua, I would like to thank Rev. Denise Smith-Lewis and you the members of Spring Gardens Moravian Church for your warm welcome.

The objective of Rotary is to encourage and foster the ideal of service as a basis of worthy enterprise and, in particular, to encourage and foster: first, the development of acquaintance as an opportunity for service; second, high ethical standards in business and professions, the recognition of the worthiness of all useful occupations, and the dignifying of each Rotarian's occupation as an opportunity to serve society; third, the application of the ideal of service in each Rotarian's personal, business, and community life; and fourth, the advancement of international understanding, goodwill, and peace through a world fellowship of business and professional persons united in the ideal of service.

Today together with over 1.2 million Rotarians worldwide we celebrate world peace and understanding day which is the birthday of Rotary. On February 23, 1905, Paul Harris and his friends sat down for the very first Rotary meeting. More than a century later, Rotary clubs have become synonymous with serving the community.

If you look for the word "peace" in the dictionary, chances are it would say something about quiet, tranquility and freedom from disturbance. Peace requires a level of understanding and so both peace and understanding go hand in hand.

This is such an important ideal of Rotary that there are even Rotary Centres for International Studies in peace and conflict resolution. Rotary Peace Fellows can earn a master's degree or a certificate in these areas at various universities throughout the world.

Through our service projects, peace fellowships, and scholarships, our members are taking action to address the underlying causes of conflict, including poverty, inequality, ethnic tension, lack of access to education, and unequal distribution of resources.

Here in Antigua, the Rotarians are helping to facilitate peace through our service projects. Including:

- Our Annual Autism Awareness Walk
- The Antigua and Barbuda Waste Recycling Corporation
- Water and Sanitation projects at 4 government schools as well as the Holy Trinity School and Sunshine Home for Girls
- The Pediatric Village Fair
- The eye screening project at Mount St. John
- Donation of a computer lab to Cobbs Cross Primary School
- Fencing of a pre-school in Barbuda
- A tennis program for exceptional children from the Adele School
- The provision of back to school supplies and uniforms
- A Student of the Month Awards Program in the Green Bay, Five Islands and Golden Grove Primary Schools
- A Choices Career Guidance Workshop at the Christian Faith Academy
- The building of a library at the Pigotts Primary School
- Sewing Projects across the Island



- The ongoing Monthly Meals on Wheels Program
- The food bag distribution program
- The Computers for the World Program where over 400 Computers are brought to Antigua by students and instructors from Washington State and are distributed to the various Government and Private Secondary Schools. (Some of these persons are here with us today)

Peace is the mother of progress. Without peace, a nation cannot make any progress. The same goes for us as individuals. Without peace at work and especially in our daily lives we cannot function at our best. So peace is ever desirable.

As I close, I would like to challenge you with two very specific ideas, heavily informed by the Christian worldview. First, "If it is possible, as much as depends on you, live peaceably with all men." Second, "Therefore let us pursue the things which make for peace and the things by which one may edify another."

We cannot control what others across the world do; we cannot control what others across the region do; we cannot control what people across the country do; we cannot control what people across the parish do; we cannot control what people in our families do; But, most importantly, we can control what we do.

Is peace possible in The world? I don't know. Is peace possible in My world? Absolutely!

Imagine if we can multiply that individual peace 1.2 million times over! That doesn't have to be a dream. That can become a reality.

World peace is available today! World peace begins with each of us!

Message from Rotary International President John F. Germ

On 23 February, we will mark 112 years since the founding of Rotary. It is incredible to think about how much has changed, in our world and in our organization, since the first Rotary club met in Chicago with Paul Harris as a founding member.

Some things are easy to compare between now and 1905. There have been changes in technology, medicine, and society. When we look at a map of the world in 1905 and a map of the world today, we can see what's different. What we can't do is compare what is with what might have been. There is no way to compare our world as it exists now with the world as it would have been without Rotary.

Rotary has risen to so many challenges in its 112 years. We've answered conflict with peace, and poverty with education. We've responded to a lack of basic health care with projects large and small, from equipping clinics in tiny villages to eradicating pione cares the globe.

We will never know how different the world would have been if Rotary had never been founded; if any one Rotary club had never been chartered; or if any single Rotarian had declined the invitation to join a Rotary club.



But I will say, with absolute faith and complete confidence, that the world is a far, far better place now than it would have been without Rotary and that Rotary itself is stronger because of every one of you.

He also expanded on the significant number of academic achievers Antigua and Barbuda has produced.

He commented on the profound and early lesson in understanding the differences between the knowledge-based aspirants and a performancebased society with a culture of accountability.

He further expanded on how to raise the bar and rollout a new version of Antigua and Barbuda's National Performance Culture. This he said was not an easy task, neither was he suggesting or proposing that he had the answers. However, he opined that where as the "school system" may produce academics with many subject passes, it hardly produces a character, which is preoccupied with its national performance obligations. Consequently, the school system produces excellent individualists and job seekers with little or no substantive appreciation or understanding of teamwork and nation building. The problem remains systemic as inherited from our colonial past, and an assimilated concept that the devil takes the hindmost. Here, the hindmost goes to prison or petty crimes, and the foremost bankrupts the nation with impunity. What is the difference? The difference is injustice.....

In conclusion he stated that the youths must be cultured to prevent problems and solve problems.
