Reasons to love Rotary right now ... Reason #290: Rotarians gather for good

Remembering Jimmy Carter's work for peace (excerpts from a February 2018 issue of Rotary magazine)

One of Jimmy's Carter's greatest awards was the Nobel Peace Prize, which he received in 2002 in recognition of his decades of work advancing peace and human rights. Carter redefined what it means to be a retired president — and the country's longest-lived one at that, having surpassed Herbert Hoover (who lived 31 years after leaving the White House). During his presidency, Carter made a commitment to human rights the cornerstone of his foreign policy; he and his wife, Rosalynn, continued that emphasis when they founded the Carter Center in 1982. The center's programs revolve around two main themes: peace and health.

"We feel that there's a human right of people to live in peace," Carter told The Rotarian, in 2018. "We feel it's a human right to have a modicum of health care, to have a decent place in which to live, to have a chance to have an education, to have freedom of speech and freedom of religion and the right to elect your own leaders."

In addition to the pursuit of peace, the Carter Center also had a task force on disease eradication. The only one of its kind in the world, it analyzes data to ascertain which diseases could be eradicated from the entire world. The center is focusing on eradicating Guinea worm disease and regionally eliminating five other diseases: river blindness, trachoma, schistosomiasis, lymphatic filariasis, and malaria. "I might say if Rotary wasn't leading that fight to eradicate polio now, the Carter Center would – it's the kind of thing that would be very exciting for us," Carter says. "We're very proud to see the progress that Rotary has had with that."

<u>Last Week:</u> Jan 9th - West Allis Health Department new crib program – Share a room, not a bed.

"Bed-sharing" refers to an infant who is sleeping in the same bed, couch, or other surface where parents or others are sleeping) vs. "room-sharing" refers to an infant who is sleeping in the parents' room, but in their own crib or bassinet. Pediatricians strongly advises parents to "room share" and not bed share with an infant. This is based on studies about the risk of Sudden Infant Death Syndrome (SIDS) being reduced when the infant sleeps in the same room as the mother, but the risk is increased when infants share a bed with parents or anyone else.

If parents are unable to provide their baby with a safe, separate bed to sleep in, they may qualify for a Pack N' Play at no cost. Pack 'n Plays® help reduce deaths due to SIDS and unsafe sleep - they are portable and can be taken wherever the baby needs to be cared for.
