Harry George - Tucson Economy / Start Ups Posted by Vickie Jacobs on Jun 18, 2012



Harry George has more than 40 years experience in founding, operating and investing in successful rapid growth technologyrelated companies. He co-founded Solstice Capital in 1995. Solstice is a venture capital fund investing in early-stage life science, information technology and clean tech companies. Solstice is currently managing its second fund (\$57 Million) and has invested in a total of 44 companies since inception.

Previously, from 1981 to 1989, Mr. George was co-founder, Director, and Vice-President of Finance for Interleaf Inc. During this time, Interleaf, a pioneer in electronic publishing, grew to be a publicly traded company with \$100 million in annual revenue. In January 2000, Interleaf was acquired by Broadvision in a stock merger that valued Interleaf at approximately \$1 billion. Prior to this, Harry was a co-founder, Director and Vice President of Finance of Kurzweil Computer Products, subsequently purchased by Xerox Imaging Systems in 1980.

Harry has been a Director of 26 private and public companies and is currently a Director of Calimmune, High Throughput Genomics (where he serves as Chairman), Lumidigm, Medipacs, Post.Bid.Ship, Rehnu, Syncardia, and Tempronics. He has been active with the Arizona Venture Capital Conference, and its successor, Invest SW, and served on their conference screening panels since 1997. Harry was one of the founders of Tucson's Desert Angels. He is a member of the Arizona Technology Council Board, the BIO5 Advisory Board, and the board of the Rocky Mountain Venture Capital Association, Southern Arizona Leadership Council, and the Pima County Bond Advisory Committee. At the University of Arizona, he serves on the board of Arizona Center for Innovation and was a member of the advisory committee of the MBA program at the Eller School of Business for six years. Harry is Chair of a TREO task force developing an entrepreneurial economic blueprint for Tucson.

From 1992 to 1999, he was a Trustee of the Arizona-Sonora Desert Museum and served as its Treasurer. From 2000-2005, Harry was Co-Chair of the Museum's Treasure of the Desert Capital Campaign. Since 2004, he has been a Trustee of the Tucson Museum of Art and serves as its Treasurer. He received an AB from Bowdoin College.

100 Wheelchairs Distributed In Nogales! Posted by Joni Condit on Jun 18, 2012



This past weekend, in Nogales, Sonora, 100 people of all ages received "rough rider" wheelchairs through our international collaboration between the Rotary Club of Tucson and the Nogales Sur Rotary Club. Four RCoT members. Bob Logan, Jim Lubinski, Sally Montagne, and Joni were met at the border by a lovely young woman, Viridiana Aguilar, a 28 year-old computer engineer who joined the Nogales Sur club this past year. She escorted us through the border and we soon realized that we were fortunate to have her with us since none of us spoke fluent Spanish and we were bringing in four wheelchairs that were brought to Tucson to show our club what these

chairs were all about. Viri explained that we were Rotarians and the customs official shared that he was a former Rotarian and finally just waved us through.

Viri's husband, Emanuel (a psychiatrist and former Rotarian) met us on the other side of the border with their large SUV and their two beautiful young children. Bob and Emanuel strapped the wheelchairs to the bike rack on the back of the SUV and off we went. The Nogales Sur Club had arranged the wheelchair distribution ceremony at an art gallery and the majority of their club's 20 members were patiently waiting for us to arrive along with wheelchair recipients and their family members. Omar Montiel, the Nogales Sur Club President greeted us enthusiastically with kisses on both cheeks. We made instant friends with all of the club members.

This project has had many bumps and turns over the past three plus years and some of us came to appreciate the differences in culture along the way. Hugh Thompson initially approached President Charlotte with the idea for the grant proposed by a long time U of A pediatrician, Dr. Duke Duncan, who helped us to write the matching grant. Our initial efforts and some grant dollars were focused on developing a wheelchair shop in Nogales where disabled people would be employed to build and fit custom wheelchairs to needy recipients. Our former member, Jeff Abbott, contributed many hours of his time visiting Nogales trying to help to facilitate this project. The shop came to fruition and the disabled staff are assembling and fitting chairs for recipients. This past year, in an effort to meet the needs and serve more people in Nogales who desperately needed these sturdy "rough rider" chairs, the Nogales Sur Club and RCoT sought an additional avenue. In the past few months, before the expiration of the grant, we were able to use the

balance of our grant dollars have 100 wheelchairs build by the Bertha O. Foundation in Mexico.

The Nogales Sur Club donated some funds toward the project as well as helping to coordinate the order to produce the chairs and to screen and select the 100 needy recipients for the chairs. It made the challenges of the past few years all worthwhile to see the faces of those who were expectantly waiting and to get the hugs and thanks as they were helped into their new wheelchairs. The first recipient, a sweet elderly woman, just glowed and repeatedly thanked us as she sat in her chair. Bob Logan, our International Chair for the past two years, remarked, "it was all worth it!" We only regretted that Jeff could not be there to help us celebrate the day and to witness the good that his efforts had generated.

Along the way, we truly did experience the Four Way "Test" trying very hard to find the truth when there were differences between constituents in Nogales. We worked very hard to find a resolution that was fair to all. We certainly experienced the building of friendships with the warm and caring Nogales Sur Club, and most of all, we were touched that our mutual efforts were able to benefit so many people.

Getting to work closely with our Executive Director, Mary Laughbaum, has been a special privilege and an opportunity to recognize and appreciate her talents and skills. Trying to serve as President and work without her would have been very difficult.

Our club completed three significant International Projects this year as well as again having excellent participation in more than twenty years of support for our San Carlos annual Christmas project. We finally completed the Nogales Wheelchair project as stated in this Tucsotarian. With Larry Peth's leadership and financial support, in addition to a District Matching Grant, a Tanzania school now has solar lighting allowing the school to be used in the evenings for adult education. The Amman-Petra Jordan Rotary Club requested our club's participation in a water catchment systems project. With Jim Ronstadt's leadership and the generous support of a number of our members, we were able to do more systems than initially proposed in the grant. Additionally, we provided club funds to help purchase furniture for a school in Ghana, using some of my president's funds.

Our club participated actively in many projects to benefit those in our community including repainting the Primavera Foundation Men's shelter, painting an Amphi School building, the Norma Peale/Goodwill clothing and book drive, several Red Cross blood drives, \$2,000 donated to the District-wide Dictionary project, and our annual Salvation Army bell ringing. We have Robison volunteers, Reading Seed volunteers, and Build the Future volunteers. We helped with RYLA to develop our future Rotarians and supported our Boy Scouts.

Our members found time to enjoy one another outside of our regular meetings when not doing community service. Our Wine Fellowship group is active and fun combining dining and wine-tasting. Our hiking group took a number of fun and beautiful hikes and is planning a Grand Canyon hike next year.

Last, but not least, the generosity of this club is overwhelming. Our members donated to many new Paul Harris Fellowships, donated to RI's Annual Fund and to Polio Plus. Our members funded thirteen scholarships at the U of A and Pima (\$24,800). Your Club Foundation was in excellent hands under the leadership of Jon Wang and the hands on participation of its members.
