

Rotary Youth Exchange, Rotoract, Interact, and RYLA are the four main programs under the New Generations of Service platform.

## Havasupai Canyon Hike Oct. 18-21, Rotary Youth Exchange

Havasupai Canyon is a legendary spot in northern Arizona (part of the Grand Canyon) and should be on everyone's bucket list to see the tallest waterfalls in Arizona and visit the Havasupai Indian reservation. The hike is 11 miles to the campground and takes about four hours. The trip out takes about 5-6 hours depending on how quick you make it up the last switchbacks. The trip here is nothing short of spectacular. It is the perfect tune-up for making the Grand Canyon hike next Spring.

This trip has been part of Districts 5490 and 5510's (think all of Arizona) Rotary Youth Exchange hike for over 15 years. I first did

this trip with my wife and kids back in 2008 and have done it every year since except for the year of the big flood when the trip was cancelled due to damage to the campground. We did this hike last year and the canyon is back on the mend and the falls have not changed at all except for the lower falls of Navajo Falls. Anyone in reasonable condition can easily make this hike. If you take your own transportation, you can even ride a mule or take the helicopter at extra cost.

It has been a fun international experience visiting with all or most of the RYE students from around the world. Typically, we have 20-25 students and this is usually their first and maybe only time to meet their counterparts statewide. This trip is extremely well organized by a group of very dedicated RYE program Rotarians from District 5490 and 5510. The scenery is great. The food is great. The experience is something to remember and the kids are loads of fun. Mid to late October is prime time for experiencing this magical place. Anybody can go including non-Rotarians. Rich Flynn from our Club went with me last year and raves about the experience. The trip is \$300 pp and includes an overnight in beautiful Seligman. The cost also includes meals in the canyon and your permits and fees for the Tribe. If you have any questions, call Dave Gallaher at 907-4983.



#### Rotary Fellowships

*This is the third of four parts of an article, written by Drew Vactor for eClub One in 2004, about Rotary Fellowships. This installment is about how Rotary Fellowships are formed.*

For a Rotary Fellowship to receive official recognition, an extensive application must be submitted to Rotary International. Here are some of the criteria that are common to approved Rotary Fellowships:

- Members are from at least 3 countries
- District Governors in at least 3 districts in 3 countries must approve
- Must have a President and Officers
- It must be financially self sustaining
- Objective must be furtherance of acquaintance and fellowship among Rotarians
- Must publish its roster and share it with the RI Secretariat
- There must be an annual "forum" in person or in writing
- Must be unique in its recreational or vocational focus and activities

RI helps promote fellowships, including a quarterly article in The Rotarian. There are also booths for fellowships at the International Convention. Rotary Districts have RRVF Chairs who coordinate between Fellowship members and individual clubs. The President of an RRVF is also a member of the RI RRVF committee.

Fellowship members also find wonderful opportunities to serve in their areas of interest. For instance, Yachting Fellowship members treat disabled children to cruises, Flying Rotarians ferry patients to hospitals and transport supplies to disaster areas and Skiing Rotarians fund opportunities for disabled skiing enthusiasts to get expensive specialized skiing equipment. A fellowship of Peace Officers helps develop parks and gardens as havens of peace while Environmental Fellows work to preserve our planet. Musical fellows provide musical leadership and entertainment at Rotary meetings on all levels and the missions of various Medical Fellowships are often apparent from the groups' names.
