Abuse Stops and Healing Begins Posted by Arla Stader on Jan 25, 2013



The Children's Advocacy Center is a unique, childfriendly facility where "abuse stops and healing begins." Co-located with law enforcement, Child Protective Services, and mental health professionals, the Children's Advocacy Center is the first step in the prosecution of child crimes in Southern Arizona. Children are interviewed by specially trained forensic interviewers using techniques that allow the child to tell what happened using his/her words and without using leading or suggestive questions. Non-offending family members receive referrals for mental health services and continuous advocacy for up to six months from our victim advocates. The Center is designed for the comfort of the child, from soothing

colors and culturally diverse toys and books.

Our Education Outreach teaches children from pre-K to high school about body safety, Internet safety, communication, and the dangers of "date rape" drugs. Mandatory reporter training is also given to professionals responsible for children, and teaches them their duty to report suspected abuse.

Our children and community cannot be safe until the secrets of child abuse are brought to light and offenders held responsible for their actions. The Southern Arizona Children's Advocacy Center is the place where "the abuse stops and the healing begins".

She was part of the original group of professionals that initiated the Children's Advocacy Center and wrote the original protocols for the investigation of child abuse at the Center. She uses her experience today to accomplish the mission of the Southern Arizona Children's Advocacy Center- which is to protect and support children through coordinated efforts to stop child abuse and neglect that include investigation, intervention, education and advocacy.

Susie Huhn is the Executive Director of Casa de los Ninos a nationally accredited organization providing parent education and support, child welfare and behavioral health services in Pima County. Casa de los Ninos has a staff of 280 employees and over 100 volunteers.

Susie Huhn holds a Bachelor Degree in Education and a Masters Degree in Organizational Management and over 30 years experience in the provision of Human Services in Arizona. Susie Huhn started her career working for Child & Family Resources, a community based non-profit organization. For 24 years, she worked with children with special needs, teen mothers, child care centers and families often struggling to raise healthy kids. "I feel lucky to be able to say after all these years I still love what I do"

In addition to her paid positions, Susie works on many boards and committees, at local state and national level with a focus on child welfare, early childhood education, and child abuse

prevention advocating for a community that values children, families and their future. Ms Huhn is Past Chair of the Board of Directors for the Arizona Council of Human Service Providers, and a Member of the Western Steering Committee of Child Welfare League of America. She was a 2007 recipient of the YWCA Women on the Move award.

Year of the Sandwich

On April 21, 1921, our club received its Charter. The club was composed of 25 charter members and approximately 25 other members selected by the Charter Members. The population of Tucson was less than 30,000 people. Through the rest of the prosperous twenties, our club was characterized by lively luncheon programs and charitable and civic activities. At that time, the club assisted in a

bond issue campaign which raised money for a new school, played a charity baseball club with the Kiwanis Club raising \$400 for the Boy Scouts' Summer Camp, pledged an annual gift of \$200 to the Arizona Children's Home, and contributed \$100 to the Pueblo, Colorado Relief Fund.

When the Great Depression hit Tucson in the early thirties, our club was proud of its "roast beef and pie" luncheon reputation. All of this changed when austerity became a reality for the club members and the club itself. Fearing defections from the membership because of the luncheon costs, newly installed President, J.F. "Pop" McKale, instituted a policy of a sandwich and drink for the luncheon fare. The cost of the luncheon was twenty-five cents. His Presidency was from July of 1933 to July of 1934.

When McKale took office there were 82 members and at end of his term, membership had increased to 84. Also at the end of his term, the economy had improved enough in Tucson to go back to the roast beef and pie menu. But things were still bleak financially for the club. The club was so financially distressed, it could not send McKale to Rotary International at the beginning of his term. The population of Tucson was still a small fraction of what it is today, but the membership slowly increased through the decade as the city gradually climbed out of the Depression years.

After his tenure as President, Pop McKale stayed active in Rotary affairs and often engaged in razzing his Democrat friend, the cigar chomping, Jack O'Dowd about politics. Their debates at the weekly meetings centered on Republican McKale's opposition to the so-called "Rude Deal" politics championed by Franklin Delano Roosevelt and artfully defended by O'Dowd. But the differences between the two friends were always cast in a humorous vein and both remained unifying forces within the club. O'Dowd was the President of the Rotary Club of Tucson in 1947-48. O'Dowd was also head of the Rationing Board during the war years preceding his presidency.
