Bio of Lisa Hopper

Lisa Hopper is the founder and CEO of World Care, an international humanitarian aid organization headquartered in Tucson. In 1994, Lisa began collecting school supplies in her garage for local children in need. Every year World Care reuses and recycles nearly 5 million pounds of material by channeling usable items to global humanitarian aid programs and diverting non-usable items from landfills to be broken down and recycled. Lisa holds a Bachelor of Science in Administration and Physics from George Washington University. She is an

international lecturer and consultant as well as an adjunct lecturer at the University of Arizona Honors College in International Studies and Social Entrepreneurship. Lisa released her first book in the Fall 2010 entitled "In the Wake of a Dream."

Suzanne Lawder Posted by Jerry Harris on Apr 26, 2013



Suzanne Lawder was born in rural Virginia. She moved to Arizona when she was four. Her father had returned from service in the Navy during World War II to find jobs scarce. Like many returning servicemen, he had to leave home and search for work. He found work in the construction industry in Arizona. He brought his family with him and they lived a fast paced and fast moving life. They lived in a trailer and Suzanne's father soon gained distinction building roads. Suzanne remembers going to six different schools in the first grade. Her early memories include desert adventures with her older brother, rattlesnakes, and tarantulas. Curiosity was an early personality trait. Fear was not.

After graduating from Arizona State University with a degree in business, Suzanne married. Her husband was a UN pilot and they lived in Jerusalem for a short period. A divorce left her a single mother with no job. While she was in Tucson, Suzanne took the advice of a friend and interviewed with Goodwill

Industries of Southern Arizona in 1982. She turned down the job and was walking out of the building when the thought came to her. I belong here. She turned around, walked back in, accepted the job and began a spectacular career. Goodwill Industries was in a state of disarray, both financially and internally with payrolls sometimes not being met. In 1987, interviews were held by an all male board to hire a new president. Many candidates were interviewed. Suzanne was awarded the position and turned the organization around.

She says being a CEO is not for sissies and the goal is not to win a popularity contest. She had to make hard choices. Employees had to be laid off. Long hours were the norm, not the exception. Her daughter, Holly, spent many nights with her mother in the Goodwill offices doing homework and reading while her mother worked. Through perseverance and hard work, the company turned around and became a viable part of the Southern Arizona community. Holly grew up, went to Medical School, did a fellowship at the Mayo Clinic, and now practices Radiology in Phoenix. Her husband is also a Radiologist.

The usual term for a CEO at a company is around five years. Suzanne has over 25 years as a CEO and President. Bob Shaff was on the board of Goodwill Industries for a number of years. He says, "It was one of the most positive experiences of my life. Suzanne is great to work with and a natural leader." Suzanne now oversees a business that employs 500 employees and directly touches the lives of over 18,000 people. Suzanne said, "The mission of Goodwill Industries is to provide services, training and jobs to people with barriers to employment." Changing lives through the power of work is the root concept of Goodwill Industries.

Goodwill Industries also provides a youth mentoring program for local young people who need extra help getting through the formative years between 12 and 17. There are over 100 young people in this program. Goodwill also sponsors a training program for people who are interested in working in call centers and customer service businesses. This is an area of growth in the Southern Arizona business community. The Youth Employment Program trains young people between the ages of 17 and 21 to enter the job market at entry level jobs. Each year over 200 youth trained by Goodwill are able to enter the job market.

Goodwill has expanded in Southern Arizona with stores in Sierra Vista, Casa Grande, and Benson. Recently, an upscale, boutique shop specializing in name brand, fashionable clothes, accessories and furnishings opened at 7266 North Oracle Road. Goodwill Industries also sells donated cars, motorcycles, RVs, and boats. Recently, a 1937 red Jaguar Replica convertible was donated and sold.

From near bankruptcy and chaos, Suzanne has brought Goodwill Industries of Southern Arizona to the forefront of nonprofits. Jim Gibbons, national President and CEO of Goodwill Industries International recently called our local Goodwill the "model nonprofit." Today, Suzanne oversees an organization with more than \$11 million in yearly revenue. Recently, she received the prestigious Kenneth K. King Management Award for Executive Excellence. Although Suzanne is usually at Rotary each Wednesday, she now is asked to travel to Goodwill Industry locations across the country to train and mentor other CEOs.
