### [The Joy of Archaeology at the Mission of Sorrows](#)

Spanish colonial missions in the Pimería Alta, the name that the Spanish gave to the region encompassing southern Arizona and northern Sonora, are popularly depicted as isolated, frontier outposts lead by intrepid missionary heroes. However, recent research demonstrates that these missions engaged in economic endeavors that were regional, and even global, in scope.

Dr. Barnet Pavao-Zuckerman, Associate Curator in the Arizona State Museum and Associate Professor and Associate Director of the UA School of Anthropology, will share the archaeological evidence she and other archaeologists and students have discovered at several missions in the Pimería Alta, including the Mission of Sorrows. These discoveries reveal the importance of ranching and the production of animal products such as

tallow and hide in linking missions to regional and global economic networks. The presence of trade goods from Europe and Asia, acquired in part through the production of livestock products, reveal that Pimería Alta missions contributed to the very roots of the global economy as we experience it today.

Dr. Barnet Pavao-Zuckerman is Associate Curator in the Arizona State Museum and Associate Professor and Associate Director of the School of Anthropology, at the University of Arizona. She received her BA from Binghamton University in 1996, and her Ph.D. from the University of Georgia in 2001. She is an historical archaeologist and zooarchaeologist. She is currently conducting research on the colonial-period experiences of Native Americans in southeastern and southwestern North America, and the impact of the introduction of Eurasian domesticated animals and European market economies on indigenous subsistence and economic systems.

### "Member Spotlight - Jim Sumwalt"

Jim Sumwalt grew up in Michigan. When he was in the sixth grade, his father passed away. Jim took on any job he could get to help his family. His first job was de-weeding gladioli bulbs for twenty five cents an hour. In Benton Harbor, he delivered the News Palladium during his second and third year of high school. During his final year of high school, he pumped gas at the local Sinclair station. He had a bicycle during his freshman year in high school and bought a Cushman Motor Scooter during his sophomore year. Later he bought a 29 Model A Ford which he traded in on a 1939 Chevy during his senior year of high school.

After high school, Jim and his mother drove to Burbank, California. Jim worked as a letter carrier for the Postal Service. During his year and a half in California delivering the mail, Jim met Robert Wagner and Debbie Reynolds. Jim drove back to Michigan and enrolled at Michigan State in East Lansing. At the end of his second year at Michigan State, Jim married his high school sweetheart, Joann. He graduated with a Bachelor of Science in Geology.

He soon changed his focus to dentistry. He graduated from the University of Detroit with a degree in Dental Science in 1965 and practiced general dentistry for a while.
