# **Greg Gerendas** Trauma Support Services of North Texas

Greg Gerendas is the Executive Director at Trauma Support Services of North Texas (TSSNT). He joined the agency in December of 2012. TSSNT is a 501 (c) (3) nonprofit organization founded in 2007 which provides affordable therapeutic and support services to victims of trauma through a caring network of licensed social workers, counselors, Board Members, advisors and agency staff. The agency is dedicated to providing affordable therapy and support services for people who have been victims of traumatic events such as suicide, homicide, rape, abuse, assault, robbery, vehicular crashes, identity theft, human trafficking and natural disasters. The goal of TSSNT is to help children and adults rebuild their lives after trauma, doing "whatever it takes, for as long as it takes" to overcome trauma and return to healthy, productive lives.

A resident of the DFW area since 1986, Greg has held leadership positions in the nonprofit community for over 30 years. In addition to providing counsel to individuals and their families, Greg has directed organizations with programs helping 1) older adults live independently; 2) people with developmental disabilities; 3) battered women and their families; and 4) economically disadvantaged Hispanic children and families. Prior to joining TSSNT, he also served as the Executive Director at Senior Adult Services, a nonprofit serving older adults in North Texas, and Sequoia, Inc., a nonprofit dedicated to helping people with developmental disabilities. Greg was also the Executive Director for The American Association of Lutheran Churches, a small church body of about 80 churches. Greg is an ordained Lutheran Pastor and has served in various churches in Texas, Illinois, Missouri and Michigan in the LC-MS, The ELCA and the AALC.

Greg graduated from Concordia Seminary, St. Louis, MO in 1982 with a Master of Divinity degree. His undergraduate degree is in Business from Drake University in Des Moines, Iowa. Greg lives in Valley Ranch and is married to Dr. Carol Johnson-Gerendas, a professor at Texas Wesleyan University. He is a drummer and also enjoys playing golf whenever possible.
